I have created an entire lifestyle for myself based upon my work in the night-time economy. As an entertainer I also get to play and connect with people - I would never have met some of my closest friends (people I now consider family) if not for the night life in Qld.

For a start, why should Casinos or Pokies be exempt? Sounds to me like big business trying to establish more of a stranglehold on the industry, at the expense of local business owners and operators.

Generally, the night-life doesn\'t peak here until around 1am - these new laws would drastically effect this - people in my position stand to lose a lot of potential income, and many hospitality staff stand to lose their jobs, or at least a good portion of their weekly hours.

As for banning certain types of drinks - haven\'t we learned yet that prohibition doesn\'t work? How about some

actual education and campaigns about responsible drinking instead of dictating to people what they are or aren\'t allowed to do with their recreational time.

-----

Q: How would the proposed wind back in trading hours and changes to Lockouts affect you? Would it result in less work/job losses? Would it result in a loss of freedoms? Would it affect your social life negatively?

This one is complicated - due to local laws applying to busking (assuming they don\'t change) - the new lockout and trading hours may be beneficial in some ways (being able to busk between lockout and last drinks, which we can\'t do now, as busking has a 3am cutoff in Townsville\'s Entertainment Precinct.. BUT, the new trade times could drastically reduce the number of people who choose to come out and enjoy the precinct, as many don\'t even start coming out until after midnight... one of two things could happen, either they will come out earlier (good for me) or not come out at all (bad for everyone).

From a venue musician point of view, however - many of us will lose work - bands here usually play from around 10pm-2am and paid reasonably for our services - however venue owners have already stated that the entertainment budget is the first place they will reduce spending if these laws are put in place - so already, I know I\m going to lose income and potential opportunities - as will many others. The music industry is already hard enough to work in, we don\t need it being made any harder.

Perhaps indirectly - but I do notice it is after 12am that busking trade improves and the \"mood\" in the Entertainment Precinct reaches that peak point..

From speaking to local venue owners and operators I know that many of these places are already struggling - these laws could quite well force many of these venues to close - taking away from the already limited opportunities for hospitality workers and musicians/DJs.

As a musician, I find the threat of losing so much work could potentially mean I will have to leave the state/country to pursue my career - and I wouldn\'t be alone in this.

Utterly disgusted.

Poker machines add no value to our community whatsoever, they simply suck people\'s hard earned money out of them for a cheap thrill.

Venues supporting culture, however, give a lot to the community - from a place for an aspiring band/artist to start out or make a living, to the general atmosphere being one of coming together and celebrating music/life/culture.

Q: How do you feel attending nightclubs and live music venues compares (in terms of social interactions and community interests) with the community benefit of playing poker machines?

A poker machine seems to have very little in the way of \"community benefit\" - how much of the money that gets put through them actually goes back into the community? I would assume very little - all the while the people in our community are the ones feeding the money into the machines, for it to line the pockets of the people who own the machines - which in most cases isn\'t even the venue that the machine occupies. These machines also encourage anti-social behaviour (sitting by oneself staring at a machine for hours on end focused

on the game instead of the people around you is NOT social). Gambling is also as much of a problem in our society as Alcoholism..

In my opinion and experience, nightclubs and live music venues (esp. live music venues) provide much more in the way of an environment in which to socialize comfortably and have fun together with other members of the community. Also, as far as entertainment goes, it takes one person to maintain a room full of poker machines (1 job) whereas a live band or other form of entertainment will usually involve more than 1 person.. so more people in our community get work from one of these venues - which further stimulates the LOCAL economy.

-----

Q: What are your ideas for better ways to reduce anti-social behaviour and change culture in this space? If you were in parliament, what would you do?

Harsher penalties for said anti-social behaviour, more emphasis on RSA, and also on Responsible CONSUMPTION of Alcohol. Longterm bans from entertainment precincts and venues for repeat offenders. Just to name a few.

