

I would have free drinking stations everywhere for anyone to use not much can be done about some anti social begahaviour - some people just shoudnt drink.



I/ve had countless memorable moments in and around the city/valley. live music, other events, birthdays, work Christmas parties, even to just go for a drink and socialise, I think it/s fair to say that I end up in the valley at least two or three times a fortnight. The hours I/m in the city or valley vary from 11pm-5am.

I find the new times completely absurd. it seems to me to be over-bearing, harsh, controlling, and fascistic. What would be next if these laws were to be introduced? Forced curfews? Indirectly or directly, the laws proposed seem to be missing the point entirely. You only need to look at Sydney\'s kings cross to see the damage being dealt. The statistics brought to our awareness are skewed to fit the agenda. I\'m not a conspiracist but there are other statistics out there that don\'t quote show the Kings cross laws are doing more harm than good. To be more anecdotal, I\'ve seen violence occur at various points throughout a \'night\' whether that\'s at 10pm, 1am, 3am, violence is hardly something that can be controlled, not least by decreasing the allowed

\'over-seen\' times one (or many) can drink in venues. You\'d think that to be \'safer\' it would mean encouraging more people to be within bars/clubs at the times being looked at in regards to halting drinking or enforced lockouts... You would think.

12am is far too early, for straights or shots; if you ask any 18-25 year old you would hear that most people start to head in to the city or valley around 10pm-12am, meaning one has probably only had a couple of drinks by the time \'strong\' drinks have stopped being served. I would love to know the real reason why casinos are excused from this ruling... 3am last drinks? So the government would prefer people to either stash drinks in public areas, go home or to friends houses/units to continue drinking unsupervised? Because that\'s what would be the response. Meaning even more of a hit on businesses; it wouldn\'t be the people \'not going out\' or \'drinking less\' it would be the governments actions in bringing in these new laws having a direct affect on businesses and consumers will to want to buy.

I would personally feel the change, yes. In terms of \'freedom\' or lack of, while having a direct affect on how I socialise. I\'m lucky enough to not be a university student, studying and working in bars/clubs, sacrificing weekends to make a buck or two. These people would feel this the most and I completely sympathise with these people. For me, I would lose the freedom to pick and choose a venue or \'place to be\' between the hours of 12am and 5am. Hypothetically, why would I leave home at 12am and spend two-three hours out? I could easily invite friends over to my house for that sort of time period. Or not, because sound/noise would probably get the police called. So what do you do? There doesn\'t seem to be a lot YOU CAN DO. Lack of freedom is a huge deal with these laws being possibly introduced. Not to mention the countless friends that work in the city/valley, who are prominently students. Socially, it would be a big hit. Apathy towards \'going out\' or \'socialising\' would be the natural next step, which is not a good sign for young Queenslanders, who lets face it, would be the real victims/sufferers in this scenario.

Only lately as I have started to mature when out at pubs/bars/clubs have I been experimenting with straight/neat alcohol. Sure, it\'s nice, but there\'s always alternatives to it, which for me, isn\'t a huge issue. I can certainly see why some would not like it, since it\'s just a preferential thing. Would I be happy with beers/lighter drinks post 12am? I suppose, though it\'s not ideal.i personally get sick of certain drinks, repeated/cycled drinks, I prefer mixing it up in terms of flavour more than anything. So yes, an unnecessary limitation, although I could see the point behind it.

I think the Brisbane night life culture is already in trouble, these newly proposed laws would only accelerate and crate new problems entirely. Yes, I can see business\'s closing down, especially small, locally run businesses (aka, I can see big business surviving albeit only just). Staff in these business\'s would obviously be cut (good bye university students). Again, people would head for the streets, home/friends houses, or sought illegal alternatives. Already i (anecdotal, again) that Melbourne is the music scene for Australia, I hear about and see friends and friends of friends moving to Melbourne for greater opportunities their in comparison to Brisbane. I know people want to stay in Brisbane, but with these proposed laws, only more will follow suite. It will directly affect after parties from festivals/live gigs and it\'ll hamper agents in deciding where to host their client (the live performer) because no performer will want to perform early, to finish up by 12am. Not only that, but right now we have a healthy dose of performers that go from 10pm all the way through to, from last weeks evidence, 3:30am. That\'s a big difference considering some acts will play for 1 hour to 3 hours.

Not happy about that at all. We can have people drunkinly gamble, but can\t have drinks served passed 12am?

Ridiculous. gambling is addictive and is high losses for minimal gain. Conversely alcohol is something tangible and can effect you, whether or not that\'s bad is up to the person drinking. They\'re both legal, however one strips you of money - and quickly - while one actually pays for something tangible that you can consume. One helps add to an experience, encourages social experiences and is fairly controlled, while one is not.

