New ECQ Website

The Local Government Association of Queensland (LGAQ) welcomes the opportunity to provide comment to the Electoral Commission Queensland regarding the proposed ECQ website redesign project.

For the past two Local Government elections (2012 and 2016), the Local Government Association of Queensland had made available to the general public a website (elections.lgaq.asn.au) that displayed Queensland local government election results and statistical reports.

From that experience, we would like to share some of the lessons learnt that may of be benefit to the EQC website redesign project. The requirements from our last election website project have also been included in this document.

Display data through visualisations and dashboards

In our experience, visualising Local Government election data creates a more engaging user experience. Using dashboards for individual councils and statistical reports is an effective way to present visualisations together and provides users with a holistic view that can be explored further. We have also found that displaying trend data (current election result data alongside previous) will also add context to the information being displayed.

To visualise election data in a technical sense, we have found graphing and charting JavaScript libraries to be readily available at low to no cost that are fit for purpose (and is currently used on our elections website). Other analytics tools such as Microsoft's PowerBI are also worth consideration to present election data.

Provide meaningful statistical reports

We had found statistical election result reports to be most meaningful and engaging for all users (both public and elected councillors) when they are:

- Visual and interactive (as described above)
- Sharable or downloaded as a static report
- Dynamic (that update as new election data is supplied)
- Representative of user interests (the types of statistical reports for the 2016 LGAQ elections website were chosen based on public and council interest – see appendix 1 for specific reports)



Create comparative insights

Since launching our last 2016 Local Government elections website there has been a growing interest from both the public and Queensland councils to be able to compare council data against other councils. Local Government Association of Queensland members already use and are familiar with performance analytics tools (provided by the LGAQ) to compare and analyse council performance against their peers. We believe familiar functionality would be beneficial to all users who could compare election related data against neighbouring councils and the state.

Look for opportunities to educate end users

End users are likely to not understand all the statistical information present to them, so it is important that educational resources are readily available. (such as how a statistic is determined or what a specific metric means). These educational resources are most effective when embedded directly into the user experience (e.g. "help" icons adjacent to each graph that explain the metric when selected) rather than provided on a different area of the website.

Build for desktop and mobile users

A significant number of users who had accessed the LGAQ's election website have been mobile users and should be accommodated alongside traditional desktop users. Building a mobile friendly website will ensure maximum participation.

The Local Government Association of Queensland hopes that these insights will be of value to the Electoral Commission Queensland and would welcome any further opportunity to provide assistance.

Our 2016 elections website will continue to be available to the ECQ (at elections.lgaq.asn.au) throughout the duration of the proposed ECQ website redesign project and hope it will help inform the design of a new election website. We look forward to the progression of the ECQ's website redesign progress.












Councillor Election Results Page (Divisional Election):






New Candidates Elected as Councillors (Leading count):