Also, potentially a shift away from Alcohol as our primary drug of choice for entertainment - which we know leads to violence and depression. Lift the prohibition on certain other drugs and allow them to be produced with quality control and sold by venues in controlled amounts.

MDMA, for instance, when used properly in the right amounts from a source that could be regarded as safe, may be a much better alternative to drinking. It\'s already being shown to be effective medicinally, so why not recreationally as well, provided the right controls are in place? (This is just one example and does not mean I condone the use of Illegal Drugs - just that with proper research, we may find other alternatives to alcohol that may help reduce the amount of anti-social behaviour relating to it.

Q: Any other comments?

These laws seem, at a glance, to be quite draconian, and of major benefit to gambling operators above anyone else. Not fair, and poorly thought out.

Also, from talking to people that use the precinct since these laws were proposed, it is quite clear to me that no one actually involved in the industry (as a patron or worker) supports this idea - it will cost us money, jobs and negatively impact our lifestyle.

The people say NO.


Shots after Midnight I dont have a problem with.

This means more strain on taxi ranks and buses and most probably more violence. It also means that people will be on the street when they want to be in a bar, causing frustration and aggravation that will likely also lead to an increase in violence. I believe the changing of lockout times would make it less safe for me to live in Fortitude Valley.

I enjoy going out with friends on weekends, but we usually don\'t go out until near 12am midnight. A lot of my friends work in the bars, so they aren\'t able to join until after they\'re done work, if they can get of before current 3am lockout. For example, my best friend works on the door at The Woolshed, and works until 2am. But she usually joins up with us after she\'s done. If the lockouts were pushed earlier, I wouldn\'t get a chance to have social outtings with my friends that work in the industry.

My job would suffer as my performance is dependent on bookings and revenue. Party bookings and events would see a downturn, about half of my party bookings don\t arrive until later in the night, 12am-1am.

Q: How would the bans on certain types of drinks after 12am affect you/your business/your experience?

Yes, I only drink spirit drinks. I think taking the choice away for drinks would negatively affect my experience going out. Especially because I usually don\'t arrive until 12am.

Cairns is heavily based around the hospitality industry due to the amount of tourism we attract. A lot of business would be affected. I fear that the smaller bars and venues would shut down. Having worked in several bars in town, I can say that the crowds generally don\'t roll in until later. So shutting them out early, would result in heavy losses in revenue for all. Locals especially don\'t go out until 12am-1am. If they\'re locked out, they will be likely to hit the streets and try to drive home for house parties. I definitely think there would be more drink driving, a major danger to the public.

I am a music industry veteran who has been performing in the Fortitude Valley for over 15 years.

Approximately 10 years ago when the original lockout laws came in, I was DJ-ing every Saturday night at Rics Cafe in the Valley. As soon as the laws came into effect, my club night started to die, and I lost my job within 3 months.

It has taken me 10 years to build up my business again, and I finally have a successful club night again every Friday and Saturday night in The Valley. I also work Thursday nights in West End.

Due to the current uncertainty about the future of the laws, I am currently unable to even ask about the prospect of a raise, even though my club makes about \$30 thousand every Saturday night for the last year.

I have never personally experienced any violence in The Valley except from Police, Security Guards, and people who were looking to get into a fight. I have noticed though, that the timing of violence seems unrelated to how late it is in the night.

I have also noticed that unnecessary and arbitrary lockout laws contribute to excessively long taxi lines and aggressive behaviour.

My employers, although legitimate and successful, are rightfully terrified of the impact that these laws will have on their business.

The licensing fees and rents leave very little margin for profit (as Saturday night profits have to cover the whole weeks expenses), and the employees like me on the bottom of the food chain do not get a slice of the profits,

especially now that the prospect of massive losses are imminent.

I expect to lose my job again within 3 months of the new laws passing.

## IN CONCLUSION:

I implore you to please not change the laws again, as I know from personal experience that any changes will be devastating to the livelihoods of artists and young people who work in the entertainment industry. We do not contribute to violent behaviour.

