Submission to Committee on Vegetation Management (Reinstatement) and Other Legislation Amendment Bill 2016

- By way of introduction, I am writing this independently as a concerned citizen and though I am a registered wildlife carer and vice president of an incorporated organisation on rescue and rehabilitation of native bird species, I do not wish to write this submission on their behalf but will refer my actions to the committee.
- In my submission to support this Bill, I wish to call for all concerned parts of politics who sincerely wish to represent their constituents to carefully consider an important fact. The human race is in danger of making severe mistakes that can harm the community through the greed for an individual objective where vegetation concerns are not considered properly. The history of mankind is documented with events such as the Easter Island loss of its civilisation, the loss of forests in Egypt due to the monuments being built, and Mayan civilisation loss due to deforestation. These events have affected both the climate and the natural resources to the extent that the community is unsustainable.
