There seems to be a push by caravan park owners to pack us into their parks or move us on, as is the case with Port Douglas.

We were staying out of town in Port Douglas and woken late at night and told that we would be fined if we did not move on. I had tried to get into the 2 caravan parks but neither was available. One did not take dogs and there was some other problem with the other, so we headed North West. The following day we struck a group of about 20 campers parked on a large grassed open area, all refugees of Port Douglas Council attitude.

We were delighted when we travelled through Western Queensland when we were offered free camping in Winton behind the pub. I think that at Longreach there was a huge parking area just outside the town and there must have been some 50 vehicles there. We spent a few days there going into and out of town.

We travelled for over 2 years and Tasmania with it's welcoming facilities for motorhomes enabled us to spend 3 months there.

Port Lincoln in SA has a huge boat launch parking area which is just out of town an mostly empty.... we spent 2 weeks there, mainly parking at night after visiting Coffin Bay and many surrounding areas.

A lot of travellers in vans do not need the expense of swimming pools and all the bizarre facilities that can be found in some caravan parks. We just need a place to spend a day or two, where we can get into town and shop, fill up with fuel, sight see and move on.


