On behalf of Environmental Health Australia (Queensland) Inc., we are pleased to provide our formal submission to the Queensland Parliament's Health, Environment and Innovation Committee regarding the Tobacco and Other Smoking Products (Dismantling Illegal Trade) and Other Legislation Amendment Bill 2025.

Who we are:

EHA Qld is the professional body for Environmental Health Officers (EHOs) in Queensland. EHOs are the "first-mile" public health workforce of the health system embedded in local and state government who inspect, investigate, and enforce public health laws across tobacco/vaping, food safety, environmental nuisances, and other community health risks. We are a direct implementation partner for the Bill's enforcement architecture and its on-the-ground success.

Our position:

EHA Qld supports the Bill's objective to dismantle the illicit tobacco and nicotine market and protect public health, particularly children. We support the major enforcement levers (extended closure orders, controlled purchases, expanded seizure/forfeiture, lessor accountability, and executive liability) with practical implementation improvements to ensure they work statewide, not just in metro areas.

What we are asking the Committee to do:

The following requests are grounded in the member feedback set out in Appendix A.

- 1. Endorse and pass the extended closure powers to address repeat offending, with a request that templates and clear guidance be issued at (or immediately after) assent so officers can act consistently, and that practical arrangements for monitoring closed premises are clarified.
- 2. Acknowledge EHO workforce capacity and recommend targeted support so tobacco enforcement does not displace other core public-health work; deliver training and standardised templates promptly after passage.
- **3.** Support the statutory lease-termination power and recommend a short awareness/training effort for commercial agents and private lessors so they understand when and how it applies.

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4. Strengthen protections at liquor-licensed premises by removing smoking; if smoking areas remain, legislate a clear, enforceable DOSA definition so compliance is practical and prosecutable.

Submission:

1) Closure orders and closure offence

Support. Members strongly support the proposed extended interim and long-term closure powers, noting that the current 72-hour closure process has had limited deterrent effect and has not stopped repeat offending. Longer closures are viewed as a necessary and proportionate tool to disrupt supply of illicit tobacco and illicit nicotine products, including access by minors. What would help implementation (from members):

- Timely access to templates and clear guidance once the Bill is adopted, so officers can act consistently and lawfully.
- Recognition that effective closures require monitoring across a large number of premises, many outside metro areas.

2) Workforce capacity

Support for the Bill with workforce support. Tobacco compliance is one component of a broader EHO portfolio. Members note the need for:

- Additional staff resources to ensure effective, efficient enforcement without displacing other core public health work.
- Training and standardised templates provided promptly after passage.

3) Statutory lease termination power

Support. Members support a statutory power enabling a lessor to cancel a lease where a premises is subject to a closure order, as this helps remove illicit activity from commercial premises. Members suggest awareness and training for relevant lessors (commercial agents and private owners) so they understand obligations under the legislation.

4) Smoking areas at particular liquor-licensed premises (DOSA)

Strengthen protections. Members note the significant health burden from tobacco use and recommend the legislation be strengthened to remove smoking at liquor-licensed premises to protect patrons and staff from second-hand smoke. If smoking areas remain, members seek a clear, enforceable definition of Designated Outdoor Smoking Area (DOSA) in the legislation, as the current definition is not sufficiently clear for prosecution
