Thank you for the opportunity to review the Queensland Community Safety Bill 2024, and to provide feedback on behalf of the Queensland Family and Child Commission (QFCC). Community safety is everybody's business and the QFCC acknowledges the Bill's intention to strengthen existing legislation to support this endeavour.

The QFCC has made a number of submissions and provided advice to Government and Parliament on youth justice over the last 12 months and our position regarding the need for evidence based, restorative justice practices and policies that address the root-causes of offending remains clear.

Appreciating the matters referenced in the Bill as it relates to firearm regulation, responses to domestic and family violence, changes to penalties for specific high harm offences, and youth justice responses for children in detention, I have attached references to our previous policy submissions and relevant QFCC publications.

I also point to the recommendations of the Child Death Review Board in the 2022-23 Annual Report regarding the need to reappraise the response to youth crime and the purpose of youth detention.