The police should be able to take care of this, along with responsible service of alcohol, and lifetime bans for violent offenders.



I believe these proposals will only create more problems. It will encourage preloading on drinks before heading out to clubs, faster consumption of alcohol during serving hours and house parties in suburban areas with absence of security and police. These laws are going to result in businesses closing, job losses and a drop in SEQ economy. 

I am a therapist, social worker, entertainer, listener. We also provide a safe outlet for those who are sexually inclined to express their desires. If you take away the safe montitored environment (both parties are consenting to the act) imagine what the rape and sexual assault numbers will be? We\'re already seeing those numbers increase to the sexualisation and women being abused on tv, radio etc the media. They play a much bigger role in influencing young people and their behaviour. Every song you hear is a commercial for some brand of alcohol and or drugs followed by threatening and violent lyrics and gestures by the artists. Taking away the only safe place for people to \' party\' ( our police and security guards do an amazing job) will only make the violence escalate.

Promoting gambling is just downright wrong. You can already gamble 24/7 which is much more dangerous. Forcing people to go to the casino will only attract more

Gambling addicts and drug addicts alike. All sorts of crime will escalate. People will \'preload\' and \'load up\' before 12am anyway. People will sneak in flasks of alcohol and add it on themselves (a practice that happens a or in a lot of venues since the liquor taxes were increased. Drugs have also been on the rise particularly ice and ecstasy which are so cheap and alcohol has become much more expensive people are opting to do more drugs

and less alcohol to save money. How on earth can that be good for society? Also if we are affected by lockout laws then so should the casinos. Why Are they exempt? You\re point of alcohol fuelled violence is invalid if certain venues are exempt? Locking everyone up like sardines in the same place with people they wouldn\t normally associate with isn\t going to cause issues? The problem people fight is rape culture (most \punch ups\' start in the club because some unknown make has sexually assaulted someone\s girlfriend or sister or whatever the case may be. Or a simple misunderstanding, drink spilt, friends having a disagreement, drugs and steroid abuse. Also people get frustrated trying to get home of a morning there\s too many people and not anyway for some to get home so they wait. Wait for the trains, buses, lifts etc. when you\'ve been drinking all night and you\'ve worked all week when the night is over you just want to go home. Sometimes you can wait for a taxi for half an hour or more. This is taking away our civil rights and Liberties. We should not be punished for the actions of a few.

I would not have a job or an income, many of my regulars don\t come in until midnight 1am so I would lose all of my clientele. They work long hours and some have families. It will affect me and all women because rape and sexual assault numbers will skyrocket a lot of the Indian Community refuse to go to brothels but will go to a strip club instead of assaulting some poor girl in the street. Some men cannot control themselves. Most of these men don\t drink alcohol to get drunk they may have 5 whiskeys in 4 hours but they\re on the rocks and they\re enjoyed not slammed. The art of adult entertainment will be lost, our live music and struggling muso scene will diminish to almost nothing. Especially alternate venues like crowbar and bright side who play metal music. An already struggling scene will go back to playing in small houses in west end and done by 10pm because of the noise laws. More young people will take to Roaming the streets. House/street parties will be out of control. You can\t stop people \'partying\' but you can provide a safe environment for us to do so.

It would affect my business as my customers don't finish work until late and therefore donor start drinking until 10pm or later. Most people are finishing dinner after a long day. People will continue to binge drink at home or at house parties etc. Also what\'s the point in going out if you\'re only there for 3-4 hours? I can\'t count the amount of times I\'ve missed lockout (sometimes by a minute) or been refused at 2:55am. People will miss out just because they knocked off work 5 mins late and got the red light and missed the lockout. It\'s unfair and unjustified.

