## Dear Committee Members,

I strongly agree that every child deserves access to a high-quality education and express my reservations regarding the adequacy of the Australian Curriculum in fulfilling this fundamental right. I would also like to point out and also ask the question, why does QLD have no official state homeschooling association? If you are considering all children in this new proposal, why are you not consulting with

homeschool families and why are we not being represented?

From our own experiences, we found the Australian Curriculum out of date and in need of an overhaul to better suit the current times.
