I live on the West Side of Brisbane. I am a past uni student, have worked at Coles for 7 years and am also working as a bookkeepers assistant doing data entry and I am a receptionist. I have attended the RE on this side of town for many occasions, but the main place I go out is in the Valley. Q: Do you work in the Industry? No Q: In a few words, explain what role you play in the night time economy. I am a consumer/patron of the nightlife industry. I go out at least once a week to Fortitude Valley and prefer clubbing.

Q: Are you a patron of the nightlife and don't want to see it diminished?

Yes

Q: What are your positive experiences working/playing in the night-time economy?

Every time I go to the Valley I feel safe. I frequent Oh Hello and the Family. I always feel safe because the security guards keep a close eye on their regulars and all those that visit. I have been close to fights, but I know the venues well enough to know that trouble makers get bans and police get called. I have also been in venues when Police have done walk throughs. I have not once felt unsafe while out in the Valley.

Q: What do you think of the government's major proposals?

- * New last drinks time 2am instead of 5am
- * In precincts, 1am Lockout & 3am Last Drinks (effectively closing time) instead of 3am Lockout & 5am Close
- * No shots or straight spirits after 12am midnight, potentially bans on cocktails and RTDs
- * Pokies allowed to continue to operate after last drinks
- * New bottle shops to close at 10pm, all existing to close at 12am
- * Exemptions for Casinos 24 hour trading (and alcohol served)

I believe that there is a perfect opportunity here to completely ruin the hospitality industry.

In changing lock out laws and putting limits on drinks, if simply will cause people to binge drink making them more drunk much earlier. This opens up opportunity for patrons to become unwell, violent and unable.

Further, those patrons that do want to continue until the close of venues, will resort to drug use to continue their inebriation. I believe this will create more of a problem then leaving the laws as they are now could ever cause.

Q: How would the proposed wind back in trading hours and changes to Lockouts affect you? Would it result in less work/job losses? Would it result in a loss of freedoms? Would it affect your social life negatively?

I believe that this would impact on me badly. As a consumer, I happily accept the current 3am lockout and believe it staggers the taxi lines and the amount of people on the streets. With no more alcohol to drink, people will be going home earlier. And they will all be crowding the streets earlier which will just cause more fights and violence among the community.

Q: How would the bans on certain types of drinks after 12am affect you/your business/your experience?

I am a spirit drinker, as are most of my friends. With these laws coming in, I will not be enjoying my experience as much.

I also have friends who are bartenders and managers of clubs. They are going to lose their job, and at the minimum have it reduced. With jobs being a problem, isn\'t this something we would want to avoid? My friends work hard to make sure that everyone that attends their venues are safe and happy, and anyone who is trying to disrupt that gets dealt with quickly.

Q: How do you think these changes would affect your local area? Do you foresee businesses closing? Do you foresee job losses? Do you foresee opportunities for musicians reduced? Do you think the vibrancy of your local area would be diminished?

I believe that this is going to cause huge problems for my area. I live in an area which is rich in university students and young people. The lock out laws and early drink finishes are going to send people back into the suburbs to make more of a nuisance. Noise complaints will go up and it will be harder to keep track of intoxicated people as the party will go to a wider area.

Q: How do you feel about the fact that whilst venues that support youth culture (local bands, DJs, contemporary music) will not be able to serve drinks after certain times, other venues will be allowed to have poker machines running all night, some without a lockout?

I think it\'s silly. Gambling is just as much as a problem as alcoholism.

Q: How do you feel attending nightclubs and live music venues compares (in terms of social interactions and community interests) with the community benefit of playing poker machines?

Most of the people going to nightlife venues go to have a good time with their friends. Sure, it might be enhanced by alcohol however it is mostly just to listen to music, have a dance and enjoy their time amongst the surroundings.

Gambling is an addiction. It is done solo and I believe it to be antisocial. When people go out to gamble, it is to

When people go out to dance or drink, it\'s to have a good time.

Q: What are your ideas for better ways to reduce anti-social behaviour and change culture in this space? If you were in parliament, what would you do?

I believe that there should be harsher punishment for those who go to nightlife districts and are doing the wrong thing. For example, give bans to the drug dealers, assholes spiking drinks, sexual assaulters and people picking fights. Why punish those who are just going out to have a good time?

The Valley is quite unique to Brisbane and is famous around Australia as a vibrant night spot full of many different kinds of venues from small bars to big clubs. Not many cities have such a variety of night spots in one area and is full of people every weekend helping all kinds of shops flourish.

It\'s not only alcohol sales that help the economy but also food is sold and musicians need the clubs to promote their music and merchandise. Cutting this off would be bad for Brisbane\'s new reputation as a new world city.

I love live music as well as electronic music, as well as just hanging out with friends and dancing and partying. Some of the best DJ sets I\'ve ever seen and some of the best concerts I\'ve been to heavily relied upon a thriving nightlife industry. Having also worked in the industry for so many years, I was used to going out after work, and these new laws don\'t take into consideration people who don\'t work \"normal\" business hours.

