I am writing to express strong opposition to the planned extension to the Emergency Bill in Queensland.

The citizens of Queensland should be able to make personal medical decisions of their own free will not under coercion, the threat of losing their jobs, being banned from seeing loved ones and participating in society.

The fear and division that has been promoted by the Government and the media for a disease that has a very high survival rate is deplorable. Decisions seem to have been made without due process and have been far from logical. (For example: banning people entering the state to visit dying relatives but allowing football players to enter. People, being allowed to eat in shopping centre food courts but not cafes. Insisting people wear masks when it was acknowledged at the start that they would not make any difference. The traffic jams caused around the Mt Gravatt showgrounds by panicked, scared people queuing for hours to get tested following daily press conference scare tactics. The push for children to be vaccinated when they are not at any great risk if they catch the disease and the fact that the vaccine does not prevent transmission.)

The government has not once promoted health measures such as diet and lifestyle that can help protect against illness and has ignored/banned preventative treatments which are being successfully used in other countries.

It is heartbreaking to read first hand accounts of people who are experiencing adverse reactions from a trial drug that has not been properly tested. The common thread seems to be that doctors have no idea how to treat people because they have not seen anything like it before and/or victims of vaccine injury are subject to gaslighting from the medical establishment. The recent release of documents from Pfizer with an eight page plus list of known adverse reactions indicates there will be increased strain on the already struggling health system.

Other countries are already dropping their mandates and there is absolutely no reason for Queensland not to do the same.

The Extension of the Emergency Bill is government overreach and should not be passed.