One completely out weighs the other in terms of community interests. One is completely negative (unless you win the big one!) while one promotes social interaction, valuable life experiences, and can really help some people on an individual level in relation to promoting self awareness and mental/physical growth. Comparing that to... A completely individual focused activity, music and other live events trump poker machines in what you are getting out of either activity.

I have no idea, I haven\'t been put in a situation to think like that and I\'m not naive enough to suggest something I am not knowledgable enough to have a valid opinion on. The proposed laws are certainly NOT what I would be doing, closer to the opposite end of the spectrum of what I would be doing.

I struggle to fathom what the benefits of such a possibility is. What\'s the aim here? Is there a greater goal? It is undeniably counter productive, had potential to be a culture killer, is more than likely going to put business\'s and individuals out of business\'out of the job and WILL either create a negative response or people will choose elsewhere or other means to act as a substitute for what is being stopped and\'or changed. I fear the worst bust am optimistic that things like this won\'t be pushed through. I really hope people will have a voice or utilise their voice to show their dismay on the issue.



I have seen that the reason for these new laws is to reduce the effect that alcohol has on health issues, as well as reduce alcohol fuelled violence. This argument only stands up indeed the cost of those negative aspects outweighs the cost of the loss of jobs that is likely to occur should the laws be passed. Ignoring that logic though, I firmly believe the onus lies on government to punish those responsible for the fights, the injuries, the health risks rather apply harsher laws on the majority that follow the laws, and enjoy doing so safely.

Q: How would the bans on certain types of drinks after 12am affect you/your business/your experience?

I enjoy a wide variety of drinks in a responsible manner - mixed spirits, near spirits, shots, beer, wines, cocktails and more. I have done so and will continue to do so well into the early hours of the morning. To take this away from me, and many others who enjoy it, is a deprivation of freedom, and a band-aid solution to the symptoms of the issue, rather than a treatment of the problem. It smacks of restrictive governance, and is not what is fair to the people.

Q: How do you think these changes would affect your local area? Do you foresee businesses closing? Do you foresee job losses? Do you foresee opportunities for musicians reduced? Do you think the vibrancy of your local area would be diminished?

Given that I live in an entertainment precinct, I will experience a direct affect on my quality of living. As late night venues close from lack of revenue, so will smaller businesses that rely on their volume of trade. Associated restaurants will become less busy, people will move out of the area, and the vibrancy of the suburb will drastically decrease. This is not what I moved here for. The new laws, if passed, will absolutely make me consider moving to another part of the country. I am not alone in my thinking.

Q: How do you feel about the fact that whilst venues that support youth culture (local bands, DJs, contemporary music) will not be able to serve drinks after certain times, other venues will be allowed to have poker machines running all night, some without a lockout?

A blatant disrespect of the smarter people who walk among us, and a clear exhibition of favouritism for those venues that pay monstrous taxes to the government in the form of gambling tax. It\'s a double standard, and it\'s plainly disgusting.

Q: How do you feel attending nightclubs and live music venues compares (in terms of social interactions and community interests) with the community benefit of playing poker machines?

Poker machines are a drain on society - I have previously worked in the hospitality industry for 10 years and have seen first hand the issues poker machines being. For the majority of pekoe that play them, they bring about poverty in their use. Their addictive nature means people will forego basic needs such as food and housing in order to play them. I have overheard a player say he needed to \'win big or else he couldn\'t make rent\'. Stories like this are not uncommon for regular police players.

Socially interactive places like nightclubs and bars of course do not come without their downfalls (like anything really), but when put side by side, the negatives of the poker machines far outweigh nightclubs.

Q: What are your ideas for better ways to reduce anti-social behaviour and change culture in this space? If you were in parliament, what would you do?

If I were in parliament I would fight for harsher rules for people engaging in anti-social behaviour, I would raise the fines for breach of RSA for both staff and licensees, I would encourage more positive behaviour through the use of prominent community programs that promote safe and responsible consumption of alcohol. I would also think about the possibility of an app, or a text line that people were able to alert authorities to instances of anti-social behaviour. Crowd sourced reporting can be much faster than other methods, and

repeated alerts would indicate a greater level of police presence required. I think some people are afraid to call 000, and not many people know about police link.

Q: Any other comments?

Stop listening to yourselves in parliamentary meetings, and listen to the people who speak. I have written to my member of parliament on this matter before, and was ignored, and the lockout laws were passed last time, despite the overwhelming disagreement from the community.

