An Act about making, managing and accessing public records and continuing the role of the State Archivist and the Office of State Archives, to repeal the *Public Records Act 2002*, and to amend this Act and the legislation mentioned in schedules 4 and 5 for particular purposes

(1)	This section applies if a public authority (an <i>original authority</i>) will cease to exist or has ceased to exist.
(2)	The original authority must give control of any public record of the authority to an entity (the <i>receiving entity</i>) as follows—
	(a) if the original authority is a commission of inquiry under the <i>Commissions of Inquiry Act 1950</i> —the department with responsibility for administering that Act;
	(b) if the function of the original authority to which the public record relates is to be carried out by another public authority—the other public authority;
	(c) otherwise—the archivist or another public authority decided by the archivist.
(3)	However, if the original authority has ceased to exist before control of the public record has been given, the receiving entity must take action to obtain control of the record.
(4)	For subsection (2)(c), the archivist must—

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Part 1 Public records relating to Aboriginal peoples and Torres Strait Islander peoples

- 1The knowledge of Aboriginal peoples and Torres Strait6Islander peoples gained from governing their lands, seas,7waters, air and resources for at least 65,000 years prior to8British colonisation of Queensland is unique and a priceless9asset for Queensland.10
- 2 The nature, volume and content of public records relating to 11 Aboriginal peoples and Torres Strait Islander peoples and 12 their knowledge is different to that of other Queenslanders. 13
- These public records may contain content that is sensitive, 14 inaccurate or offensive and may have been used in the past in 15 a way that disrupted Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander 16 cultural practices and communities.
- 4 These public records should be managed and accessed with 18 care to— 19
 - (i) support Aboriginal peoples and Torres Strait Islander 20 peoples to participate in truth-telling and treaty 21 negotiations; and 22
 - (ii) contribute to reframing the State government's 23
 relationship with Aboriginal peoples and Torres Strait 24
 Islander peoples; and 25
 - (iii) otherwise support revitalisation of culture and 26 reconnecting communities and families. 27

Part 2 Public records generally

5 Public records are important for preserving the history of Queensland.

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- 6 Making and keeping accurate public records is important for ensuring the integrity, accountability and good governance of public authorities.
- 7 Public records should be managed and accessed in a way that 7 protects and promotes human rights, recognising that— 8
 - (i) the public has a right to access information kept by 9 public authorities in public records; and 10
 - (ii) the disclosure of public records should be facilitated in 11 an equitable and consistent way; and 12
 - (iii) the sensitivity of public records declines with the passage of time but it may be contrary to the public 14 interest or otherwise inappropriate to disclose a 15 particular public record due to the sensitivity of 16 information contained in the record.
- 8 Public records should be managed and accessed in a way that 18 promotes economic development, innovation and research. 19
