I would like to voice my disappointment at the processes that have taken place in the State Government's handling of the Ipswich City Council. After following the story over the past months and having long term interactions with a number of our local counsellors, I absolutely agree that there needs to be transparency and the highest levels of scrutiny over their actions. However from looking at the charges relating to our mayor and the way he was going about making changes and improvements. I fear that you are taking out the very person who was putting processes in place that you are after! The reports that are coming out with issues around mishandling of funds, were reports that Ipswich City Council asked to have done. For me, this means that they were in the process of finding problems and fixing them, not in the midst of disaster.

Unless you are willing to put your jobs in the hands of the federal government for them to sack you at a moments notice, I don't believe it is right for you to be able to sack a local government in the same way. They are elected into their positions by the people of the city and we should be the people to remove them, just as we honour and respect the state of Queensland when your positions are voted in. This will no doubt cost the city dearly, in the wisdom and experience of the elected counsellors as well as the financial impact that I am unsure who will cover? (State or local?)

I hope that you will consider the implications of the changes to the law that you are about to enact and humbly consider the people you are affecting through this.
