He left school terrified to read because of the pressure put on him by his teacher(s) and the competitive charts to pit him against his classmates. After a few months he was able to read a full book all by himself as the pressure to 'succeed' and 'be like everyone else' was lifted.

It is worth noting that, upon initially examining the current Queensland curriculum, we found that it did not align with our educational philosophy. Within a few weeks of attempting to follow it, we realised that the high-quality learning experiences we could provide at home far surpassed what was being offered within the confines of a traditional curriculum. There are so many resources from all parts of the world that we are able to use as part of our learning and education, I feel limiting ourselves to only the Australian curriculum we would be doing our children and injustice in providing a 'high

quality education'. We are able to really focus on areas the children struggle with and build up their skills. In a classroom setting they were being left behind because they were taking a little longer to master a skill.

Through homeschooling, my children are not only acquiring academic knowledge but also developing essential life skills and values that are essential for success in the real world. My children know how to talk to people in all walks of life, in many different jobs and positions. They know how our banking and tax system work, being able to set budgets for themselves and also help with the family budget in smaller ways. They are able to cook meals and bake. I feel none of these things are taught in classrooms (I know I didn't learn any of that at school). They are learning how to think critically, communicate effectively, and adapt to new situations—all skills that will serve them well beyond the confines of a classroom.

Moreover, homeschooling allows my children to actively participate in the world around them, gaining practical experience and insight that simply cannot be replicated in a traditional school setting.
