TERMINATION OF PREGNANCY BILL 2018 Submission to the Committee 05 September 2018

Dear Committee Members,

I wish to submit the following for your consideration as you contemplate and investigate the above mentioned Bill currently before you.

It is assumed and expected that as members of this committee, you would bring to the table, a fair and unbiased view of the bill and be open to all submissions regardless of which viewpoint they take.

With this in mind, I humbly present the following for your consideration.

Positional Statement: I wish to declare my strong opposition to the Termination of Pregnancy Bill 2018 as tabled in Queensland State Parliament on 22 August 2018.

Reasons for my opposition to the Bill

1. On reading the Bill, I find that there are many points, which unlike the intention of the bill, are not promoting the best interest of women but are in fact denying basic rights to women. There is no provision in the bill as presented to allow for a woman to have a 'cooling off period' between first making an appointment and the actual procedure to terminate a pregnancy. Women seeking abortions in many cases are under extreme pressure from often many sources, including, partners, family, financial constraints, to list just a few. This opens up the real possibility for the woman to be subject to possible unhealthy pressure to proceed with a termination, which on reflection she may wish to reconsider. (Even with many other important and life-changing events, a cooling off period is recommended by astute advisors and government agencies and in some circumstances this is legislated. Why are woman not being given this right?) Queensland's laws at present regarding termination of pregnancy, if extended to include the provisions of the 2018 Bill will give even extended time for women to be under pressures from partners, family, etc. whereas now there is a definite legal 'cut-off' point when this pressure can no longer be applied because the baby has already passed the dates for abortion being legally performed. This cut off date stops many men from continuing this pressure as they know that an abortion will no longer be able to be performed. It is so 'anti-women' to allow this time of pressure to be extended. There is also no provision in the Bill for post abortion counselling and support to happen. Women are left on their own to cope after such a traumatic and invasive procedure. This is so wrong to these women who need support.

Further, the Bill allows for sex selection to be allowed as a reason for termination of a pregnancy. This is an obvious attack on the rights of girls who form the bulk of abortions in other jurisdictions where sex-

selection is allowed as a reason for a woman or couple to choose termination. (You Gov Galaxy poll in August 2018, only 8% of Queenslanders support sex-selective abortion, including 5% of women, with 83% opposed.)

As well, this Bill allows for a doctor, to be able to perform a termination on a woman after 22 weeks if another doctor is also in agreement regardless of the reasons why the woman or couple are requesting an abortion. What kind of safeguard is this, since the second doctor is not even required to see the woman?

There is no allowance in this Bill for the woman to be encouraged to have independent, private and free counselling after first consulting a doctor willing to perform a termination. With such life-changing decisions, and being aware of the enormous pressure some woman will be under, it is inconceivable to contemplate that in a society such as a modern Queensland, that this 'right' is not afforded to woman!

It is extremely discouraging and disappointing, that this type of Bill is being promoted by those who whilst outwardly promoting women's rights, and anti-domestic violence and bullying are presenting a Bill that; (a) denies those very women the right to this type of counselling, (b) allows sex-selection which will inevitably disadvantage more females, and (3) which does not insist that a second doctor actually meeting with the patient. This Bill, to me, is more 'anti-woman than it is 'pro-woman'.

Although it is not your concern as members of this committee, I wish to state that this has drastically changed my opinions and my voting intentions both in Queensland and on the National stage. I could not, and will not, vote for any individual who promotes this Bill regardless of their political allegiances.

2. Further to the above, I note that the latest Galaxy poll taken in August 2018 clearly indicates that Queensland voters are not in agreement with this Bill. (Please see attached sheet.). This is enough to make a committee such as yours take note. The political apparatus on all sides of the political divide would do well to note this fact also.

3. The Bill also does not allow for the protection of the lives of babies who survive a termination. What happens to these babies? Does the mother than have to be confronted with this unthinkable situation and does she then have choices or is this choice taken out of her hands. One can only feel immense compassion and despair for woman thrust into this situation.

4. This Bill presents a direct attack on the religious freedoms of some hospitals and individual doctors, nursing staff and ancillary workers who believe it is wrong to perform a termination based on religious convictions and who equally believe it is wrong to be forced to refer a client to another doctor who **would** perform the procedure. This is totally inconsistent to 'freedom of religious beliefs' and religious tolerance of which Australia so proudly boasts. I hold these ideals as essential to a well-functioning society.

