We don't approve of the proposed legislation changes to the homeschooling in Qld. We primarily don't want to plan or report to the national curriculum, we don't want to "demonstrate progress" in all subjects every year, and we don't agree to the guiding principle that homeschooling must be proven to be in the best interests of our child. (because it is not clear who determines this or how!)

We have homeschooled our son who is now 17 years old for a total of 6 years. We decided to homeschool him because we had observed his gradual disengagement and loss of interested in learning at school. Through our homeschooling years we focused on our son's interests and strengths while always providing an opportunity for trying new subjects. After 6 years of homeschooling our then 15 years old son decided to return to school to complete A-levels in Physics, Maths and English.
