I am a current James Cook University 5th year BVSc student and as such will be entering the workforce within the next year. As I intend on working largely within equine industries, I have an extremely vested interest in the fate of the Hendra vaccine.

I feel as though any resistance to this vaccine is either lack of knowledge, naivety or just selfishness. In the current state of vaccination uptake, veterinarians are faced every day with potentially life threatening situations. Even currently as a student, I have found myself in countless situations where I am forced to questions whether helping these animals is worth the risk. Unfortunately our compassion for these creatures mean that we are in a situation where alleviating the suffering does satisfy the risk. The ability to manage such a huge consequence with the simplicity of a single vaccine is a credit to our industry, making it such a disappointment that it is not more widely accepted.