They are unfair to the people who party responsibly, to the people who work shift work, and many of the laws are counterintuitive and don\'t make sense!! Lockouts encourage binge drinking, as well as massive crowds fighting over cabs. It\'s not fair to people who may want to see multiple DJs during a night, or meet friends in different bars. It\'s unfair to lovers of fine spirits--not being able to order the drink they want because a fine Scotch is classified as a \"shot\" (even though no one in their right mind would order a \$25 drink to shoot it). It\'s unfair to people who work shift work and want to be able to enjoy a knock off drink, the same as anyone who stops work at 5pm would. It will cost jobs and destroy a thriving culture, not to mention it will make QLD

a much less appealing place for tourists.

Q: How would the proposed wind back in trading hours and changes to Lockouts affect you? Would it result in less work/job losses? Would it result in a loss of freedoms? Would it affect your social life negatively?

It would mean I can\'t order the drink I want to order after midnight (which is usually not long after I go out), it would mean less DJs and musicians playing in Brisbane, it would mean more of my favourite nightclubs and bars are in danger of shutting down due to loss of revenue, and some of my friends who still work in the industry at risk of losing their jobs and livelihood. It would mean I don\'t have the freedom to meet up with any of my friends past 1am (when some of them would just be getting off work).

It would greatly diminish my experience: I love fine whiskies and tequilas, and while I don\'t drink them often, I like to be able to enjoy them when I go out to some of my favourite cocktail bars.

I foresee businesses closing, loss of tourism, job losses for some of my friends, opportunities for DJs and musicians greatly reduced, and the vibrancy and culture of the area diminished.

Q: How do you feel about the fact that whilst venues that support youth culture (local bands, DJs, contemporary music) will not be able to serve drinks after certain times, other venues will be allowed to have poker machines running all night, some without a lockout?

It\'s absolute bullshit. While I do believe people should also have the freedom to gamble when they want, it disgusts me that venues that promote or offer gambling would be the only ones exempt from these laws. Gambling (especially pokies) provide no culture to the area--in fact, they negatively affect culture and just promote antisocial behaviour and people throwing their money away.

Nightclubs and live music venues promote positive social interaction, inspiration, sharing of ideas, art, creativity, dancing, and shared enjoyment. Pokies do not benefit anyone except the people who own them, making a profit from them. They encourage people to sit by themselves and stare at a screen and lose money.

Q: What are your ideas for better ways to reduce anti-social behaviour and change culture in this space? If you were in parliament, what would you do?

I think the burden needs to be placed on venue owners and staff to patrol antisocial behaviour and cut off already intoxicated patrons. Police and security presence outside of venues would help reduce the likelihood of violence taking place there. And most importantly, relatable and real (not idealistic and moralistic) EDUCATION for young people on how to party responsibly, look out for their mates, speak up and do something when they see/encounter violence or people in trouble, and show respect for others.

Q: Any other comments?

Don\'t make a knee-jerk reaction and impede on people\'s freedoms. It will only kill an important and culturally significant industry.

Have any other methods been trialled and tested where everybody comes off better?



I think this proposal is ridiculous, people are much safer drinking in venues and going between venues as our job is to keep them safe and monitor their alcohol intake. There is city safe on the streets to monitor patrons between venues to keep them from hurting themselves and others and they also assist when security need back up. If these laws approve then more people will stay and drink at home and in outer suburbs where they have no one monitoring their intake of alcohol or their behaviour. There is no city safe to keep them safe and it will only cause massive neighbourhood disturbances. People live in outer suburbs for the peace and to be away from the party life that is downtown. They won\'t have this if this gets approved.

Q: How would the proposed wind back in trading hours and changes to Lockouts affect you? Would it result in less work/job losses? Would it result in a loss of freedoms? Would it affect your social life negatively?

Most of us that work in hospitality only get the chance to meet new people at work. If you take our best trading time away from us we will have cut hours, results in less money which leads to not being able to have a life outside of work as we will struggle to pay rent and bills. Which will push a lot of people to go onto Centrelink benefits which strains out already struggling public system.

Q: How would the bans on certain types of drinks after 12am affect you/your business/your experience?

I personally work at a higher end bar which had a bar specifically for fine whiskey and craft beer. Fine whiskey is not made to be consumed with post mix. Therefore many of our patrons will not be able to drink this whiskey which causes them to be very undatisfied with our venue and looses us money. Also if shots aren't allowed after midnight, which is when they are mostly ordered, we will have more purple decide to start drinking earlier which falls back into Resturant hours. Young families and older couples don't want their dinners disturbed by young teens out to have a party.

Q: How do you think these changes would affect your local area? Do you foresee businesses closing? Do you foresee job losses? Do you foresee opportunities for musicians reduced? Do you think the vibrancy of your local area would be diminished?

In all I foresee venues having to close down, many jobs lost, musicians will no longer have a venue to play at. The generally good vibe that is currently the cbd will be diminished and instead be filled with fights, drugs and illegal consumption of alcohol on the streets.