I went to Newcastle once. I never went back. I also went to Sydney as an adult of legal drinking age and never went back to either places because they were the two of worst and most boring trips away I have ever had. Brisbane is already melbournes annoying little brother if you will. Always trying to keep up and impress. We were heading that way in terms or music, art, nightlife, food, culture. Culture is Something that Melbourne is renowned for! If you impose these laws you will take us back to the dark ages and undo all of our beautiful city\'s \'cultural growth\'. You will take away a way of life. The hospitality industry is a thriving one and keeps people coming to and coming back to Brisbane. Queensland will fade away, tourists will stop coming, crime will be rampant, there will many more job cuts than what you have anticipated. This will create a domino effect. We saw these exact scenarios (aforementioned comments) happen more frequently as a result of the mining bust. We are only really seeing and feeling the negative effects of that loss of revenue and patronage. Do this and this state\'s economy will plummet. This new casino cannot save the economy on its own.

Poker machines are addictive and destructive. More families are torn apart each year over gambling. I used to work in gaming for years prior to this in a range of different venues and I saw more violence and aggression in

TAB\'s, poker machine and keno areas than I ever did at the bars and nightclubs. Its unjust because gambling and liquor are addictive yet they\'re legal. Liquor is being restricted yet gambling isn\'t? Being a night worker and natural night owl my whole life I don\'t fully wake up until late in the afternoon, dinner around 9 then head out to see a band until 11pm by the time I get to the club I have one hour to drink the type of alcohol I like to drink. The people who are aggressive and violent drinkers are mostly alcoholics that can and will drink copious amounts of anything alcoholic they can get their hands on and drink enough of it until it has the desired effect. Capping and restricting certain drinks will not work in these cases. As they will just load up more on beer or worse. Chroming may also increase.

Q: How do you feel attending nightclubs and live music venues compares (in terms of social interactions and community interests) with the community benefit of playing poker machines?

When you sit and stare at a computer screen for too long you lose track of time and how much you spent. People get lost in those places. They have their own nightclubs, food, bars, cocktail bars etc! All with the flashing lights and winning alarm bells and cheering etc preying on the weak and desperate who wouldn\t normally step into a casino under usual circumstances. What\s the difference? Alcohol fuelled violence in the bars and nightclubs or at the casino? It\s the same result either way the problem will not be fixed. Playing poker machines is boring and mind numbing. Intelligent bright young individuals (future creators of tomorrow, inventors of things we haven\t thought of yet) want diversity, stimulation, different media avenues to explore, underground music scene and other less known musicians trying to get their stuff out there on limited funds (everyone has to start somewhere) and drunk people love it and don\t notice if you make a mistake it\s the perfect platform to start out performing live. Playing poker machines does not contribute to society at all. How does that make us grow and learn and be better people? Music, arts, interactions, meeting new like-minded people (ie- crowbar at 2am to see the a local band play and leave having made some new friends bonding over music), sharing life experiences. Poker machines are depressing and do not encourage people to interact or be social at all. I would not call playing the pokies a social activity.

Q: What are your ideas for better ways to reduce anti-social behaviour and change culture in this space? If you were in parliament, what would you do?

Reduce the amount of noise the clubs make. Often the volume is up way to loud and is contributing to a lot of the misunderstandings which result in physical violence because one person misheard the other. (I have sorted out many a fight over this exact scenario)

Stop/penalise venues which serve \$3 basics etc there should be a set price for a minimum charge for a drink,. Uni students especially load up on these cheapies (sometimes 4 at a time per person)

More and harsher penalties imposed for those who do display negative behaviour of violence.

