STATISTICS – PERSONS AGED 55 & OVER

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REPORTED VICTIMS OF OFFENCES AGAINST THE PERSON

Since June 2011 persons aged 55 & over represent 24% of all persons which has increased one percentage point to 25% in 2013-2014. Over this period Queensland has averaged one percentage point lower than the national average for this age group.

The broad offence group of offences against the person is comprised of several different offence categories, such as homicide, assault, sexual offences with the volume of reported offences differing significantly across these categories. Victims aged 55 & over in Queensland for offences against the person (1,550 persons) represented 5% of total victims of this offence group in 2011-12. This proportion was increased to 7% of the offence against the person (1,479 persons) for the first 10 months of the 2014-15 period. On average approximately 2 out 3 victims aged 55 & over were male. Regardless of the victim age offences against the person on average slightly over three quarters (76%) of total offences are cleared (resolved) within the same time period as reported to police.

The number of homicide (murder) offences in Queensland for victims aged 55 & over in 2011-12 were 9% (4 victims) of total homicide (murder) offence victims. Currently, there are 8% (4 victims) of total homicide (murder) victims aged 55 & over in Queensland for the July 2014 to April 2015 period.

Overall, there were 1,215 victims or 6% of total victims for assault aged 55 & over in Queensland in 2011-12 which increased to 1,262 victims or 7% of total assault victims in 2013-14. Currently, there are 1,151 victims or 8% of total assaults victims aged 55 & over in Queensland for the period July 2014 to April 2015. On average approximately 2 out 3 victims aged 55 & over were male.

In 2011-12 there were 94 victims of robbery or 8% of total victims for robbery aged 55 & over in Queensland which increased to 104 victims or 10% of total victims for robbery in 2013-14. Currently, there are 85 victims of robbery or 11% of total robbery victims aged 55 & over in Queensland for the first 10 months of the 2014-15 period.

REPORTED VICITMS ASSOCIATED WITH SELECTED OFFENCES AGAINST PROPERTY

Queensland Police Service collects and collates crime statistics based on the guidelines published by the Australian Bureau of Statistics. The national counting rules is that for each victim within a distinct criminal incident, the most serious offence is counted. A victim base rule applies and the description of a victim varies according to the type of offence. A victim may be an individual person, an organisation, a place/premises, motor vehicle or property. In the case of fraud the number of transactions are counted.

The number of victims of unlawful entry with intent dwelling and fraud the victims not extracted based on the national guidelines. It should be noted that the number of victims does not correlate to the number of offences for these offences as there maybe multiple victims associated to the offence. The following figures should be regarded as an estimate of victims only.

In 2011-12 victims aged 55 & over represented 24% (7,932 persons) of all victims associated with unlawful entry with intent dwelling which as increased 1 percentage points to 25% (7,441 persons) in

2013-14. This proportion was increased to 27% of the unlawful entry with intent dwelling (19,965 persons) for the first 10 months of the 2014-15 period. There was no difference in the victimisation between males and females. Regardless of the victim age unlawful entry with intent dwelling on average 20% of total offences are cleared (resolved) within the same time period as reported to police.

The fraud offence group of offences against property is comprised of several different offence categories, such as fraud by computer fraud by cheque, identity fraud and other fraud. Overall, there were 576 victims or 21% of total victims associated with fraud offences aged 55 & over in Queensland in 2011-12 which increased to 853 victims or 20% of total assault victims in 2013-14. Currently, there are 808 victims or 19% of total fraud victims aged 55 & over in Queensland for the period July 2014 to April 2015. On average approximately 56% of victims aged 55 & over were male. Regardless of the victim age fraud offence on average slight less than two-thirds (62%) of total offences are cleared within the same time period as reported to police.

Overall, there were 54 victims or 14% of total victims for fraud by computer aged 55 & over in Queensland in 2011-12 which increased to 85 victims or 15% of total fraud by computer victims in 2013-14. Currently, there are 75 victims or 22% of total fraud by computer victims aged 55 & over in Queensland for the period July 2014 to April 2015. On average approximately 6 out 10 victims aged 55 & over were male.

The number of victims aged 55 & over for identity fraud in Queensland in 2011-12 were 12% (35 victims) of identity fraud victims. Currently, there are 14% (45 victims) of total identity fraud victims aged 55 & over in Queensland for the first 10 months of the 2014-15 period.

REPORTED OFFENDERS

Since June 2011 persons aged 55 & over represent 28% of persons aged 10 & over which has increased one percentage point to 29% in 2014. Over this period Queensland has averaged one percentage point lower than the national average for this age group.

Overall, there were 5,825 offenders or 2% of total offenders by offence type aged 55 & over in Queensland in 2011-12 which increased to 7,538 offenders or 3% of total offenders in 2013-14. Currently, there are 7,010 offenders or 3% of total offenders by offence type aged 55 & over in Queensland for the July 2014 to April 2015 period. On average approximately 8 out 10 offenders aged 55 & over were male.

