PREFACE

The Queensland Parliamentary Record for the 57th Parliament (24 November 2020 – 1 October 2024) is a comprehensive source of information about the Queensland Parliament since 1860.

Part 1 of the Parliamentary Record provides a record of the 57th Parliament. In early 2022, works began on the renovation of the Parliamentary Annexe with Members relocated offsite for the first time since the opening of the Annexe in 1979. The renovation was completed and Members returned in May 2024. During the 57th Parliament the Parliamentary Service introduced the new Parliamentary Information Management System (PIMS), which continues the digital transformation of the Service.

Part 2 of the Parliamentary Record provides historical information, including an alphabetical register of all members of the Queensland Parliament since 1860.

Other useful sources of information about Parliament can be found on the Parliament's website, including the Former Members Register and the Record of Proceedings (Hansard). The Former Members Register includes detailed biographical information about all former members of the Queensland Parliament. Hansard is the official record of debate and proceedings of the Queensland Parliament. This information is also available in a searchable digital format from 1860 onwards.

The Parliamentary Record for the 57th Parliament was prepared by the Queensland Parliamentary Library and the Communication & Marketing team.

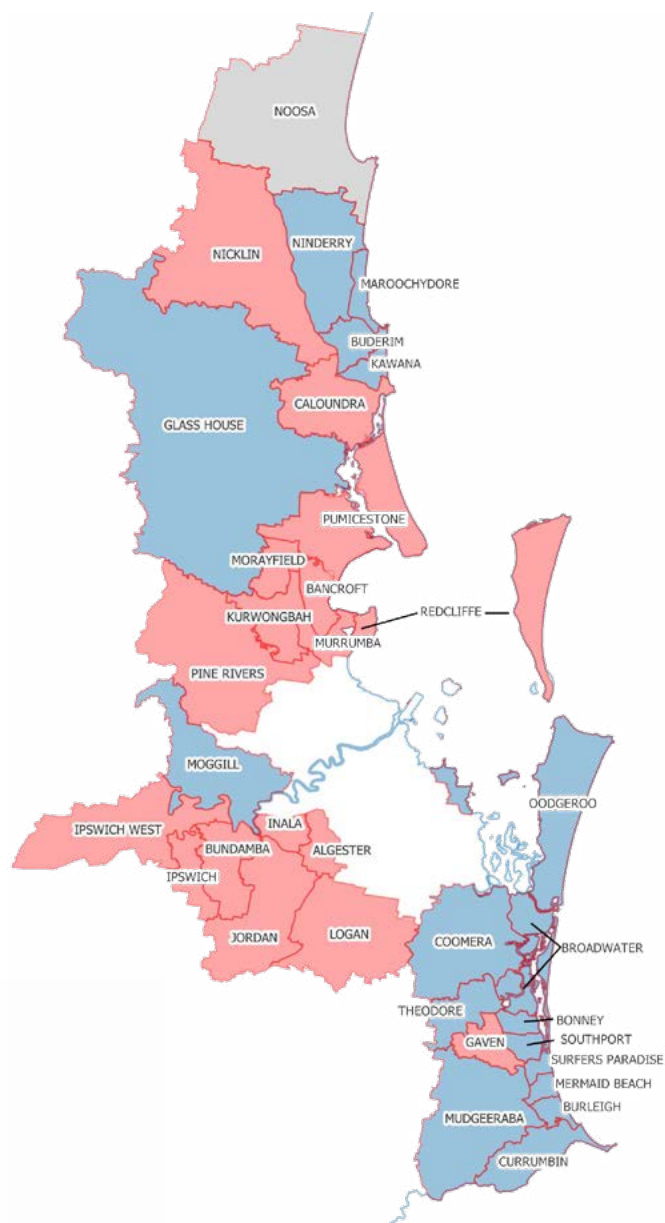

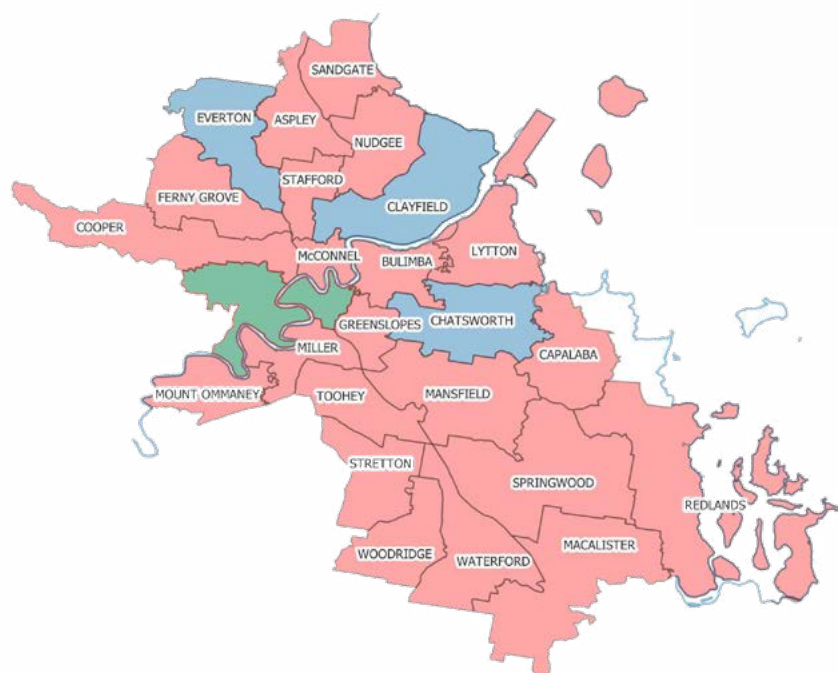

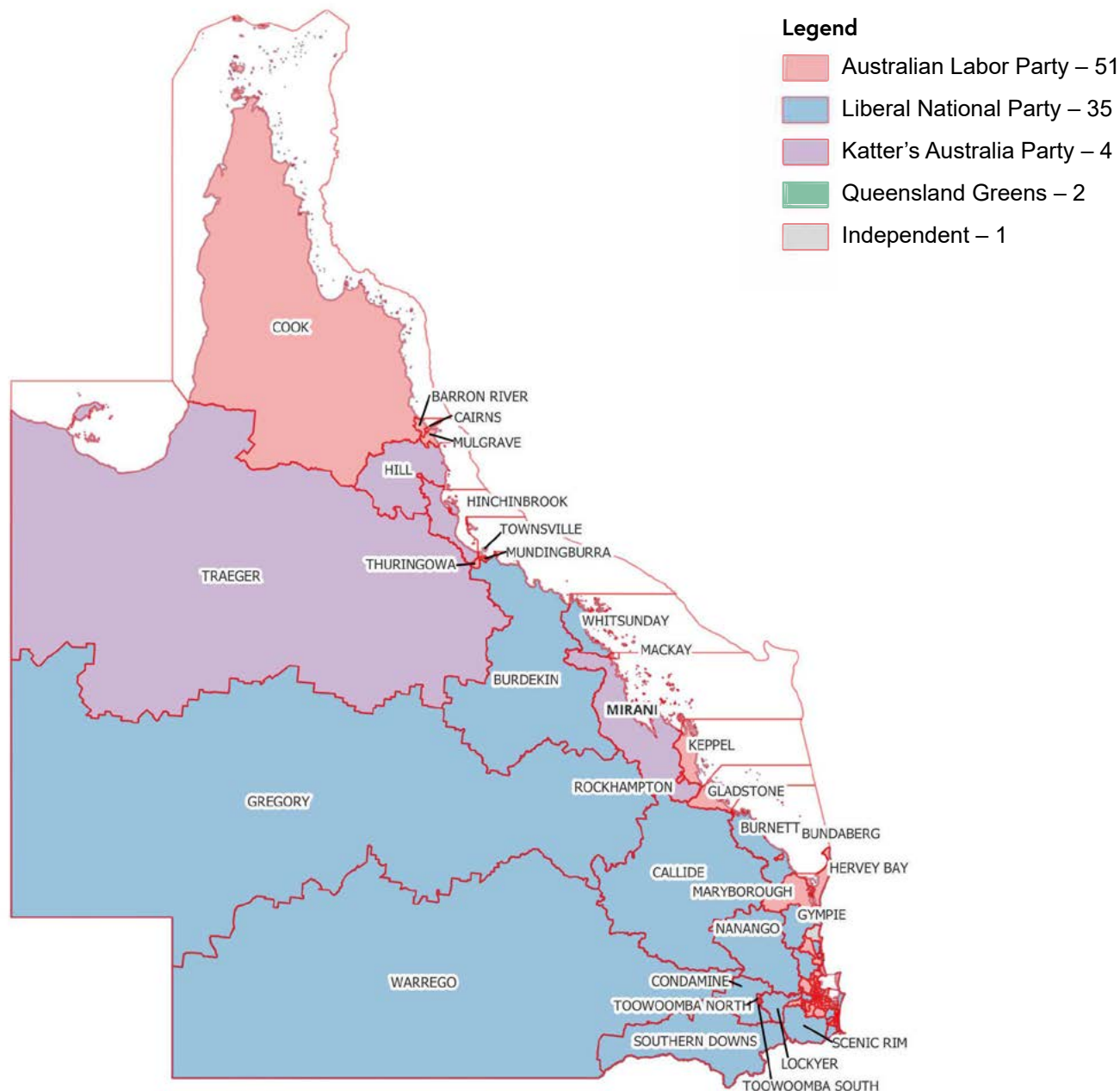

Note: The Legislative Council was abolished on 23 March 1922, the date on which the abolition bill—the Constitution Act Amendment Act of 1922—was proclaimed, thus giving Queensland the only unicameral parliament in Australia, and one of the few in the Commonwealth. Abolition had been a platform of successive Labor governments since 1915, but was achieved only by appointment of sufficient additional members of the Legislative Council to ensure passage of the bill. An attempt had been made in May 1917 to force abolition by passage of a referendum, however the move was not successful, the votes being 116 196 for, and 179 105 against.