I think this is completely ridiculous. How does any venue differ from another?

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Q: What are your ideas for better ways to reduce anti-social behaviour and change culture in this space? If you were in parliament, what would you do?





I understand the proposed changes to alcohol laws, however as someone who doesn\'t like juice or soft drinks and usually drink alcohol on ice or with a bit of soda this will make it difficult for me to order drinks i enjoy on my nights off from work.

I think that the lockout laws will just cause more alcohol fuelled violence on the streets because there are still so many people out at 1am. I have worked the night before anzac day and good friday (where there is a 12pm close) and the number of people that were forced out onto the streets all at one time meant the streets were extremely crowded and there were a lot of aggressive people in the brunswick st mall as i was trying to walk through it to get home from work. From my experience working and going out almost all of the fights I\'ve seen happen on the street and not inside clubs. with the 3am lockout and 5am close people gradually go home,

staggering the number of people on the street at any given time. I think that with 1am lockout and 3am close there will be more people on the streets causing trouble instead of drinking inside a club.

I think it will also result in a massive increase in house parties, where there is absolutely no security, no alcohol consumption regulation and will likely result in noise complaints from neighbours.

the new lockout laws will definitely result in a loss of hours each week, and possible even job loss. Hospitality is the best industry for me to be working in while at university because the shift times do not clash with uni classes and i have the ability to make tips and get penalty rates for working nights and/or weekends. it would negatively affect my social life as i enjoy going out on my nights off, however if i wasnt able to go out i would just party at home with friends, as I\'m sure many other people will do, and house parties can easily end badly.

i don\'t drink soft drink or juice because they make me feel sick, so unless i will still be able to order alcohol with soda water i\'m likely to go and drink at home with friends.

if everyone else does the same this will significantly impact the profit of the club i am working at and will result in even more hour cuts and quite possible job loss.

I think the legislature and executive committees are not catering to those the laws will effect. It is a blanketed approach likely to have the reverse effect, with a possible rise of violence on the streets and a negative effect on the economy.

I have recently turned 18 and am yet to experience going out at night like my friends have. The passing of these laws would effect my whole group\'s (and possible age group\'s) approach to going out. After paying an entry fee for one place, with the limited time frame proposed in these new laws, there wouldn\'t be a point to paying to enter any other venue, we would go to one venue or none at all.

All of my friends and I only drink spirits, so if we could only order them before 12 we probably wouldn\'t go out at all.

Since I left school I have constantly worked in hospitality except maybe 2 months when I was in between jobs and while all of this was happening in my life Centrelink turned me away time and time again when I was genuinely struggling and trying to find work in a town that had nothing to offer. When I moved to Brisbane it was an amazing change because there is so much work on offer for people like myself who strive to make a change in hospitality. The fear of knowing that you will take my working privilege away and not be able to financially compensate me is terrifying. Hospitality is a very huge industry which make huge money on a daily basis and with these laws it\'s slowly going to dry up all the clientele that we have worked hard to provide a wonderful service to. You issue against violence and crimes throughout our nightlife will not be resolved by this. If the government are truly concerned about these issues then perhaps they should look at supplying the streets with more police officers rather then jeopardising perfectly good venues.

By placing these bans it\'s going to push out clientele away which will slowly impact the cashflow of the business further more resulting in loss of jobs as employers won\'t be earning the money to be able to keep all of us staff working. I think that if you are happy to serve someone a beer or a basic spirit then why not a shot, cocktail or rtd? Honestly did anyone think about this? People will still consume as much alcohol as they would like whether it comes from a bottle or glass so this is really not going to make any situation better again. I am a local freelance photographer based and always lived in Brisbane. I work and play in the Brisbane CBD/Fortitude Valley/Inner City precincts and sometimes in the outer suburbs. Q: Do you work in the Industry? Photography Q: In a few words, explain what role you play in the night time economy. I as a freelance photographer am hired independently through various venues to take photographs of patrons,

events and performances. My work ends up in advertising collateral and social media to help promote the venues and bring income to these places which in turn is a positive impact on the Brisbane economy. About 70% of my income is from these clients and this importantly helps me support myself and my business (pay rent, expenses and so on).

Q: Are you a patron of the nightlife and don't want to see it diminished?

Yes

Q: What are your positive experiences working/playing in the night-time economy?

In terms of my work this night time economy has helped me build my own business and become a positive contribution to the Brisbane economy - supporting myself and my business - paying tax etc. Through my work and also as a patron I have also met many amazing people and experienced many great shows. In the past few months alone I have managed to see some of my favourite artists do shows in Brisbane and had fantastic evenings with friends seeing these shows. The hospitality industry in Brisbane is superior to many other places I have visited (internationally as well) and this is a great asset to our Tourism Industry. We are so lucky to have so many amazing places to visit and enjoy a drink with friends, and meet other people that add to our lives positively. In working in the industry I\'ve made some amazing what would sure to be life long friends with similar passions for music, and these are people I would not have known existed as these night time economy not be as thriving and good as it is currently.