This is the most important. In over 10 years of being in hospitality (I\'ve managed venues, functions, worked as a cook, apprentice, gaming attendant and bartender) the amount of repeat offenders I encountered causing trouble in multiple venues over time was staggering. These people just kept getting away with it and kept pushing it. They didn\'t care if they got kicked out they would just walk around the corner and go into the next venue. We need a tough love BANNING SYSTEM. If you are asked to leave a venue more than once in a period of 3 months or something you get a warning (which is recorded as a strike on your record)

As for any form of physical violence both parties (if 1st offence) are banned from the nightclubs altogether so if any venue in Qld scans that persons ID it will come up a red flag saying banned, details of the ban, date of ban, days until patron may return and will lock the operator out of the system and the manager must come down and clear the screen to make sure that patron does not sneak in after being banned. I guarantee you if I couldn\'t go

cases should have a ban of 5 years. Anyone else involved in severe aggressive behaviour should be banned for 12 months to 2 years

I guarantee if I couldn\'t go out where all my friends were to party I would be sad and I would certainly think twice before starting anything when I am finally off my ban. Punishing those who abuse their alcohol and create violence will be filtered out and that\'s enough to scare most people into behaving. They might appreciate our nightlife a little more and each other.

I don't think the mental health system can handle the amount of inpatients they're going to have to intake if this

all goes ahead. My industry has been suffering for a couple of years now since the mining bust and this is just another kick in the guts for Queenslanders. We are struggling individually, families, as a state, as a nation, as a planet. Please don't put us below the poverty line just to make the casino owners happy or because they lobbied and had the most money to get the laws passed. It\'s profit funneling and downright wrong! Think about what you\re doing? At a time when we should be creating jobs we\re talking about destroying 150 million worth of already perfectly fine jobs. All because of the actions of a few? I see the security at our venue turn away so many customers and he\'s unsure if they\'re intox or not they don\'t even get the benefit of the doubt anymore the bars and clubs have had a zero tolerance policy and have tightened up on all the rules over the last few years as far as I could see we were losing business already just by complying with the new bikie laws, changes to the responsible service and all the one punch deaths. We saw a dramatic decrease just by keeping an eye on people and refusing those who the security were unsure of no chances. And 80% of our customers are told to have a water for 10-15 mins before their first drink. We have adequate seating, low volume music (so you can still hear eachother\'s whist engaged in conversation) distractions from alcohol (girls on stage as if youd want to be at the bar when you\'ve got a show to watch) and our staff are trained in RSA and go above and beyond looking after our patrons. The violence in strip clubs is minuscule compared to the levels being discussed here in other venues across Qld. I don't agree with these laws whatsoever at all but I\m calling your bluff on \'alcohol fuelled violence\' as the reason for this drastic intervention because of that we\'re the case strip clubs would be treated the same as casinos. But that\'s not the case now is it? Because as far as I\'m concerned we don\'t have any. The majority of our \'incidents\' are when customers are told the rules 3 times and they sexually violate one of the girls and are asked to leave and want their money back. That\'s often the case. Has nothing to do with alcohol at all. Let\'s work out a solution together that benefits both parties. Maybe even a trial basis? We have 6 months or 12 months or something to clean it all up and get the numbers at record lows and then maybe impose some different punishments. This punishment just affects too many people and their livelihoods, for some their survival for the awful actions of sociopaths who cannot handle the cocktail of drugs, alcohol, pre workout and steroids they had before coming out. That\'s the real issue. Not the place and provisions taken away or restricted. Like I said before people will still do it if they want to it just won\'t be at that location where there is safety. I\'m begging you; you will ruin a lot of lives with this. Please reconsider.

Being that a lot of my friends work in the music industry (are singers, musicians and performers) being able to have drinks and celebrate or catch up throughout the night is sometimes the only time that works (as I work during the days). Brisbane\'s restaurants and other venues around south bank & the city, already close down FAR too early compared to other cities like Sydney and Melbourne. You can\'t go and hang out with friends after 12 unless you\'re at the club here, and now proposals to change even this will make Brisbane a ghost town.

Many young people and young adults work in hospitality and can\'t have their time to enjoy some drinks or music until they finish work. An even earlier lockout would inhibit all those people who work in industries that operate at night. People will get drunk if they want in Australia, and many do it during the day. Lockouts and serving restrictions won\'t change the issues some people really have with alcohol, so you can\'t impose a punishment on whole industries and communities just to ATTEMPT to deal with someone\'s personal issues.

