Submission related to: **Public Health and Other Legislation (Extension of Expiring Provisions) Amendment Bill 2022.**

I, Ms Alana Beryl Gregor, of [REDACTED], Queensland do not support the proposed amendment bill extending the dates in the Public Health and Other Legislation (Extension of Expiring Provisions) Amendment Bill 2022. My submission is rushed due to time restraints however a summary of my reasons are as follows:

- The serious question as to safety and efficacy of the vaccines;
 - The coercive economic sanctions for vaccination;
 - The Emergency Powers Act was passed urgently in an emergency period, resulting in extensive powers being granted to the executive government, largely without the usual checks and balances provided by administrative and judicial review.
- Vaccination rates across Queensland are now high and a large percentage of Queenslanders has either been vaccinated or has natural immunity by contracting Covid 19. The use of the Emergency Powers Act infringes on basic human rights and constitutional rights.
- It is evident that for most people, the risk of death from Covid-19 is very low.
 - As with all public health measures, focused protection (for example for elderly people or people with major underlying health issues) should be voluntary and based on the informed consent of the individual. (The Siracusa Principles)
 - After two years of excessive Government control through lockdowns, border closures, mask wearing, physical distancing and other mandates Queenslanders have been adequately trained to deal with covid-19 and safety. The data shows that there is no longer a public health emergency. Accordingly, it is unnecessary to continue the control measures as proposed by the amendments.