I am 27 years of age, and I have been going out in these precints for the entire 9 years it has been legal for me to do so. During this time I have only ever seen 2 fights. 2 fights out of 9 years of being in these areas impacted by these potential laws - and I spend a LOT of time walking around between venues particularly in the past 3 years. Although it is not great to see any fights, having seen only 2 in the entire time I have been out and about I feel that this is a positive experience. I\'ve seen more fights in shopping centres and on the streets than Fortitude Valley/CBD night life areas (by one would assume sober people)! Further, I have seen a positive increased police presence over the past year or so and it has made me feel quite confident and comfortable walking around in these supervised areas.

Q: What do you think of the government's major proposals?

- * New last drinks time 2am instead of 5am
- * In precincts, 1am Lockout & 3am Last Drinks (effectively closing time) instead of 3am Lockout & 5am Close
- * No shots or straight spirits after 12am midnight, potentially bans on cocktails and RTDs
- * Pokies allowed to continue to operate after last drinks
- * New bottle shops to close at 10pm, all existing to close at 12am
- * Exemptions for Casinos 24 hour trading (and alcohol served)

I do not agree with the governments major proposals. I don't believe the violence that these policies are based on are due to alcohol, or that cutting alcohol will improve it. It is a social problem, and the people that cause these issues will do so whether they are allowed to have a drink at a pub or bar or not - and also it wont matter what time. They've been brought up in a way that makes them think their behaviour is ok - and its not. It is THIS issue that we must fix, not just cutting off alcohol as a band aid measure.

New last drinks time at 2am - this will likely cause people to skull and rush to bars and down as much booze as they can before the alcohol is cut off - making them SUPER drunk SUPER quickly and potentially harming themselves in the process. Have you ever been to a bar at the end of Happy Hour? I imagine the effect will be similar but also much worse.

Lockout at 1am and 3am last drinks - as above with the last drinks. My MAJOR concern here is the lockout of 1am. On a busy Saturday night it has been bad enough to leave the precinct at 3am (current lock out). But at 1am its been super busy and bustling! Where will the people go? People will flood onto the narrow sidewalks, angry and upset they\'ve been locked out. Are there going to be more Taxis? Is Uber going to be regulated and introduced to help cope with this influx of people? What about extra public transport? I wouldn\'t feel safe being LOCKED OUT of venues with SECURITY only to find myself amoungst drunk angry people on the street unsupervised with NO SECURITY with no way to get home other than walk... or wait in a cab line for 2 hours with those grumpy drunk people.

The lockouts I imagine would only lead to more \'kick ons\' and after parties in the surrounding residential suburbs - bringing the party to the suburb. Yes thats right, unsupervised parties out in the suburbs at all hours of the morning in lots of different locations. Probably even earlier now that the lock outs would be earlier. So people will be partying and carrying on next door to families, elderly people and everyone else in the neighbourhood. This will be very hard for our police force or ambulances to manage if things get out of hand. People are resourceful, and the partying wont stop, it will just move. And those same trouble makers that cause the violence will most likely be amongst those people - simply moving the problem not fixing it.

No shots or straight spirits after midnight / cocktails - Well this is silly, so many of our amazing venues pride themselves on making world class cocktails and this is the reason we go to them. I think its disgusting those venues - would have to stop offering a product that the core reason why they exist simply because of these laws. Does this mean a kind well mannered gentleman can\'t go and have a whiskey on the rocks after seeing a performance? Apparently so - this is not fair on those of us who do the right thing. I go out to drink nice drinks - whats the point if all I can drink is a vodka lime and soda.

Also on a side note - people will find other ways to get alcohol. Pre drinking, illicit substances, smuggling, stashing - all these laws will do is encourage people to find other ways.

What I find DISGUSTING is that pokies are allowed to operate after last drinks and Casinos have 24 trading with alcohol. How could the government allow this after years of trying to stop gambling problems. Gambling is a huge issue in society and many people ruin their lives with it. So how could it be ok for people to be encouraged to go to these places or partake in these activities as a substitute to enjoying a drink and a dance with friends? This is an embarrassing concept from the Government - a Government that appears to encourage gambling. Reading between the lines is INCREDIBLY CONVEINENT given the new Casino development that is approaching. I\'ve never \'fluttered\' on the pokies - and have never wanted to. Why is my Government now telling me that instead of having a social drink with friends I should go and try the pokies or go to the Casino? Are they encouraging me to delve into the world of gambling?

Q: How would the proposed wind back in trading hours and changes to Lockouts affect you? Would it result in less work/job losses? Would it result in a loss of freedoms? Would it affect your social life negatively?

These changes would dramatically effect me and my income - and they really really scare me. I am someone who has gone out by themselves to try and work for themselves and be a positive impact on the Brisbane economy. And now my Government is threatening to hinder my ability to do so.