Invest more in educating young men and women on the importance of mental health care, and campaign to eliminate the stigma of seeing a counsellor. People who are using alcohol to suppress deep personal issues, will get drunk and be aggressive anytime and anywhere. 

Now at 20 years old, after having been a DJ for almost a year and establishing myself, an income, and the start of a great career, I LOVE nightlife. I have a massive passion for making sure everyone has a good time, dancing, drinking, talking, laughing and creating memories and forming bonds. I/m a massive believer in the opportunity to let your hair down and spend the night having fun in Fortitude Valley after a week of working hard, I do it almost every weekend. It/'s definitely a huge part of my life, even when I/m not DJ/'ing!

Clubs do not stay open if they are not making money, it\'s fact. When people stop buying drinks, they will soon

close as to not lose money on the night. Clubs will shut at 2AM or soon thereafter. Most headline acts start at 2AM, and many of my closes start at 3AM. A club shutting at 2AM is literally cutting the night in half, for patrons and staff. These close shifts are incredibly key to climbing the ladder and working towards my dream of being an international DJ - if they go, my dreams will have been stomped on viciously, and become unrealistic. Again, in precincts having a 3AM last drinks is not much better. The amount of work that will be lost is massive.

The exemptions for casinos seems incredibly random. Why? What\'s the reasoning? Do you want drunks to stumble into already packed casinos? They\'re not able to handle many more people, and if clubs shut early, they will go there for more alcohol, and probably make bad gambling decisions. Is that really desirable?

It would ruin everything I\'ve worked for in my career to be honest. Jobs would be lost, and it\'s certainly a freedom being taken away. The bonds I\'ve formed, the people I only see out because we live on opposite sides of the city, the kind of connections made in a nightclub with mutual appreciation of the fun and the music would be squandered. I honestly LOVE nightlife, was inspired by it and am making a career out of it. These lockout lows would inhibit my personal progress, and make it very difficult for others to get that same inspiration, which is honestly a crime. It makes me feel sick in the stomach.

It's just not the kind of drink for that time of night. Banning spirits late at night, disabling the ability for a friend to buy a round of shots for everyone and make the night really take off is ridiculous. It's literally the kickstarter to a great night, where the music is loved, the drinks flow, the club makes money and the patrons have a good time. It's actually pretty imperative.

Q: How do you think these changes would affect your local area? Do you foresee businesses closing? Do you foresee job losses? Do you foresee opportunities for musicians reduced? Do you think the vibrancy of your local area would be diminished?

I foresee the smaller clubs closing, and the major clubs having to raise their prices for entry and drinks, because of the extra traffic coming their way & the far smaller time period for them to make their money. Clubs can struggle to make enough money to maintain themselves as it is - this is a nail in the coffin for SO many businesses, and their employees. I\'ve mentioned it before, but my DJ career would go down the drain, which would honestly make me gutted. Clubs have huge rosters of DJs to keep everything fresh and fun, but cutting half the time they can play means cutting half of the roster. This would keep the bigger DJs where they are at their venue, and make getting a job as a DJ very difficult. DJs are often tentative with accepting other gigs and growing their career when they have a residency, because they don\'t want to lose their spot. The lockout laws would make them absolutely petrified, and they\'d be sure to never leave their spots, thus never leaving an opportunity for the younger DJs to fill in. This would make nightlife much more stagnant, because fresh and exciting DJs are imperative to a club\'s quality and attractiveness. Just another way in which they will hurt Queenslanders. It\'s incredibly unAustralian to inhibit anyone\'s path to success, and I\'m honestly embarrassed about the governments lack of care in regards to this.

