56D Objective—reporting (1) The chief executive is to, within 6 months before the start of each school year (the relevant school year) for State schools, give the Minister a report that includes the following information for each State school— (a) the number of students enrolled at the school for the previous school year; (b) the number of students expected to be enrolled at the school in the relevant school year, based on relevant data; (c) the cost of, or if the cost can not be accurately calculated a reasonable estimate of the cost of, providing the following for each student mentioned in paragraph (b) for the relevant school year— (i) the individual student resources to be given to each student;