I was born in Hervey Bay and moved to cairns at 16. I became passionate about the hospitality industry from a young age and loved to visit restaurants with my family. At 14 I became a kitchenhand and then transitioned to waitressing, bar, and eventually nightclub work. Throughout my career I have met some of the most amazing, interesting people on both sides of the bar and I take immense pleasure out of providing customer service and knowledge to every person I serve. I have managed pubs and bars in Cairns and am passionate about responsible service of alcohol. I possess an RMLV and approved managers licence and love to keep up to date with my local liquor accord. I believe that we can all provide a fun, safe and relaxing atmosphere for customers through knowledge, tact and a keen eye for any potential issues. I firmly believe that the methamphetamine epidemic in this county is a much larger and more dangerous issue than the service of alcohol. Drunks are able to be reasoned with. People who mix drinks and alcohol are not.

I am both an industry member and a patron and I thoroughly enjoy providing and receiving a place to relax and enjoy the company of people around me.

I am very close to the community of security guards in cairns and I see on a daily basis how hard they work and how caring watchful and dilligent they are in ensuring the safety of the public and preventing rapid and/or excessive consumption of alcohol. I see them reason with and assist intoxicated persons when necessary and the only times I have seen any issues arise are when drugs are involved.

The music community provides an opportunity for people of any age to gain genuine enjoyment out of their time away from work and the people who travel to my town from around the world provide us with an improved outlook and multicultural aspect to our lives which I believe makes them more whole and fulfillingz

I believe that if access to alcohol is taken away from patrons they will be more likely to attemp to procure illicit drugs in an effort to \"keep the party going\" which will make them become more unpredictable and will potentially put more of a strain on the medical industry through the potential for drug interactions/ overdose/ violence/ accidents.

I believe that through sufficient support and training for staff and venues the potential for rapid and excessive consumption of alcohol can be decreased and removing the option for cocktails, rtds, neat alcohol etc strikes me as very much a lazy attempt at controlling this.

This is an industry that provides fulfilment to patrons and revenue to the government and rather than creating blanket rules which will potentially shut bars down and drive drinking to people\'s homes, the government should invest in education of the public and hospitality staff to foster a safe, mutually responsible environment.

Lockouts also put a large amount of people on the streets, outside the care and supervision of licenced venues which will put pressure on the police and emergency services to control these crowds and prevent any danger.

Q: How would the proposed wind back in trading hours and changes to Lockouts affect you? Would it result in less work/job losses? Would it result in a loss of freedoms? Would it affect your social life negatively?

Losing these trading hours will cost me and many people I know jobs which they are passionate about. It will create resentment from both the industry and the public as they will be losing freedoms they have grown up with and will be forced to seek other methods of fulfilment which could include house parties (danger to property, noise complaints, children in suburban areas losing sleep on school nights), drugs (higher rate of addiction, property damage, breakdown of relationships and families) and the travel industry in QLD will effectively dry up as people from other countries look elsewhere to enjoy themselves.

Q: How would the bans on certain types of drinks after 12am affect you/your business/your experience?

I generally work all of my shifts at night which means on my days off, I don\'t go out for an \"afternoon/ evening\" drink until well after 11pm. Preventing people like me and other shift workers from being able to drink a cocktail or a neat spirit or even an rtd and hour after we have entered a licenced venue strikes me as unfair. The time of day should not dictate what type of beverage can be served as long as it is served responsibly and within existing legal trading hours.

I do not believe the restriction of type of alcohol will assist many businesses in preventing undue intoxication as there are already procedures and training in place for staff to refuse service of alcohol to patrons displaying signs of undue intoxication.

Q: How do you think these changes would affect your local area? Do you foresee businesses closing? Do you foresee job losses? Do you foresee opportunities for musicians reduced? Do you think the vibrancy of your local area would be diminished?

There are very few late night venues operating in my local area and they are all currently working together to prevent dangerous situations and any harm to the community. The few late night venues left operating are working with the liquor accord to ensure a safe night for all patrons and have extensive risk-assessed management plans for all their operations. If the venues were to have more restrictions place on them, the cbd of cairns will become empty at night. The bars will lose revenue and staff, DJs and musicians will possibly move interstate or elsewhere to seek better employment opportunities. The late night restaurants will also lose revenue and my city will lose much of its culture and vibrancy.

Q: How do you feel about the fact that whilst venues that support youth culture (local bands, DJs, contemporary music) will not be able to serve drinks after certain times, other venues will be allowed to have poker machines running all night, some without a lockout?

I believe that the community deserves to have as many ways as possible to enjoy a safe night out, this should

not be restricted to poker machines as there is he potential to encourage problem gambling as one of the only means of escape/ enjoyment available to people at that time of night. People have a right to choose where they spend their money and time and there need to be options that have less of a negative effect on the community as a whole.

Q: How do you feel attending nightclubs and live music venues compares (in terms of social interactions and community interests) with the community benefit of playing poker machines?

I feel that the social interaction of licenced venues is far more important to the community than the availablity of poker machines which do not provide any interaction between people at all, sometimes for hours at a time.

