  - b. Bundaberg, Queensland received petrol from Brisbane, trucked from Brisbane to Bundaberg Queensland has a refinery and an 8.354 cents per litre subsidy.
- 2. Some areas have received considerable falls from all-time highs at the bowser yet Bundaberg has experienced a trickle effect and very little reduction
  - a. Sydney, New South Wales  $1.40 \rightarrow 1.13$
  - b. Bundaberg, Queensland  $1.29 \rightarrow 1.16$
- 3. Deregulation of the fuel industry, deregulation of the banking industry, both have and will continue to gather bigger and bigger profits until someone has the sense to reverse the decision and regulate those profiteering, no-morals thieves.