The problem is not drugs or alcohol. I know plenty of people that partake in both, sometimes in large amounts that never cause a single problem. The problem is largely aggressive males, who don\'t know how to deal with situations that arise. I say this as a male myself. The problem is the culture of getting angry and resorting to violence over issues like being bumped into, partner problems, disagreements with friends. I rarely see fights, and if I do, it\'s certainly for a reason. It is never someone just feeling like hitting someone because they\'ve had alcohol - thats kind of preposterous. Also, forcing people the amount of people in a club out at 3am is insane - you do NOT want that many people in Fortitude Valley at one time, that is a nightmare, and people will definitely get hurt. They need to trickle out from around 2 till 5 for it to be safe. I\'ve honestly never felt unsafe in the Valley at all, but I\'m positive that a thousand people being pushed out onto the street at 3 would make me feel that way.

My solution for violence at nightclubs would be harsher penalties, and working with nightclubs to actually apprehend anyone involved in a fight. People normally just get thrown out after a scuffle and they make their way home. This leaves the aggressive male even more disgruntled, with nothing but his night shortened as punishment. Does that not seem wrong?? He should at least be jailed for the night, fined, SOMETHING. Violence is disgusting, and needs to be treated as an incredibly serious crime. But ruining our nightlife culture, livelihoods, businesses, jobs, social lives for the vast majority that are not violent, is the WRONG thing to do.

I work in a bar, the night time economy therefore pays my rent. Moreover I spend a majority of my leisure time (being now a night owl by nature) contributing to the night time economy. For me and many others this economy revolves in this manner.

Q: What are your positive experiences working/playing in the night-time economy?

I have spent my entire Australian experience working and playing in the night time economy of Queensland it has therefore been the pivotal structure of my relationships and memories of this country. Through the night time economy I have found friends for a lifetime and met many inspiring people - in both colleagues and patrons. These night time workers come from all walks of life. They are parents trying to pay off their mortgage and provide a full life for their children or they are students struggling the balance between work and study - but they have no choice and they also find the night time economy fulfilling, as I do. I have met business owners and entrepreneurs who have come from nothing and built a life for themselves and many others, all thanks to the night time economy. As a Londoner, I find the night time options and precincts within Brisbane limited and these suggested bans and limits on trading to venues and small businesses seems ludicrous and absolutely opposed to the nationwide focus upon small business and community mindedness. For me the new casino in Brisbane coinciding with the suggested new liquor laws is no coincidence but completely conspiratorial.

I thoroughly enjoy my job and I have been working in the night time economy for nearly six years in both the UK and Australia and I would not change the experience for anything. Altering lock-out laws in Queensland will not have a positive impact on any supposed alcohol-fuelled violence problems it will merely shift the problem to the suburbs and to unregulated situations at people\'s homes or increase drug related issues in the hours after 1am.

