I am writing this letter regarding the bill being put forward to parliament to extend the current Public Health and another Legislation bill to October 31, 2022. I am strongly opposed to the extension of this bill and the powers it affords to the Chief Health Officer.

As we enter into the third year of this pandemic, it is clear Covid is no longer an emergency. Queensland has already experienced our expected peak and has come through with minimal impacts to the general public's health directly related to the Covid-19 virus. However, the effects of these mandates, restrictions and unlawful actions implemented by the orders of the public health act have had a tremendously detrimental impact on our society.