Firstly, as a part of my job I need to come and go from venues to capture the images I need to capture. BUT I can\t do that if I\m locked out. Therefore I will have to take on less jobs to make sure I can finish them all before 1am.

Secondly, I really do see these laws negatively impacting on venues ability to make money. We have seen what has happened in Sydney. Countless fantastic venues have gone under with many people losing their jobs. If any of the venues I work at close down or reduce their hours - I too will lose my job and income.

This obviously will result in me having less money, and will lead me to have to find other sources of income possibly by not working for myself anymore. This would be devastating.

Further - on a social note - I will not longer be able to go and have a nice knock off drink with friends after work. This is something that so many Monday-Friday workers dream of during their work weeks every week. What about my end of work week? On Saturday night I will no longer be able to have my knock off drink. This may sound like a silly complaint, but its just another issue that I foresee and think is worth mentioning.

Q: How would the bans on certain types of drinks after 12am affect you/your business/your experience?

The ban on certain types of drinks would impact me in two ways. Firstly I work for venues who specialise in making world class cocktails and neat drinks. Therefore if those drinks were no longer able to be served after midnight, and those venues suffered financial stress and closed or reduced their opening hours - I would also potentially lose my job and income. Secondly, as a patron - I love drinking quality drinks over boring standard vodka lime and soda type drinks. I don't drink to 'get drunk' - and down tasteless substances for no reason. This is why we have high quality alcohol products and amazing bartenders. If these drinks were gone after midnight what is the point? This would be a very sad pathetic way to leave an industry that prides itself on great products and bartending offerings.

Q: How do you think these changes would affect your local area? Do you foresee businesses closing? Do you foresee job losses? Do you foresee opportunities for musicians reduced? Do you think the vibrancy of your local area would be diminished?

I definitely foresee businesses closing and the resulting job losses, mine included. If business\'s can\'t serve drinks after these earlier time periods they wont be bringing in money. Therefore they wont be able to keep staff on late, hire musicians/dj\'s, security staff, or myself the photographer. The government suggests serving coffee and food. Who after a few drinks wants a coffee? Milk after alcohol? Yuck. No one is going to want that. And it costs a lot of money to make and produce food at that hour of the night. I\'m no venue manager but I imagine it would be pretty unfeasible to put on staff to allow for food to be made at that hour, without drink sales to help cover the costs.

The vibrancy of the local area would definitely be diminished. This is a massive shame as we have so many amazing boutique venues and it is these ones that will most likely feel most of the pain with these new laws.

Q: How do you feel about the fact that whilst venues that support youth culture (local bands, DJs, contemporary music) will not be able to serve drinks after certain times, other venues will be allowed to have poker machines running all night, some without a lockout?

As above - I think this is disgusting. A Government prioritising gambling over social interaction is a disgrace. We already have a gambling problem in society and all this does is encourage it and bring new young minds into the world of gambling. I have never used the pokies and never wanted to - why is my Government telling me this is better than having a drink and a dance with friends? The Government should be ashamed of themselves. And doing so at the cost of peoples jobs when they are \'about making jobs\' is a joke.

Q: How do you feel attending nightclubs and live music venues compares (in terms of social interactions and

community interests) with the community benefit of playing poker machines?

Attending nightclubs and live music venues is by far superior to playing on the pokies. Nightclubs and live music venues support social interaction which is so important when we are all so busy working and tied up with commitments. On a wider scope it is so important to be able to have venues that can host people and allow them to have fun as not everyone has the space or ability to host large groups of people at once. People meet their future partners through friends and out and about, people get to see their idols play music and give them something to dream about. You can\'t get that from playing pokies. All you get from playing pokies is the chance you\'ll win some money - and most likely you\'ll lose. What do you lose from hanging out with friends or seeing a music show? Nothing (other than a bit of sleep) - you gain experiences, and the possibility of growing friendships. There is no benefit to playing poker machines really, unless you win big! But that\'s unlikely.

Q: What are your ideas for better ways to reduce anti-social behaviour and change culture in this space? If you were in parliament, what would you do?

If I were in parliament I would basically keep the current strategy in place and try to delve down into the deeper social problem that is causing these violence amongst people. The police presence in the nightlife areas has been fantastic. I always see them around and they generally are just there observing and making themselves obvious so people behave. Greater penalties for offenders would also be up there on my list, as well as placing ban\'s on offenders - so we can keep those offenders AWAY from those people who are out to generally just have a good time. If that means we have to bring in ID scanners so be it - I\'d rather this than the complete destruction of the Brisbane night life community. I would also want to educate the wider community on general behaviour - a lot of the violence we see out and about probably stems from domestic violence which is a problem that needs to be fixed. We need to put more actions in place to educate and ensure people know that violence in general is not ok! Alcohol or no alcohol - violence is bad. And I don\'t think alcohol is the real enemy here. Social problems are.

Q: Any other comments?