Q: What are your ideas for better ways to reduce anti-social behaviour and change culture in this space? If you were in parliament, what would you do?

I believe that better training and a sense of working together as a whole between the community, government, local councils, licenced venues and emergency forces is necessary. A decision like this needs to be made with careful regard to all aspects of the community.

I belief that tackling unemployment, poverty, indigenous welfare and the prevalence of drugs in our society is of much higher importance to the state and country than imposing blanket rules over the liquor industry which operates transparently and with a large interaction with local communities. I believe that Australia does have a binge drinking culture but we can challenge and change this by education, availability of drinks to be enjoyed like cocktails and neat serves of alcohol, empowerment of staff, venues and security to be responsible for their patrons and a much larger interaction with the community in these matters. Queenslanders are smart people who deserve an input and deserve to have some of the responsibility for their behaviour placed back on their own shoulders. Instead of punishing the whole for the actions of a few, I firmly believe that we should increase penalties for the actions of the few and strive to create a sense of respect and care for the rest of the community.

As a patron my friends and I will often spend upwards of a hundred dollars each.

Q: Are you a patron of the nightlife and don't want to see it diminished?

Yes

Q: What are your positive experiences working/playing in the night-time economy?

As a naturally, night time person clubs and pubs provide me with a place I can go and socialize during the hours I am awake and enjoy myself. Further more virtually every friend that I have are people who I met through the industry including a fellow Security Officer who has just recently asked me to be godfather to his sons.

Q: What do you think of the government's major proposals?

- * New last drinks time 2am instead of 5am
- * In precincts, 1am Lockout & 3am Last Drinks (effectively closing time) instead of 3am Lockout & 5am Close
- * No shots or straight spirits after 12am midnight, potentially bans on cocktails and RTDs
- * Pokies allowed to continue to operate after last drinks
- * New bottle shops to close at 10pm, all existing to close at 12am
- * Exemptions for Casinos 24 hour trading (and alcohol served)

Lockout laws do not work, they have never worked and will never work. The problem of binge drinking and violence is an issue that runs deep in our society, it will require a solution a bit more involved than simply closing clubs earlier. The earlier clubs/pubs close the earlier people will start drinking, if their aim is to drink shots and straight spirits they will drink as much as they possibly can before the can't be purchased any more. The proposed changes will literally have the exact opposite effect of their intention.

Q: How would the proposed wind back in trading hours and changes to Lockouts affect you? Would it result in

less work/job losses? Would it result in a loss of freedoms? Would it affect your social life negatively?

The proposed lockout laws will see many of my friends lose their only source of income, it is taking hundreds of dollars out of the pocket of hard workers with families to support. Here in Townsville we already have the highest unemployment rate in the state, these changes will add to that burden and crush our already damaged economy. With the unemployment rates the hospitality industry has already taken a massive hit, I saw my hours more than halve when I was still in the security industry and things have only got worse since I retired from it. Further more I am an adult, a grown man, if I want to have a shot or a cocktail after midnight it is my right to do so, these proposal border dangerously close to prohibition.

Q: How would the bans on certain types of drinks after 12am affect you/your business/your experience?

Many people only like certain drinks and many smaller clubs/pubs make the bulk of their customer base from them. These proposals will see many cocktail lounges put out of business.

Q: How do you think these changes would affect your local area? Do you foresee businesses closing? Do you foresee job losses? Do you foresee opportunities for musicians reduced? Do you think the vibrancy of your local area would be diminished?

These changes would as I have mentioned already put many people and clubs/pubs out of business. Further more it will see the violence and binge drinking shifted away from a centralized, controlled environment and into the suburban areas with house parties becoming the norm. We are already witnessing this and the damage that it does. Clubs/pubs have guards and staff all adhering to the RSA providing a safe, monitored, policed environment where as there is no responsible supervision in someone back yard.

Q: How do you feel about the fact that whilst venues that support youth culture (local bands, DJs, contemporary music) will not be able to serve drinks after certain times, other venues will be allowed to have poker machines running all night, some without a lockout?

Poker machines are already under fire for the harm that they can cause, that many venues will be aloud to run them unrestricted while others won\'t be able to serve drinks and cut off those who have had to much is simply ridiculous.

Q: How do you feel attending nightclubs and live music venues compares (in terms of social interactions and community interests) with the community benefit of playing poker machines?

There is little to no community benefit from poker machines where as live music and events not only provide a healthy social interaction between people in an enjoyable environment but also provides employment and exposure for local artists.

Q: What are your ideas for better ways to reduce anti-social behaviour and change culture in this space? If you were in parliament, what would you do?