2013	25 September. The Speakers of the Queensland Parliament and the Parliament of Papua New Guinea entered into a Parliamentary Partnership Agreement, formally supporting the continuing evolution of the PNG Parliament, through parliamentary capacity building programs.
2014	25 August. The 150th anniversary of the formal establishment of the Queensland Parliament's Hansard was celebrated.
2015	24 March. The Member for Nicklin, Peter Wellington was elected the first independent speaker of the Queensland Parliament since William Armstrong, who held the position from 1911 to 1915.
2016	19 March. Referendum passed to approve the Constitution (Fixed Term Parliament) Amendment Bill 2015 (Qld). The Bill amended the <i>Constitution of Queensland 2001</i> (Qld) to provide for fixed four-year terms for the Legislative Assembly. It was the eighth State initiated referendum since the establishment of the Queensland Parliament.
2016	5 May. The <i>Electoral (Improving Representation) and Other Legislation Amendment Act 2016</i> (Qld) received royal assent. The Act increased the number of members of the Legislative Assembly from 89 members to 93. The Act also introduced full preferential voting.
2017	May. Redistribution of Electoral Districts, the third by the independent Commission established under the <i>Electoral Act 1992</i> (Qld). The number of electorates increased to 93. Two electorates were removed, and six new electorates were formed. Ten electorates were renamed. Four electorates over 100 000 km ² were retained.
2018	4 August. The 150th anniversary of the first sitting of Parliament in the current building was celebrated.
2018	11 August. Open Day at Queensland Parliament House to celebrate the 150th anniversary of the opening of the building.

