Local Government Electoral (Transparency and Accountability in Local Government) and Other Legislation Amendment Bill 2016

I refer to the Infrastructure, Planning and Natural Resources Committee (**Committee**) hearing on the *Local Government Electoral (Transparency and Accountability in Local Government) and Other Legislation Amendment Bill 2016* held on 17 February 2017.

During the hearing the Committee Chair, Mr Jim Pearce MP asked the following question:

"I am interested in the comments you have made around the activities of private certifiers and, from my own experiences as a local member, I have some concerns about some of the things that I am hearing. Are private certifiers audited or monitored in any way to make sure that they are applying and doing their work in accordance with the act?"

During the hearing, I provided my understanding of how private building certifiers were regulated by the QBCC, but stated that I would take the question on notice to clarify my response.

In short:

- (a) A private building certifier is regulated by the QBCC.
- (b) This regulation includes undertaking audits of the private certifiers work against the requirements of the relevant acts and undertaking investigations in relation to complaints made against private building certifiers.
- (c) In relation to the audit process, I understand that it is a matter for the QBCC as to the frequency in which particular audits are undertaken.
- (d) These audits and investigations can result in disciplinary action being undertaken.

The following provisions of the Building Act 1975 (BA) provide the legal basis for the above response

(a) Chapter 6 of the BA sets out the provisions which relate to private certifies and other building certifiers. Of particular relevance the regulation of the performance of building certifying functions.

- (b) Section 133 (Additional functions of QBCC for building certification) of the BA relevantly provides as follows:
 - "As well as its functions under the Queensland Building and Construction Commission Act 1991, QBCC has the following functions under this Act—
 - (a) under part 3, to license individuals as building certifiers and give private certification and development approval endorsements;
 - (b) to monitor compliance with this chapter by building certifiers;
 - (c) to carry out audits of building and private certifying functions;
 - (d) under part 3, to investigate written complaints made to it about alleged unsatisfactory conduct or professional misconduct by building certifiers or former building certifiers;
 - (e) to take disciplinary action against building certifiers or former building certifiers for unsatisfactory conduct or professional misconduct;

..."

- (c) Section 199 (Power to enter and inspect building site relating to complaint or audit) of the BA provides that an auditor may enter and inspect a building site to which the complaint or audit relates.
- (d) Section 204 (Decision after investigation or audit completed) of the BA provides that after investigating a complaint or conducting an audit, QBCC must decide whether or not the building certifier has engaged in unsatisfactory conduct or professional misconduct.
