Rather than seeing children fail, homeschooling offers a lifeline—a chance for children to thrive in environments that nurture their individuality and potential. In school both my children were withdrawn and falling behind due to a speech disorder and anxiety. At home they are flourishing, exceeding academic standards, working towards real life passion projects, engaging in the community and becoming confident, articulate, kind and compassionate young people.

I ask that you provide evidence that the proposed legislation is in the best interest of the homeschooling community and evidence that you have that the current model of registration, reporting and legislation for homeschoolers is inadequate?

I implore you to take the time to speak directly with homeschooling families in the community (not just a carefully selected group who do not actually represent us) and listen to our insights and experiences. By understanding the diverse motivations and approaches within the homeschooling community, we can work together to create policies that

support children's individual learning needs and ensure that every child has high quality education and the opportunity to succeed.