2021	Planning work commenced to upgrade and repair the exterior façade of the Parliamentary Annexe to address a safety risk and refurbish ageing interior office and overnight accommodation rooms.
2022	19 March. To commemorate the 100th anniversary of the abolition of the Queensland Legislative Council a seminar, co-hosted by the Queensland Parliament and The Royal Historical Society of Queensland, was held at Queensland Parliament.
2022	July. Junior Indigenous Youth Parliament (JIYP) was held in the Torres Strait in July 2022, marking the first time JIYP was delivered in a First Nations community.
2022	15 September. Following the death of Queen Elizabeth II on 8 September 2022, the Legislative Assembly sat briefly to pass legislation enabling a one-off public holiday on Thursday, 22 September 2022. The public holiday was named the 'National Day of Mourning for Her Majesty the Queen'. The reminder of the sitting week was postponed. Additional sitting days were added to already scheduled sitting weeks, creating 3 four-day sitting weeks. The additional Friday sitting days occurred on Friday 14 October, Friday 28 October and Friday 2 December.
2022	July. The \$58 million refurbishment of the Parliamentary Annexe project commenced in stages, including the internal refurbishment of levels 9 to 23 to modernise offices and improve the members' accommodation, commencing from September 2022.
2023	9–11 May. The Queensland Parliament sat in Cairns at the Cairns Convention Centre, the sixth Regional Parliament to be held in Queensland.
2024	Refurbishment of levels 9 to 23 of the Parliamentary Annexe Tower was completed in May, with restoration of level seven and work on levels five and six to modernise staff workspaces ongoing in 2024–25.
2024	9 September. The Deaf Youth Parliament was held at Queensland Parliament, a first for Queensland and Australia and potentially a world-first event. The entire Youth Parliament was conducted in Auslan (Australian Sign Language).