The way to deal with the anti-social behaviour is make it very clear to the public that it will not be tolerated. Start with public awareness campaigns shaming violent behaviour and teaching/encouraging more mature methods of handling confrontations. The police need to be provided with more move along powers as well as the ability to ban repeat offenders from DSPs. The biggest problem I had during my time in security is aggressive patrons who were free to hurl abuse and threats at club staff then head to another venue. Anyone who responds to an entry refusal with aggressive behaviour and comments should be issued a move along and kicked barred entry to venues for the night while repeat offenders should be issued bans and fines. Patrons that are evicted should be immediately banned entry to all other venues and issued with move along. Violent offenders need to face harsh punishments, the law needs to take a zero tolerance approach to send a clear message to the type of patron that goes out looking for a fight that their behaviour will see them being jailed.

Q: Any other comments?


As previously stated this issue will require more than simply closing places earlier. It is a societal/cultural issue that will require time, patience, money and co-operation between law, government and the industry. Lockouts and drink restrictions feel like they are just a lazy, cheap solution conjured up by those with no experience or care for the real issue. It feels like a quick, band aid measure designed to appear as though the government is doing something with out actually doing anything. The changes simply address the symptoms and not the cause and thus will fail. They will do far more harm to the industry and the economy than any good. I spent nearly a decade working the front door of 3/4 of the nightclubs in Townsville, I have had my face glued back together, partially tore two tendons in my shoulder twice and nearly lost a finger to a crush injury. I have seen my friends stabbed, glassed and bottled, I have even held a man\'s skull together after he was coward punched. I know first hand just how bad the alcohol fuelled violence in our society so believe me when I say that these proposed lockout laws are a horrible, horrible idea.

I am a co-owner and full time employee of two licensed venues in Fortitude Valley - GPO and The MET Brisbane.

Q: Do you work in the Industry?

Events & Marketing

Q: In a few words, explain what role you play in the night time economy.

I work alongside my husband and business partners to put on unique and memorable events for young people in Brisbane. These events are heavily regulated by associated governing bodies and provide a safe night out for members of the public.

Q: Are you a patron of the nightlife and don't want to see it diminished?

Yes

Q: What are your positive experiences working/playing in the night-time economy?

I have been a patron and employee of the night-time economy for quite some time now. I often see the majority of people safely enjoying their night out week in-week out. My positive experiences always come from the operators of these venues, every place I frequent (other than my own venues) always offer a safe and fun place to go out and see the various artists and performers that come to Brisbane to play.

Q: What do you think of the government's major proposals?

- * New last drinks time 2am instead of 5am
- * In precincts, 1am Lockout & 3am Last Drinks (effectively closing time) instead of 3am Lockout & 5am Close
- * No shots or straight spirits after 12am midnight, potentially bans on cocktails and RTDs
- * Pokies allowed to continue to operate after last drinks
- * New bottle shops to close at 10pm, all existing to close at 12am
- * Exemptions for Casinos 24 hour trading (and alcohol served)

I think the fact that these points above will drive the patrons back home to the suburbs to party will hugely affect emergency services. It will spread out the unregulated partying which will affect quite suburban neighbourhoods and in turn, see Police, Ambulance etc traveling out to the suburbs to control young people partying. Why would we not focus on the Emergency Services staying within a controlled, safe night out precinct? I know that I wouldn\'t want my elderly parents to feel unsafe in their own homes because there are underground parties happening in their suburb. My husband works weekends in our venues and I am alone at home with two children. I would feel very unsafe and would definitely ring the police if I was concerned about

young people drinking and partying in the early hours of the morning around my suburb and as a result my children or I felt unsafe.

The other issue I have is that Casinos are exempt from these laws. Ultimately, this means they can go into a Casino and gamble or go home to party. I can\'t decide which one is scarier - what type of gambling (addiction) statistics will our country see in the future in the younger generations when they can go into a Casino and have a \'flutter on the pokies and enjoy the nightlife that is there\' as Yvette D\'Art so gracefully put it? As a young woman who has seen gambling first hand, this makes me sick to think the Government think it will not become a problem by allowing this exemption.

Q: How would the proposed wind back in trading hours and changes to Lockouts affect you? Would it result in less work/job losses? Would it result in a loss of freedoms? Would it affect your social life negatively?

The wind back in hours would definitely adversely affect our business. We will not be able to afford to bring high quality, international and national performers and DJs to the venues as it will not be financially viable with the limited hours we would see patrons in the venue. It would affect my social life if I could not go out to dinner and have a nip of a premium spirit (such as a Baileys on ice) afterwards in a nice venue. My husband may not be able to have a scotch after going out to dinner in the Valley with friends. That isn\'t everything but it would negatively affect our night time experience.

Q: How would the bans on certain types of drinks after 12am affect you/your business/your experience?