Offenders aged 55 & over in Queensland for offences against the person (667 offenders) represented 4% of total offenders of this offence group in 2011-12. This proportion was increased to 5% of the offence against the person (766 offenders) for the first 10 months of the 2014-15 period.

Offence against property comprises of several broad offence categories, such as unlawful entry, arson, and fraud with the volume of reported offences differing significantly across these categories. In 2011-12 the proportion of persons aged 55 and over represented 1% (928 offenders) of total offenders for offences against property. The proportion of these offenders has increased by one percentage point to 2% (1,182 offenders) in 2014-15 (July 2014 to April 2015).

The offence category of other offences differs from both offences against person and property in that these offences are generally detected by police rather than reported to police by members of the community. Thus, a change in the number of offences can be influenced by shifting levels of police activities in response to identified problems and issues in local communities. Offenders aged 55 & over in Queensland represented 3% (4,220 offenders) of total offenders of this offence group in 2011-12. There has been no increase in the proportion of 55 & over offenders since 2011-12. In the first 10 months of the 2014-15 period there were 5,052 offenders aged 55 & over.

PERSONAL FRAUD, AUSTRALIA SURVEYS

The Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) conducted its second personal fraud survey throughout Australia from July 2010 to June 2011. The survey results were published on 19 April 2012 in 4528.0 Personal Fraud, 2010-2011. The persons surveyed by the ABS were aged 15 years & over and were asked about their experiences of personal fraud. Person fraud defined by the ABS included credit card fraud, identify theft and scams. This survey estimated that Australians lost 1.4 billion due to personal fraud and that 3 out of 5 victims of personal fraud (713,600 persons) lost on average \$2,000 per victim during 2010-11 period. Approximately 7% of the Australian population aged 15 & over were a victim of at least one incident of personal fraud in the 12 months.

There was no statistical significance in the victimisation rate for identify fraud between males (3.8%) and females (4.1%). When comparing the victimisation rate by age categories, persons aged 15 to 24 (2.2% or 67,700 persons) were least victimised followed by persons aged 55 & over (3.1% or 167,500 persons).

Survey results indicated that there was no statistically significant victimisation rate for credit or bankcard fraud between males (3.7%) and females (3.8%). When comparing the victimisation rate by age categories, persons aged 15 to 24 (2.0% or 61,000 persons) were least victimised followed by persons aged 55 & over (3.0% or 162,200 persons). Only 11% of persons victimised for credit or bankcard fraud in the 12 months prior to interview reported it to police. Approximately, two-thirds of persons victimised for credit or bankcard fraud reported it to their bank, financial institution or credit card company.

Nationally the scam exposure rate is 35.8% of persons aged 15 years & over compared to 36.8% for Queensland. There was no statistically significant in the victimisation rate for scams between males and females. The largest exposer rate type of scams were lotteries (22.2% of persons aged 15 & over).

In 2010-11 there were 5,406,700 persons aged 55 & over exposed to scams. Some of the types of scams these persons were exposed to were lottery scams (19.4%), bank or financial institution (13.8%), chain letters (8.6%), established business (10.0%), request/send bank or financial details to another person's (9.9%) and pyramid schemes (4.9%). Approximately 1 in 3 persons aged 55 & over were exposed to at least one scam in the 12 months.

The ABS' Crime Victimisation survey 2014-15 is currently being conducted and includes an additional module for personal fraud covering credit card fraud, identity fraud and scams. The survey results from

the 2014-15 survey is initially scheduled to be released in February 2016 for the core content and later in the year for the personal fraud module .

AUSTRALIAN CYBERCRIME ONLINE REPORTING NETWORK (ACORN)

ACORN is a national policing initiative of the Commonwealth, State and Territory governments to allow the public to securely report instances of cybercrime. The ACORN website is designed to make it easier for victims to report cybercrime and to help government agencies better understand how cybercrime is affecting Australians.

Not all reported cybercrime are directed to policing agencies for investigation, but are used to develop a clearer picture of trends that affect Australian. The reports that are directed to the fraud area of police agencies to be assessed and investigated. In Queensland the Fraud Crime Group process these reports.

The first quarterly report from ACORN is for the period January to March 2015. During this period there has been 9,680 reports made to ACORN. Of these reports 22% relate to Queensland and 17% of the victims were 60 & over. The top three cybercrimes recorded were scams or frauds (49%), purchase or sale (24%) and cyber bullying (7%).

The top three targets of cyber criminals were e-mail, social networks, and website advertising.

SUDDEN DEATH - SUICIDES

In 2013-14 there were 162 suspected suicides aged 55 & over reported by Queensland Police (subject to Coronial Investigations) in Queensland which has increase by 7% to 173 suspected suicides in 2013-14. For the period the July 2014 to April 2015, there have been 149 reported suspected suicides.

When comparing the percentage of those aged 55 & over to the total number of suspected suicides, there was a 1 percentage point decrease for the 2013-14 period compared to 2012-13, from 28% to 27%. For the first 10 months of the 2014-15 financial year, this figure is 26%, indicating a very slight decline over the past three financial years in the percentage of those aged 55 & over who are suspected of committing suicide.
