I believe that the universal laws of creation continue to exist, regardless of religious, custom, traditional, scientific, atheist or agnostic beliefs that people have had and continue to have regarding abortion. Has anyone ever wondered about what happens to an 'aborted foetus or infant' on a **spiritual** level, not to mention the **physical and emotional pain** caused to the child and **to everyone else** involved, at a **sub-conscious** level? Upon **conception** of the physical, a **soul** and **spiritual body** are also connected. The developing foetus experiences emotions and feelings relating to its environment.