5. I find that the bill is flawed in other areas as well. By its lack of defining clearly its terms to the reader, it makes the bill itself, not able to be properly understood by the reader, making assumptions that the reader will understand these terms. I refer to the following as examples actually cited in the bill. This level of 'poor' writing' is unsatisfactory!

Definition of Terms as outlined in the Bill

- (a) Termination: "termination means the intentional termination of the pregnancy, in any way, including, for example by (a) administering a drug; or (b) using an instrument or other thing." What kind of instrument is being referred to, and what is 'or other thing' referring to? One can only imagine as this is not defined in the bill! One can only wonder why this is not defined! *Perhaps* the public would be horrified to learn what this means.
- (b) **Termination Drug**: 'means a drug of a kind used to cause a termination.' What kind of drug? What are its immediate effects on the fetus and the woman undergoing the procedure? How are these drugs to be administered?
- (c) **Woman** 'means a female person of any age.' Are there no age restrictions? What regard is given to any parental input to a minor requesting a termination?
- (d) **Emergency situations for abortions** No definition is given to what constitutes an 'emergency' and thus this 'loophole' could be used to force doctors, nurses and other staff to participate in any abortion.
- (e) **The term 'unborn child' is referred to in the notes accompanying the bill -** Is this term referring to the fact that the fetus is actually a living child, who is yet to be born? If so, at what point is this 'life' defined as beginning and at what point is this life referred to as a 'unborn child'.

These are questions not addressed in the bill, but questions that are vital to the credibility of the bill.

As an educated person and member of the voting public, these definitions are not sufficient to give the general populace a clear picture of (a) what these drugs and 'instruments' are and (b) what their effects on the **'unborn child'** are at the point of use before the unborn child is deceased. Is there a level of pain caused to the 'unborn child'? What level of pain is experienced? What is the length of this pain? and What are the results of this pain? Modern medical knowledge is clear as to noting when pain is detected by the fetus, yet this Bill will allow for this pain to be allowed!

6. This Bill goes far beyond what most people are being made aware of. The bulk of the Bill's content refers to matters other than the **decriminalization** of the termination of pregnancy itself. Many of the aspects refer to the **criminalization** of various forms of opposition to abortion. Very little attention seems to be focused on the **woman's health**. I am not commenting on, at this stage, whether or not these are valid issues, but to the general public, it would seem that the bill, as talked about in parliament this past fortnight when it was first introduced by its advocates, is essentially about '**protecting the rights'** of the woman by not allowing a woman who receives an abortion in Queensland to be prosecuted. (Prosecutions for abortions already are not proceeded with in Queensland even though the potential for such is on the statutes.

The bill is far, far more than this as stated in the description of the bill below **quoted directly** from the Bill, **and the general public need to be more fully informed about this**. The lack of consultation, the lack of time for people to be informed about and digest the implication of this Bill is most alarming considering the magnitude of this issue.

"The primary objective of the Bill, as outlined in the explanatory notes, is that the termination of pregnancy should be treated as a **health issue**, not a **criminal matter**. The Bill proposes to provide for:

- the removal of the termination of pregnancy laws from the Queensland Criminal Code by repealing sections 224, 225 and 226
- a woman who consents to, assists in, or performs a termination on herself does not commit an offence, and
- the creation of a new offence, punishable by up to seven years' imprisonment, for unqualified persons who perform, or assist in performing, a termination."

7. There is no mention in the Bill, nor recognition of the 'rights' of the partner' and the pain and distress that **some** men experience through a termination of pregnancy. No counselling, before or after a termination is offered to men. This is an appalling state as many men are also **'hurt by abortion'** and many are left with no support even though they are fully supportive of their partner. This blatant discrimination is not addressed in this Bill?

In summation, I shall list in point form, some relevant questions and my position on each point.

- Should lawful termination of abortions on request be allowed up to 22 weeks? No
- Should lawful terminations be allowed with the consent of two doctors past 22 weeks? No
- Should medical personnel be required to perform or be part of terminations past 22 weeks in emergency situations No as there is no definition of what these 'emergency' situations are and so this could be used as a 'loophole' to allow abortions in any and every situation.
- Should unqualified persons be prosecuted for performing abortions? Yes

I humbly implore you to think long and hard about this Bill before any recommendations to the people and parliament of our wonderful state are made.



Executive Summary

A report on a comprehensive independent market research survey conducted by YouGov Galaxy, commissioned by Cherish Life Queensland and the Australian Family Association. This online opinion poll of a representative sample of 1,000 Queensland voters was conducted from 6 to 8 August 2018, with 21 questions in total.

