RE: Reef Preservation Bill

I would like to make an objection to the exorbitant fines proposed to the landowners in the Reef Preservation Bill.

To hold landowners solely accountable for sediment run-off to the Barrier Reef is ludicrous, unfair and unaffordable. Fining landowners would take away their already stressed financial capacity to correct situations which are out of their control, caused by severe flooding or drought. A far more positive outcome would be to work with landowners to help them better manage difficult situations rather than a negative fining solution.

Yes, it is recognised by everybody the Great Barrier Reef certainly is worthy of preserving.

How can landowners be held solely responsible for the sediment movement onto the Barrier Reef when there are so many other stakeholders and contributors such as Oil Companies and their leases, CSG, Council and National Parks.

Will National Parks catastrophic destruction by fire which leaves the ground in a worse state than Classification "D" be assessed and accountable for their wilful destruction at the same level as rural landowners when it comes to fining. It is to be noted that these fires which have burnt millions of hectares in the Great Barrier Reef catchment zone, are not a **climate change** event, but a **manmade** event due to mismanagement and lack of foresight. In the last 2 months, I have personally contributed approximately 9 days of lost time to my business to help National Parks manage their fires in my area. It should be noted, this does not include the additional 5 days spent helping another landowner defend their property in the Lonesome National Park / Arcadia Valley fire.