Please think carefully and listen to your community. We are the ones that are out and about and actually experience the Brisbane nightlife. We know what goes on, we see it every weekend. We don\'t view from afar without having been there. This is so important to acknowledge and to remember that our views are important.

FYI most of the NEGATIVES I have experienced the past 10+ years have been direct results of Govt policy towards Liquor Licensing intervention in LIVE MUSIC VENUES enforcing extremely low 65db noise restrictions on smaller live venues and the increase of corporations and Poker machines becoming a more profitable enterprise for licensed venues whilst contributing to a decrease in local patronage and destroying local economy ...

There is definitely a risk of job losses (reduced hours, less trade = less staff + employees) Yes there's possibility businesses will be closing due to loss of revenue and income. Entertainment live music performance hours will be reduced unless you're performing at Treasury or Jupiters Casino but not every act has those opportunities... Yes the vibrancy will be affected not everybody wants to play pokies and drink alcohol but you're allowed to do that as long as there's no music...??? And BTW why are CASINOS EXEMPT ??? I believe there to be quite a number of responsible Queenslanders who don't abuse alcohol, don't gamble, actually enjoy music, dining out, a good wine, fine arts, live music and whole heartedly support LIVE MUSIC... QLD State and local govt should be looking to address the issues at hand, provide solutions to keep venues successfully operating and increase potential venues, more LIVE entertainment precincts, support existing venues and develop the industry further. Rather than further restrict, legislate and hinder development ... I feel with the current direction of LIVE MUSIC VENUES AND ENTERTAINMENT that by the time the Commonwealth Games is upon us, our international guests will be arriving in the 10's of thousands to South East Qld and leaving wondering what else there was to do for an evenings entertainment locally besides gamble on pokie machines or listen to DJS in local nightclubs... Q: Tell us about where you are from, and where you work/play.

I am director of Jabba Entertainment. I play bass guitar in the acts that we provide to venues throughout Qld, these include Jabba, Whole Lotta ACDC, Creedence: The John Fogerty Show, With or Without U2 and Smells Like The 90's Rock show. Performing and running this business is my full-time job and is my only source of income to support my family with 2 kids. We regularly play 4 times a week for the past 15 years at venues all over South East Qld including Irish Murphys, Royal Exchange, The Elephant Hotel, Victory Hotel, The Normanby, Surfers Beergarden to name a few.

Q: Do you work in the Industry?

Play in a band

Q: In a few words, explain what role you play in the night time economy.

My band perform 4-5 hours every Thurs to Sun each week at venues throughout SE Qld. Live entertainment is a major drawcard for business at the venues we play. Live music draws patrons to venues which in turn makes bar sales, keeping the businesses alive.

Q: Are you a patron of the nightlife and don't want to see it diminished?

Yes

Q: What are your positive experiences working/playing in the night-time economy?

As a night worker, I enjoy having the occasional drink after a show and would like to have the option of getting into venues after the proposed lockout.

Q: What do you think of the government's major proposals?

- * In precincts, 1am Lockout & 3am Last Drinks (effectively closing time) instead of 3am Lockout & 5am Close
- * No shots or straight spirits after 12am midnight, potentially bans on cocktails and RTDs

The Govt proposals are concerning for my business as the restrictions on bar trade will affect/reduce venues budgets which will be passed on to entertainment budgets. It seems ridiculous that Casinos and Pokies are exempt from these proposed laws.

Q: How would the proposed wind back in trading hours and changes to Lockouts affect you? Would it result in less work/job losses? Would it result in a loss of freedoms? Would it affect your social life negatively?

The proposed changes will most likely result in reduced fees for my band and/or less bookings. As live performance is my and my bandmates sole income, the inevitable reduction in budgets and therefore fees and bookings will create financial hardship for my family. I have been building this business for 15 years and don't have any other skills which will bring in the money needed to support my family.

Q: How would the bans on certain types of drinks after 12am affect you/your business/your experience?

The ban of certain drinks will reduce venues bottom line which will be passed on to entertainment budgets. This will affect my business adversely and will cause financial hardship.

Q: How do you think these changes would affect your local area? Do you foresee businesses closing? Do you foresee job losses? Do you foresee opportunities for musicians reduced? Do you think the vibrancy of your local area would be diminished?

Yes, I foresee venues suffering greatly from these changes. I foresee closures due to reduced bottom lines, this in turn will reduce opportunities for musicians like myself trying to make a living and supporting their families. The vibrancy of the local area will definitely be diminished will less people go out an enjoying themselves and contributing to the economy.

Q: How do you feel about the fact that whilst venues that support youth culture (local bands, DJs, contemporary music) will not be able to serve drinks after certain times, other venues will be allowed to have poker machines running all night, some without a lockout?

This seems ridiculous and is sending the wrong message to the community. There are so many positive aspects to live music for our youth, whereas as poker machines are taking money mainly from the elderly and is such a anti-social negative past-time. Gambling is not something that should be encouraged especially over positive social interaction through live music and entertainment.

