Dear Committee Secretary,

Re: Submission on Brisbane Olympic and Paralympic Games Arrangements Amendment Bill 2024

The Planning Institute of Australia (**PIA**) is the national body representing the planning profession, and planning more broadly, championing the role of good planning in shaping Australia's future. PIA facilitates this through strong leadership, advocacy and contemporary planning education.

PIA, together with the Australian Institute of Architects (AIA), Australian Institute of Landscape Architects (AILA), and Design Institute of Australia (DIA) have joined forces to make this combined submission for your consideration.

As a consortium of the top four architecture, landscape, planning and design institutes, representing 26,000 professionals nationally, we are calling for the establishment of a Design Coordination Unit for the Olympic and Paralympic Games and to secure long-lasting benefits for the community.

The Design Coordination Unit would be responsible for coordinating and integrating design and place outcomes for the Brisbane 2032 Games. The Unit would utilise the existing Queensland Government's Design and Urban Places Panel for advice and collaboration. It would also work closely with all Games Partners including the State Government, local governments and the independent Games Venue and Legacy Delivery Authority.

The Design Coordination Unit is recommended to be established within the office of the Queensland Government Architect, like that used by the highly successful Sydney 2000 Olympics headed up by the NSW Government Architect at that time.

The consortium has launched **Green Pathways Gold Places advocacy document** (<u>attached</u>) which calls on the Queensland Government to action four priorities for the benefit of the Games and its legacy for South East Queensland.

PIA makes the following recommendations to the Housing, Big Build and Manufacturing Committee:

- The establishment of a 2032 Design Coordination Unit within the Office of the Queensland Government Architect
- A 2032 Green Grid that supports an urban Olympic Forest in South East Queensland
- A precinct-based approach to venue design and planning in collaboration with the Games Partners.
- The development of place funding models for the Games Budget which ensures design and place outcomes are recognised as strategic investments, not costs.

Professional architects, landscape architects, planners, and designers are ready to contribute their vast expertise to make Brisbane 2032 a success.

We look forward to the opportunity to appear before the committee to further detail our positions.



BACKGROUND

- The Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games are being hosted across multiple venues and sites in SEQ and Queensland, rather than the traditional approach of a consolidated Olympics village or precinct. For Brisbane 2032, it is recognised that the city (or rather cities) is the venue.
- Design and planning are key to unlocking wider community and city benefits from the significant investments made in the 2032 Brisbane Games.
- Good design helps minimize cost escalation, empowers the voices of First Nations peoples, and ensures social licence is created. Design and planning delivers on the promise of wider City legacy benefits of Games investment and therefore maintain the much needed public enthusiasm and support over the next 8 years.
- Good design of the in-between spaces and wider precincts delivers significant experiential benefits to spectators, athletes, and media during the weeks of the Games, as well as delivering long lasting legacy benefits for residents and visitors to Brisbane, SEQ and Queensland well into the future.
- City legacy which enhances everyone's access to social and economic opportunity through connected, high quality public spaces is a key benefit to be delivered upon. Spreading the health and well-being benefits of the Games to all by making more walkable, ecologically healthy cities is another.
- Although individual projects are expected to feature high quality design outcomes, the
 visitor experience will also rely on quality urban design outcomes across the precincts
 and in the connections between them.
- There is a genuine need to apply design-led thinking to key challenges such as pedestrian connectivity, accessibility and wider placemaking opportunities to deliver on the vision and Games legacy.


1. THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A 2032

DESIGN COORDINATION UNIT WITHIN THE

THE OFFICE OF THE QUEENSLAND

GOVERNMENT ARCHITECT.

- This multi-disciplinary unit would be responsible for coordinating and integrating design and place outcomes for the Brisbane 2032 Games, working collaboratively and closely with Games partners and the independent authority.
- This unit would focus on supporting overall design quality (through design guides and best practice initiatives) and achieving integrated outcomes that "join up" individual projects in support of a unified approach to places and spaces, ensuring connectivity and accessibility for all.
- It would not replace or replicate the role of existing entities, but would bolster the design leadership and help facilitate much needed project integration. This would assist the delivery of visionary planning and aid working collaboratively with local governments and the private sector.





2. A 2032 GREEN GRID THAT SUPPORTS

AN URBAN OLYMPIC FOREST

IN SOUTH EAST QUEENSLAND

- A Green Grid would develop and deliver a strategic network of open space and public realm for the region, expanding and enhancing parks, creeks, greenspace, footpaths and cycle ways.
- This would support recreation, biodiversity and waterway health for the region, and provide a lasting legacy for all Queenslanders by providing an integrated network that combines into our own Olympic Forest.
- The Green Grid should also be underpinned by Movement and Place principles, ensuring green connections between key Games venues and other centres and destinations.
- Planning and developing the Green Grid collaboratively with local governments and utility providers will ensure we have an iconic and beneficial tree canopy for 2032 and beyond.
- A Green Grid would deliver substantial health and wellbeing benefits for the community and visitors through improved active transport connections which foster increased physical activity.

3. A PRECINCT-BASED APPROACH TO

VENUE DESIGN AND PLANNING

IN COLLABORATION WITH

THE GAMES PARTNERS.

- This would involve integrating venue design within the physical, cultural and environmental fabric of the broader place, precinct, suburb in which it is situated.
- This also means ensuring future planned growth within the precinct to 2042 is contemplated in the planning for the Games, to align with the Legacy time-horizon and aspirations.
- Applying a true partnership approach, where each level and area of government fulfils their role and works together will deliver precinct-wide benefits and create vibrant and functional communities.
- Each precinct based venue will have a wider state and place benefit. These would range from major to minor and would be commensurate with the size of the venue.





4. THE DEVELOPMENT OF PLACE-

FUNDING MODELS FOR THE BRISBANE

2032 GAMES BUDGET WHICH ENSURES

DESIGN AND PLACE OUTCOMES ARE

RECOGNISED AS STRATEGIC

INVESTMENTS, NOT COSTS.

- Place-funding models could better recognise the importance of investing in good design and place that nevertheless provide significant social and environmental dividends for the community when it comes to infrastructure and venues.
- By leveraging the boost in development interest and potential, we can harness the additional capital and ensure a more equitable place-based distribution of long-term community assets.
- The independent authority should be required to deliver on measurable place value and design outcomes, particularly in locations where Games infrastructure is being delivered.
