

Safer Waterways Bill 2017 Surf Life Saving Queensland's Submission

- In relation to crocodile management there is a very good working relationship between SLSQ and QPW personnel in North Queensland
- Community safety is paramount and SLSQ's key focus
- All crocodiles to be removed from beaches and public access waterways. Problem crocodiles to be removed from all other locations
- Problem crocodiles removed from all other locations
- SLSQ continues to support, has input to and delivers the croc wise information to communities and schools throughout Northern Queensland
- Families are frightened to go to the beach in their local areas
- Tourism and visitations effected by the hype and threat of crocodile attacks
- Waterways where the public go to be safe from marine stingers can no longer feel safe in well known natural swimming locations ie Crystal Cascades
- SLSQ Lifeguards/ Lifesavers to be utilised more for croc watch and croc siting reports to key Government Departments
- SLSQ to further develop our State Coordination Centre to capture and disseminate crocodile information similar to shark data
- State Government to work closer with SLSQ to put in place aerial surveillance in Cairns Region
- SLSQ to work with QPWS to ensure appropriate warning signage is in place at popular swimming locations via SLSQ auditing program
- SLSQ can provide further waterways and coastal croc watch surveillance if requested/ required to do so
- State Government to remove crocodile nest eggs in high public visitation/ populated areas, similar to Northern Territory
- Queensland Government to consider the development and opening of a traditional Queensland Indigenous managed crocodile farm centrally located in North Queensland to create and enhance tourism, conservation, holding yard, employment, income and public awareness
- Queensland Government to ensure SLSQ is fully engaged with the croc wise program both locally and at state departmental level – similar to Disaster Management, Marine Safety, QFES and Sport & Rec relationships