I'm born and raised in Brisbane, I spent 18 - 21 bartending and cursed the initial lockout coming in cause it meant that I could no longer go out after my shift. A lot of these times (prior to lockout) I was going out sober and driving to meet friends and driving them home as well most of the time...this is the kind of person these new laws impact! I now live in the valley and work in the city. Love living in the valley - the accessibility, the options & the people are amazing. I also have friends that DJ that will soon be losing some income due to reduced hours (one of which has a mortgage), often of a weekend we will hop from bar to bar depending on where they are playing to support them and so we can actually see them on a weekend. Q: Do you work in the Industry? No Q: In a few words, explain what role you play in the night time economy. I currently live in the valley and I am out most weekends. We have dinner and drinks at home and head out late often so we're still looking to kick on after 3am, anytime we have been in a bar that closes at 3 we all wind up standing on the street deciding what to do...and more often than not we wind up back at someones house which is not really a sustainable option with neighbours, every now and then it's fine but it would most certainly increase with an earlier lockout. As I said in the previous section we bar hop a lot to spend time with our friends that DJ so we patronise multiple venues on a night out and are always well behaved and respectful as it is technically our friend's place of employment.

More positive experiences than I can count. When I worked in bars it was always hard being the one to say "you need to slow down" or putting someone on water for a while to monitor their behaviour....they would kick up a fuss but as it was a local bar they would often come in the next day and apologise knowing I was in the right. I've also often had great experiences with bar managers when things go wrong and security looking out for friends when you miss a warning sign that they are going south. Most recently when someone was extremely racist to a friend in a bar the offender was ejected, the manager personally apologised and offered my friend a

drink on the house. These are the kind of amazing people we have working in our nightlife.

I think it is ridiculous! Punishing the masses for the idiocy of few. This will not stop anti-social behaviour! I was at the regatta yesterday afternoon and there was a fight and someone ejected at 430PM! It was daylight and not at all rowdy in there it was civilised and nice and it still happened pre 5PM not AM, PM! What needs to be addressed is why people behave this way. Bar staff need more training and the confidence to put someone on water if they need to rather than kick them out immediately. Behaviour management is the key. People are just going to pre-drink more before going out or sneak drinks. I really feel the lack of having anything open after 2am except for the casino is going to result in 2 key things:

- 1 people will be on the street, intoxicated earlier and all at the same time. This will mean more difficulty in getting transport and probably more aggression
- 2 there will be an influx of people going to the casino and surely having the only place to go be a gambling venue is not really responsible service of gambling.

My friends would lose money as they can't work for as long. But for me personally it is definitely a loss of freedom and my social life will dramatically change. We enjoy going out and stimulating the economy and meeting new people.. now our nights will end at home being antisocial and restricted cause well it would be rude to neighbours to bring all of our friends home.

Q: How would the bans on certain types of drinks after 12am affect you/your business/your experience?

I think it is ridiculous to control what we can drink and when! This is a power bar staff have if they think you are are heading towards intoxicated...they currently have every right under RSA to refuse a shot or a drink of any kind if they think it's necessary so why does there need to be a law that imposes this on everyone regardless of state?!

Seeing as I live in the valley precinct I definitely forsee closures, I see that there will be a lot of unhappy staff as well cause currently after the more residential area staff finish at midnight they all make their way to one of the local bars on james st that stays open til 3am and have a drink or 2 and wind down post shift. I forsee there being a lot more rowdiness on the street earlier and there will be a lot of noisy house parties...some that will probably require police attendance. Why not keep all of this contained to the precinct where there are security and police everywhere to contain it.

I definitely see the opportunities for musicians diminished and I worry for my friends in the industry.

My area will lose the vibrancy for sure, walking home between midnight and 5am and hearing the music and seeing people wandering home or to cabs or to other bars I've seen far more happy people than angry people because we currently have a choice not complete control of choice between 3 & 5 but more than we will if these laws come in!

Q: How do you feel about the fact that whilst venues that support youth culture (local bands, DJs, contemporary

music) will not be able to serve drinks after certain times, other venues will be allowed to have poker machines running all night, some without a lockout?

I think it is the horrendous...there is such an issue with gambling in this country. I worked in a pub with pokies and seeing the money people put through them upset me. I used to talk to them about it and try to convince them to stop and talk to them about their choices but I knew if they weren't coming to my gaming room they were at the pub down the road. It is still an anti-social behaviour...yes it isn't a violent one but it is seriously harming our community.

Q: How do you feel attending nightclubs and live music venues compares (in terms of social interactions and community interests) with the community benefit of playing poker machines?

I don't see a "community benefit" in poker machines. Yes there is a revenue benefit but that's it. Live music & nightclubs have community benefits in other ways - it's social, it doesn't have to involve drinking, it's giving people a creative outlet and yes it's not the same revenue benefit as pokies but it is a benefit.

Q: What are your ideas for better ways to reduce anti-social behaviour and change culture in this space? If you were in parliament, what would you do?