Methodology

This study was conducted online among a representative sample of voters in Queensland from Tuesday, 6 August to Thursday, 8 August, 2018.

The sample comprises 1,000 respondents, distributed throughout Queensland including Brisbane, regional and rural areas.

YouGov Galaxy designed the questionnaire, a copy of which has been included in this report.

The questionnaire was transferred into Web Survey Creator in order to be hosted online. For each question the respondent had to click on the response which represented his or her answer.

Following the completion of interviewing, the data was weighted by age, gender and region to reflect the latest ABS population estimates.




Key Findings




Definition of human life

Q2. Abortion is an operation or procedure which involves termination of an unwanted or difficult pregnancy, preventing birth of a live baby. Do you believe abortion involves the taking of a human life?



Half of the voters in Queensland agree abortion involves the taking of a human life (50%), while a little over one-third (36%) disagree with this premise. It is of interest to note that while 40% of males disagree, only 33% of females do.






A sizeable majority of Queensland voters (62%) believe that an unborn child at 23 weeks of pregnancy is a person with human rights. 69% of females agree, compared with 54% of males. Almost one-quarter (24%) of voters disagree.

Risks to women


Q4. Do you believe that abortion can harm the physical and/or mental health of a woman?




It is widely accepted that abortion can harm the mental and physical health of a woman (75%). More females (79%) believe this than males (71%).

Circumstances surrounding abortion

Q5. One factor that can be involved in a woman's decision to have an abortion is pressure from another person such as a partner. Do you personally know anyone who had an abortion where you believe that pressure from another person was a significant factor in their decision to have the abortion?




One in four Queensland voters (26%) know at least one woman that took the decision to have an abortion following pressure from another person.



Q6. Up to what stage of pregnancy would you allow abortion?


Most voters in Queensland (60%) would not allow abortion after 13 weeks. 66% of females and 54% of males take this view This group includes 21% of voters who are opposed to abortion at any time. 76% of Queenslanders oppose abortion after 23 weeks of pregnancy, comprising 81% of females and 70% of males. Only 6% support abortion up to birth, comprising 10% of males and 3% of females.

Q7. There is substantial medical evidence that an unborn baby may be capable of experiencing pain during an abortion procedure after 22 weeks of pregnancy. Should the law require that pain relief be given to the baby before an abortion after 22 weeks of pregnancy?



Most voters in Queensland (60%) agree that pain relief should be given to an unborn baby prior to an abortion after 22 weeks. 63% of women agree, as do 57% of men. Only 11% of voters disagree.


Q8. If a baby survives a late-term abortion after 23 weeks of pregnancy (the point at which there is a reasonable chance of survival outside the womb), should the law require that the baby be cared for like any other premature baby?



A strong majority (70%) of Queensland voters agree that a baby who survives a lateterm abortion should be cared for like any other premature baby. 74% of women agree, as do 67% of men. Only 10% of voters disagree.


Decision Making

Q9. Do you believe that when considering having an abortion, a woman should receive free independent counselling from a source that has no financial interest in her decision, so that she can make a fully informed decision?




There is widespread belief in Queensland (88%) that before having an abortion a woman should receive free independent counselling so that she can make a fully informed decision. 91% of females and 85% of males take this view.

Q10. Do you believe that a woman considering abortion should receive information on the development of the unborn child, the nature of the procedure, the physical and psychological risks associated with abortion and the support available should she wish to continue with the pregnancy?




The overwhelming majority of Queensland voters (85%) also support the idea that a woman considering abortion should receive information on the development of the unborn child, the nature of the procedure, the physical and psychological risks associated with abortion and the support available should she wish to continue with the pregnancy.

Q11. Do you believe there should be a cooling-off period of two or three days between making an appointment to have an abortion, and the actual procedure, to ensure that the woman is certain of her decision?




There is strong support (79%) for a cooling off period of two or three days between making an appointment for an abortion and the actual procedure. 81% of females agree, as do 77% of males.

Q12. Do you believe that parental consent should normally be required for girls under the age of 16 to have an abortion?




Almost two-thirds of Queensland voters (65%) believe parental consent should normally be required for girls under the age of 16 to have an abortion.

Q13. Do you believe that a woman requesting an abortion should always be seen in person by a qualified doctor?




Almost all Queensland voters (92%) believe that a woman requesting an abortion should always be seen in person by a qualified doctor.

Q14. Some women experience mental health effects after an abortion, which range from feelings of guilt, sadness and regret to clinical mental health disorders that may only surface years later. Do you believe that all abortion providers should be required to advise women prior to their abortions that they will provide free independent post-abortion counselling if requested?




