RE: Public Health and Other Legislation (Extension of Expiring Provisions) Amendment Bill 2022 Submission Regarding the matter under enquiry, as stated in BOLD above, I urge you to STOP this extension of this Bill and cease immediately or not later than the scheduled date of 30 April 2022. There is no need to increase powers for emergency officers and the Chief Health Officer regarding the spread of COVID-19 in Queensland, nor support testing and quarantine requirements nor authorise other public health measures. This is due to the fact that we no longer have a state of emergency, and this is adversely affecting local businesses, families and government staff, such as teachers, police, nurses and the Queensland economy.
