Firstly, I want to express my appreciation to the people who have put forward the proposed legislative amendments Environmental Protection (Chain of Responsibility) Amendment Bill 2016. This in my opinion has taken some thought and courage in the face of the forces against change.

While it would be better to completely call on moratorium on any further coal mines and unconventional gas wells (due to the unacceptable nature of the pollutants created, damage to water quantity, quality and water tables, atmospheric affects etc) we also as a society need to require by way of such legislation, full responsibility for these environmental consequences.