Almost 9 in 10 Queensland voters (87%) believe that all abortion providers should be required to advise women prior to their abortions that they will provide free independent post-abortion counselling if requested. 90% of females take this view compared with 84% of males.

Q15. Many doctors do not wish to perform or participate in abort on in any way, including having to direct a patient to another doctor or abortionist when they believe that is not in their patient's best interests. Do you support or oppose conscientious objection provisions to allow doctors and nurses to opt out of performing or participating in abortions against their will?



Almost three-quarters of Queensland voters (74%) support conscientious objection provisions allowing doctors and nurses to opt out of having to perform or participate in, or refer for, abortions against their will. Only 13% of females are opposed, compared with 17% of males.


Q16. Only two jurisdictions, South Australia and Western Australia, publish statistics on the annual number of abortions, and only South Australia records the reasons why women choose abortion. Collecting this data would help the Government understand the reasons why women have abortions and whether they are offered adequate support in crisis pregnancies. Do you believe the Queensland Government should gather accurate standardised anonymous data on abortions?



Almost three-quarters of voters (73%) believe the Queensland Government should gather accurate standardised anonymous data on abortions in order to help the Government understand the reasons women have abortions and whether they are offered adequate support in crisis pregnancies.


Q17. Sex-selective abortion is the practice of terminating a pregnancy based upon the sex of the unborn baby, usually when it is a girl. Sexselective abortions are known to occur in Australia. Do you believe that aborting unborn babies solely because of their sex should be permitted in Queensland?

There is only 8% support for sex selective abortions – 11% by males and 5% by females. The vast majority of Queensland voters (83%) are opposed to the idea of aborting unborn babies solely because of their sex.



Legal Aspects


Q18. Under the current law about 14,000 abortions are performed each year in Queensland. The Queensland law on abortion, as has been interpreted by the courts, is that abortion is legal where there is a serious risk to the physical or mental health of the woman. Do you believe the law in Queensland should be more restrictive, less restrictive or is it about right as it is?




The community is divided over abortion laws in Queensland, with 18% being of the belief that the law as it currently stands is not restrictive enough and 38% thinking it is about right. This means that overall 56% of Queensland voters either believe the law should stay the same or be stricter. 27% of voters think the law should be less restrictive.

Q19. The Queensland Labor Government has announced that it will introduce the Termination of Pregnancy Bill to State Parliament. This Bill will legalise abortion on request for any reason, even sex selection, until 22 weeks of pregnancy. Do you support or oppose abortion being performed for any reason until 22 weeks of pregnancy?

A majority of Queensland voters (52%) oppose the key provision of the Government's Termination of Pregnancy Bill, which would legalise abortion on request for any reason until 22 weeks of pregnancy. 57% of women oppose this, as do 48% of men. 29% of voters support this provision of the Bill.




Q20. The Queensland Labor Government's Termination of Pregnancy Bill will legalise abortion from 22 weeks of pregnancy until birth, under a number of criteria ncluding 'social circumstances', which could include economic disadvantage, relationship breakdown or even sex selection. Do you support or oppose abortion being performed after 22 weeks of pregnancy for 'social' reasons?



A solid majority of Queensland voters (62%) oppose the provision of the Government's Termination of Pregnancy Bill which would legalise abortion after 22 weeks of pregnancy for 'social circumstances'. 70% of women oppose this provision, as do 54% of men. Just 22% of voters support this provision of the Bill.


Q21. If the Queensland Labor Government's Termination of Pregnancy Bill becomes law, taxpayer-funded public hospitals will have to provide free abortions on request, for any reason, even sex selection, until 22 weeks of pregnancy. Do you support or oppose free abortions on request being performed in public hospitals?



A majority of Queenslanders (51%) oppose free abortions on request being performed in public hospitals. 55% of women oppose this, as do 47% of men. 31% of voters are in favour.

Voting Intentions

Q22. If your local Member of State Parliament voted in favour of the Queensland Labor Government's Termination of Pregnancy Bill, which effectively would allow abortion for any reason until birth, would you be less likely or more likely to vote for your Member of Parliament at the next State election?



More than half of all Queensland voters (54%) say that if their local Member of Parliament voted in favour of the Government's Termination of Pregnancy Bill it would influence their vote, and supporting the Bill would be more likely to cost votes (39%) than be a vote winner (15%). The data clearly shows that women are more pro-life than men, with 43% of females saying they would be less likely to vote for a MP who supported the Bill, compared with 35% of males.