As I mentioned above, there are a number of members of the public 30 - 40 + that enjoy going for a premium spirit (baileys, scotch, whisky etc) after dinner before heading home. This isn\'t having a rapid drink by downing a shot, it\'s sipping on a premium spirit before heading home. Having these drinks banned after 12am will affect us being able to do that.

With regard to our venues, people enjoy being able to have a shot when they are out socialising with friends. Do these need to be available after 2am or 3am - probably not, however when people are arriving at the venues after 11pm (close to 12am) they are starting off their night at the venue with a shot. This will affect the customer experience but I do believe that there are more pressing issues - like the cease of alcohol completely by 3am.

Q: How do you think these changes would affect your local area? Do you foresee businesses closing? Do you foresee job losses? Do you foresee opportunities for musicians reduced? Do you think the vibrancy of your local area would be diminished?

The wind back in trading hours would affect the 170 odd staff members across our business. We are very proud of the fact that we employ a number of international and university students. This allows them to study and work at the same time. We will definitely need to cut staff if our hours are wound back.

As I mentioned above, the wind back in trading hours would also definitely affect us being able to bring musicians, tours, DJs and artists to the venue because it would just not be financially viable. I think absolutely the vibrancy of the Valley will be lost and tourism will be affected as a whole for Brisbane. Now that there is such negative information and publicity about Sydney\'s nightlife, Brisbane has an opportunity to capture some of the international travelers that may plan to spend more time/money on experiences in and around Brisbane for this reason.

Q: How do you feel about the fact that whilst venues that support youth culture (local bands, DJs, contemporary music) will not be able to serve drinks after certain times, other venues will be allowed to have poker machines running all night, some without a lockout?

This is absolutely disgusting, please refer above for my thoughts on the Casinos being exempt from the laws in discussion.

It doesn't. Young people benefit from having social outings like seeing live bands, going to music festivals, seeing an international DJ that is world renowned in a nightclub in Brisbane. Sitting in front of a poker machine is extremely unsocial and leads to a waste of money, gambling problems, child neglection, relationship breakdowns. Surely everyone can see that young people would benefit from buying a ticket to see a live band or DJ with friends, then sitting by themselves putting \$50 notes through a poker machine.



I think that the Government\'s proposals are completely reactive in nature while supported by an extremely poor evidence base. They are a weak end-of-pipe solution to curbing alcohol-fueled violence that are unresaonably onerous on the overwhelming majority of people who just want to drink alcohol, have a good time and don\'t cause any trouble. Considering the economic impacts, I think the costs to Queensland\'s economy through lost wages, less tourism, less hospitality jobs, less live music and lower alcohol sales far outweigh the supposed benefits of reducing the already small number of violent incidents in entertainment precincts. They are a

ridiculous restriction on civil liberties in QLD and completely ignore the cultural underpinnings that result in alcohol fueled violence in this country.

Q: How would the proposed wind back in trading hours and changes to Lockouts affect you? Would it result in less work/job losses? Would it result in a loss of freedoms? Would it affect your social life negatively?

It would result in me seeing less live music due to (effectively) restricted trading hours and alcohol sales. It would affect my social life and mental health extremely negatively as this is what I do for fun with my friends. Overall it is an unreasonable loss of personal freedom to me and that will have a lot of negative impacts on my life.

Q: How would the bans on certain types of drinks after 12am affect you/your business/your experience?

Shots after 12am have always been a bad idea but this isn\'t something government should regulate. It\'s more something people need to discover for themselves.

Yes to all of the above suggestions. Particularly for businesses and musicians. It is so unfair to further restrict opportunities for artists and entrepenuers in this country. Brisbane has a proud music history and being able to play late into the night gets more bands/DJs on stage and getting recognised. Boutique bars and clubs are such a good opportunity being realised in Brisbane. We need to support this economic activity as Brisbane becomes a global city not restrict it.

Q: How do you feel about the fact that whilst venues that support youth culture (local bands, DJs, contemporary music) will not be able to serve drinks after certain times, other venues will be allowed to have poker machines running all night, some without a lockout?

Some of the biggest hypocrisy in these laws is because of the gambling/casino exceptions. It is completely hypocritical of this government to make a proposal that unreasonably restricts alcohol based on the actions of a minority while the exceptions under the same proposal (and indeed other gambling legislation) protect the right of the majority of responsible gamblers to continue gambling despite the (much higher) cost to society of problem gambling that is perpetrated by a minority.

Q: How do you feel attending nightclubs and live music venues compares (in terms of social interactions and community interests) with the community benefit of playing poker machines?

Personally, I see absolutely no net benefit to the community of playing poker machines. I think they are an evil device made to con people into gambling addiction by exploiting reward pathways in the brain. Importantly this does not mean I believe they should be restricted in operation or number because the problem of gambling addiction is a societal and cultural problem that CANNOT be fixed by restrictions on trading hours or the machines themselves. It is the exact same for alcohol.

