RE: Submission to STOP an Extension to the Emergency Bill to 31st October 2022 in the State of Queensland

I, Kim Louise Hocking, of 42 Plant Street Rangeville, citizen of Queensland Australia, do hereby state that I DO NOT want an extension to the Emergency Bill to 31ST October 2022.

The current state of emergency must STOP as soon as possible due to the ineffectiveness of all Covid mandates, exaggeration of Covid data, unlawful loss of jobs, staff shortages, segregation in society and total mistrust of government in Australia.

I personally have been affected in that I have been unable to continue working in my trained profession as a primary school teacher.
