It is with sadness and concern that I contact you regarding the Abortion Law Reform Amendment Bill to be voted upon on the 22nd of August 2016.

These laws are an absolute disregard for basic human rights. They are barbaric and cruel and will be the worst in the western world.

As a woman I believe that women DO have a choice, while I disagree with abortion at any stage, the law as it stands does allow for early termination. It is the late term (24 to 40 weeks) that concerns me far more. These babies are viable 'little people' who our doctors and nurses fight to save at the same stage.

We as a country advocate for the rights of animals, going so far as to cease live export, but fail the innocent voiceless children who deserve far more than a lethal injection and a crushed skull all without anaesthesia.

The issue that instigated this reform, as I believe is that of a 12 year old girl who fell pregnant and needed a termination.