Q: What are your ideas for better ways to reduce anti-social behaviour and change culture in this space? If you were in parliament, what would you do?

We need policies that target the culture of drinking and violence in Australia, and more specifically, Queensland. Unreasonably restricting civil liberties as seen the the Government\'s proposal will achieve only short term gains without addressing the root cause of the problem. My solution would be to use targeted social marketing and education to change the culture of drinking in our youth. Over time, to reduce the taboo we place on alcohol consumption and celebration I would be encouraging a RELAXING of alcohol laws. This is so that kids are exposed to alcohol in a responsible and fun way rather than as an evil not to be touched or talked about positively until you are 18. I would concentrate on the importation and use in society of steroids as

the evidence for its increase used in society has been correlated with increase in alcohol-fueled violence. There are numerous studies confirming the efficacy of the above techniques over heavy handed, nanny state policies implemented under the banner of \"public interest\". These policies look like they have had great success in Kings Cross and Newcastle. The success of these initiatives seems to be only been measured in quantitative analysis of reduction in violence but fails to account for the negative effects on the night-time economy and social cohesion. These are particularly local issues so even where they have been considered they are completely irrelevant to the Queensland experience.

- 2. Lockouts are the laziest policy instrument you can implement to deal with this problem. Get some courage, take on the hard part and tackle the real issues underlying alcohol fueled violence.
- 3. I have twice been the victim of a one hit punch attack on a night out and I still don\'t support this proposal. I would rather be punched again than see this onerous restriction on our vibrant nightlife come to pass.



The lock out and closing times are plucked out of thin air and have no scientific and evidence based support that cant be shown to be bettered by other systems. For exampled the Newcastle model is actually the worst performing in NSW between 2008 and 2012.

As above, it has no scientific backing and is lazy policy to appease the vocal minority.

This law, I am not so worried about, as long as it is implemented correctly, but currently it is ambiguous and confusing.

Pokies being allowed to operate after last drinks is a simple cash grab by the government, the hamrs of gambling addiction are well known.

New bottle shops to close at 10pm is ridiculous if you are allowing others to stay open. Its disadvantaging some business while allowing others to operate, people will simply go to the later opening bottle shops. Prepare to see the incident rate at Casinos to go up. Again what is the evidence behind this? That Casino alcohol causes less trouble that venue alcohol?

This is the only way to change the culture, particularly around young men and violence. Shot gun, knee jerk laws are lazy and do not deal with the root of the problem. Alcohol is not the issue, the sooner a government sees this with some clarity, the better off we will be.



In Airlie Beach generally speaking it is a safe place to enjoy late night festivities. Nothing is perfect but we are definitely not like larger capita places such as the gold coast, brisbane, Sydney and new castle and should not be judged as so. If something does happen on our streets our police security and bar owners and managers work closely together to correct the wrongs.

- It will reduce trading hours for many small business owners where this trade is crucial to their bottom lines. It is not feasible to stay open and pay DJs, Staff and Security so people can have a \'lemonade\' or play pokies.. not to mention most small business owners and clubs do not have pokies.
- Last drinks is closing, this bill seems to be rewarding big business and punishing small business. there will be a lot more people out on our street between the 1am and 3am close outside of controlled environments (clubs and pubs) all wanting food and wanting to get home at the same time this is where a lot of problems happen in the process of people getting home and I don't think our infrastructure could handle it. At the moment people go home at staggered rates which reduces the number of patrons on the street at any given time.. All patrons on the street at the same time... what a nightmare.

- I myself like drinking straight spirits on the rocks I sip it at a slower rate then a normal drink so I wouldn\'t like that being stopped. Shots however... mixed bag there it could be a good thing and could accept this change however you might find people ordering bulk amount of shots right before 12 just to get them in. You start trying to control people too much then tend to rebel against it.
- -Pokies.... well thats just silly on so many levels and I hope the government has the intelligence to know why otherwise we are being led by money hungry self-agenda pushing ding bats. But if you want me to explain it.... so many people have gambling problems and why on earth would you promote this as an alternative entertainment option. Not to mention that you could have an educated guess that only larger business and hotels have these facilities so it screws small business operators who work very hard to earn a living and do everything in their power to create safe environments.
- Bottleshops, I don\'t have a problem with this there are already too many bottle shops operating per capita and pre-loading is a huge problem to the late night community.
- Exemptions for Casinos. WOW good on you government reward big money cause of silly reasons and make it harder for the little guy. I just don't understand this logic at all. Your pockets must get lined nicely from them.

Yes, one of my most reliable clients is a late night venue, they contribute to at least 70-80% of my weekly income. I don\t want to move I love Airlie Beach and want to do nothing but contribute to its future but if this income got taken away from me I would have no other choice as I feel would be the case for numerous people. Our employment market isn\t that great as it is, this would make it a lot harder for people who work in the industry.