- last drinks at 2am as mentioned earlier this will only increase supposed issues and constraints on police officers and emergency services as patrons will look to other means by either abusing recreational drugs or spreading outwards and continuing their nights in the suburbs where there are no police, managers or bar staff to regulate their drinking, there will be a direct increase in drug related incidences and call-outs to suburban areas.
- 1am lock outs in precincts with 3am last drinks. For me this will directly affect me economically. I will effectively lose between four and six hours of work a week as a result of this regulation. This will mean that I will have nearly \$200 less income each week, and nearly \$200 less to potentially put back into the Australian economy. Multiply my reduced income by all the other night time workers that lose hours or even jobs as a result of these proposed regulations and I believe that equals to a huge loss in Queensland\'s economy.
- no shots or straight spirits after 12am and potentially a ban on cocktails and RTDs Firstly shots, straight spirits, cocktails and RTDs are not necessarily bywords for \'strong\'. I know from my knowledge as a bartender that quite often cocktails and shots (especially popular mixed shots) are not any stronger than mixed drinks as they are also mixed. Moreover a ban on these strands of alcoholic drinks is offensive to both the bartenders ability to judge a patrons intoxication level and the patrons right to choose their night out. In the manner of specific drinks it is also worth remembering that not all patrons drink \'to get drunk\' some wish to enjoy a scotch, whiskey, bourbon, gin, tequila, vermouth, vodka, or whichever as they like it, whether it be mixed, on the rocks or neat. The hour of the day should not be import, the only matter should be whether the bartender or waiter judges that the patron may have already had too much to drink. A paying patron should have the right to soberly leave their home after midnight and be served a straight spirit, shot, cocktail or RTD without question.
- Pokies to be allowed to continue to operate after last drinks Last drinks in precincts are proposed to be 3am this is as Queensland Government insists this will reduce alcohol related violence. However the continued operation of Pokie machines past last drinks suggests that the government trusts the Queensland population to have their own faculties enough to gamble at their own will and loss (and to the eventual benefit of none other than the Queensland Government) whereas they do not trust the population to be able to consume liquor (unless it\'s within the casino, of course). I feel I needn\'t exemplify how nonsensical this is my point stands on its own. Moreover patrons are not trusted to consume shots, straight spirits, cocktails or RTDs, under the pretence of their own protection, after midnight yet Queensland will allow them to continue throwing their money into \"banker always wins\" machines. Domestic violence and alcohol problems in this country are directly related to the availability of gambling machines. Queensland Government is not fighting a righteous war against alcohol related violence or incidences; it is looking to increase its own pocket by giving its new casino the monopoly.
- New bottle shops to close at 10pm, all existing to close at 12am This is nonsensical why? Why do existing bottle shops have more of a right to trade than new bottle shops?
- Exemptions for casinos I think we already know my stance on this. It\'s absurd. Why do Casinos have more of a right to serve alcohol than venues that provide entertainment in the form of music, dancing, theatre, comedy and art? Or venues that serve food? I think we both know that the profit margins that the Queensland Government are hoping to achieve by giving their casinos the monopoly of the night time market is the only reason for these proposed laws. The only benefit for this exemption is for the Casinos, their staff and for the Queensland Government. Whereas the economical losses to the street cleaners, police officers, restaurants, cafes, entertainment venues, taxi drivers et cetera., are far more detrimental to society as a whole.

Q: How would the proposed wind back in trading hours and changes to Lockouts affect you? Would it result in less work/job losses? Would it result in a loss of freedoms? Would it affect your social life negatively?

As expressed above the proposed wind back in hours would result in a loss of hours and thus a loss in wages, which would thereby result in less money being put back into the Queensland economy by myself. I cannot speak for everyone I know in the industry but I know that I put a lot back into it because I respect it and see its value; I want to support it and those involved.

It may result in a job loss for myself or for colleagues/fellow hospitality workers.

Q: How would the bans on certain types of drinks after 12am affect you/your business/your experience?

The ban on certain types of drinks will affect the company I work for. Patrons will ask for drinks and will be immediately refused service on the grounds of new legislation. It will up to the staff and management to reason with patrons as they insist that they are within their rights to choose their drinks (which many will be). Refusing patrons certain types of drinks within the venue will initially result in more violence and eventually result in more patrons looking to other means for a release - pre-loading, recreational drugs or unregulated drinking in homes. I see no benefits.

I live and work in the Fortitude Valley precinct. The area will die. I moved to this area because it was close to my work place. Many new businesses will cease to trade. I may lose my job. The buzz of Fortitude Valley which is so famed (for its day and night vibrancy) will be gone.

Again, nonsensical. I don\'t see poker machines as a culture or sociable. Venues that support art, theatre and music (especially on a local scale) are culturally valuable and should receive more government support. More often than not the fact that these venues serve alcohol as well as providing a space for culture to be fostered is by the by. If I want to see a musician or watch a piece of theatre I will come for that reason only and alcohol has nothing to do with this.

Touched on above - there is a direct correlation between violence, gambling and alcohol. The correlatio between violence, alcohol and nightclubs/live music venues is far smaller. Moreover nightclubs and live music venues encourage more positive social interactions and connections than gambling-oriented venues.

The violence already exists within a person, we just need to help each other deal with other problems so that we solve them practically and responsibly.