I feel that the proposals are unfair. I feel that exemptions for Casinos and Pokies is illogical given the problems associated with gambling in our society. I also feel that Musicians, Visual Artists, Performers, Bookers, Promoters, Sound Technicians, Lighting Technicians, Venue Operators/Managers are being forgotten/swept under the rug. The proposals appear, in my opinion, seem to encourage gambling, casinos and pokies. In my opinion these proposals are not dealing with societal problems with addiction and anti-social behaviour.

Q: How would the proposed wind back in trading hours and changes to Lockouts affect you? Would it result in

less work/job losses? Would it result in a loss of freedoms? Would it affect your social life negatively?

If venues have less income, I can only imagine that they will spend less money on Original Music. This would affect more than just Musicians. There are several other associated jobs with a gig. Personally, I am offended that these proposals would only allow me to gamble (when I am not interested in it) after a certain time, when I would rather support performers and venues that do. I don\'t drink alcohol, I attend venues to watch and support original music. That is my social life. If I am unable to do this anymore, my social life would be significantly affected.

Q: How would the bans on certain types of drinks after 12am affect you/your business/your experience?

From an overall perspective, this would affect who would be able to stay in a venue. I don\'t drink alcohol, but my friends do. If they are restricted in what they are allowed to enjoy, I don\'t imagine my experience would be very enjoyable either.

I imagine that opportunities for musicians would be reduced. I imagine that public drinking may become a problem, if people don\'t have a licensed venue to go to. I imagine problem gambling will continue, if not worsen. I imagine venues will close. I imagine lots of people will lose their jobs. I imagine some people may want to leave Brisbane/Queensland in order to do the jobs they want to do in a place that does not restrict their choice of career.

Q: How do you feel about the fact that whilst venues that support youth culture (local bands, DJs, contemporary music) will not be able to serve drinks after certain times, other venues will be allowed to have poker machines running all night, some without a lockout?

I think that addictions, including gambling, are a problem in our society and I do not feel that the proposal addresses this. I find it completely unbalanced.

Q: How do you feel attending nightclubs and live music venues compares (in terms of social interactions and community interests) with the community benefit of playing poker machines?

I would rather talk to a person and enjoy music/performances than look at a poker machine. Especially when I don\'t gamble. Even if I did - I think people are more interesting than machines.

Q: What are your ideas for better ways to reduce anti-social behaviour and change culture in this space? If you were in parliament, what would you do?

I don't have the answers. I do feel that social services in general are under-funded and there are not enough community programs supported. Social Services workers are also over-worked and underpaid in my opinion.

Don\'t do it. Please. This means my job. This means the jobs of my friends. This is also my social life. Thanks.

It\'s a real shame that politicians and government advisors think this is an effective solution to a problem rooted much deeper within in our culture. Additionally the exemption of casinos and pokies machines clearly shows how much influence money has over legislation. Decisions aren't as much based on what is right for the community

I enjoy dancing to music and partying till the sun comes up and sometimes well in to the morning. What it will do however is put myself and many other people like me in places where neighbours might complain of loud music, or to illegal warehouse raves etc. which aren\'t regulated nor do they have the safety requirements that actual entertainment venues have.







The proposed lockout laws will have a devastating effect on the entertainment precinct. Small and large business owners will not be able to trade and will quickly close, the buzz and vibe created that draws tourists to visit will cease to exist, friends hours will be cut and they will no longer be able to live comfortably - the list goes on.

People that enjoy a drink and party with friends will be forced to attend unsupervised venues that are not policed and the thought of this scares me - we are no longer looking at alcohol fuelled violence, we are looking at people dying and underground parties taking place in the suburbs.





If the cowboys had an 8pm game which is held in the suburbs patrons wouldn\t get into the city until 11.30 -12 which costs them \$50 in a taxi to have 1 hr before last drinks, thats ridiculous. They would stop coming into the city and stay at the suburban pubs with pokies so they can drink longer and potentially drink drive to get home as their car is only around the corner. So the pubs with multi million dollar owners/pokies will remain open (as the government get a cut of their pokie takings) with over crowded patrons in less policed areas instead of spreading the people around the city and letting people be young and have a good time where they want not where they told.

As I\'ve mentioned above that is ridiculous. People spend their life savings on pokie machines and maybe \$100 on a Saturday night out in a late night venue, as well as pay for a taxi home. So you want to close small businesses and reduce taxi jobs so people can gamble and spend \$1000s in one sitting. Sounds like the government has all the wrong reasons to introduce these laws.

Its depressing watching people sit there all day hoping for that win. They don't talk to anyone they look depressed.