The biggest thing would be to tackle anti-social behaviour. Focus groups with any known offenders, make it part of their community service if they have committed a punishable offence such as assault. We need to know why people are doing this and then you will learn how to tackle it.

Powers need to be increased for bar staff and along with that further training to give them the confidence to enforce those rules (from personal experience I know it can be scary but it has to be done).

Having somewhere in the precinct like a free chill out area - no alcohol served but maybe a bit of quiet music, definitely free cold water and soft drinks to purchase and possibly food, maybe some volunteers to talk to people about how they are (like the red frogs group do at some events). Having a safe space to go or where you can encourage people to go may help in some cases particularly in the younger ones going out for the first time. This could definitely be community funded and I'm sure there would be people willing to volunteer.

Q: Any other comments?

Alcohol fueled violence is not restricted to the early hours of the morning. This can and will happen at any time. Nothing will change by changing the hours and what you can drink other than changing the time of said violence. If you don't address the root cause of the issue (behaviour) nothing will change. Do not punish the masses for the idiocy of few.





If the government is willing to allow casinos to be exempt this is discriminatory toward other responsible operators in the industry. It also contradicts their whole argument. Every venue whether it is a casino or a small operator contributes to the economy and provides jobs and a piece of their regions cultural identity.

Q: How would the proposed wind back in trading hours and changes to Lockouts affect you? Would it result in

less work/job losses? Would it result in a loss of freedoms? Would it affect your social life negatively?

Most importantly my profession would be at serious risk. It has been surveyed and 100% of venues have stated their entertainment budgets would be cut.

The majority of people who go out to licensed venues drink responsibly. Their freedoms to do so are most certainly being taken

Q: How would the bans on certain types of drinks after 12am affect you/your business/your experience?

This should be a discretionary decision by the venue itself and accepted as such by patrons. If venues can monitor their patrons effectively and refuse service of any type of drink if they decide the patron has had enough then that should be encouraged.

Yes, yes, yes, and yes!

This is only encouraging people to turn to gambling for entertainment once venues remove any live musical entertainment due to budged constraints, whereby compounding an already documented social problem.

Q: How do you feel attending nightclubs and live music venues compares (in terms of social interactions and community interests) with the community benefit of playing poker machines?

Poker machines have already damaged our communities and the social interactions of patrons. Live music encourages harmonious social interaction and positive feelings, whereas pokies are socially alienating people who sit and stare at a computer screen for hours, inevitably walking away afterwards out of pocket and full of regret and sadness that they have just lost a sum of money for no benefit to anyone except the government's tax coffers.

Q: What are your ideas for better ways to reduce anti-social behaviour and change culture in this space? If you were in parliament, what would you do?

A complete overhaul of the Responsible Service of Alcohol certification and application within the industry. It is currently non-existent in practice.

Security certifications need a complete overhaul also. If security staff are breaking up a fight, they have already failed in their duty. This is all too often the case. ANY anti-social behaviour from patrons must be addressed well before fights occur. Any patron diminishing the ability for others to enjoy their night by overlooking common practice of respect for others should be spoken to and reminded of a certain acceptable behaviour or face ejection from the venue. Excessive yelling, profanity, pushing, unsafe behaviour on a dance floor, disrespectful behaviour to women by males and vice versa must all be monitored as these are often the catalysts to more unsavoury violent incidents which get blamed on alcohol alone.

Security staff seem to think that if it isn't illegal then they don't need to intervene. Quite the opposite - It is their responsibility to intervene in any anti-social behaviour to mitigate the risk of violent incidences occurring. They are "crowd controllers". Their job is to control the crowd - not break up fights!!!

Alcohol is not the problem. Regulation of social behaviour (or the lack thereof) is the problem to be addressed.

Q: Any other comments?

As stated, Alcohol is not the problem. We have a crisis in our society of anti-social behaviour in all aspects of day to day life. Regulating behaviour and alcohol consumption in licensed premises is what is required. A blanket ban on sales and reduced operating hours unfairly disadvantages responsible operators and shifts entertainment to gambling which is not something we should be encouraging.

Tougher penalties on venues serving intoxicated patrons or with a history of violent incidences would be a much more constructive way to address the social issue at stake here.

The Gig Factory works alongside over 100 venues on a day to day basis and services many more on an occasional basis, to ensure their entertainment needs are achieved. To service the venues' requirements, we rely on a stable of over 400 performing acts to maintain a high level of variety and professionalism. Q: Are you a patron of the nightlife and don't want to see it diminished? Yes

Q: What are your positive experiences working/playing in the night-time economy?

In my experience over the past 20 years, I have only seen a reduction on the amount of violence occurring within licensed venues. The 90's were especially very violent times and the introduction of internal liquor licensing procedures, policies and laws to decrease intoxicated patrons have been very successful.

Intoxication problems are solved by training and a higher volume of security who are also trained to spot intoxication and deal with it early. Evicitng everyone from a venue at the same time, will cause more problems, being having everyone out in the streets together, instead of in different spots. To believe people will stay in venues wihtout the capacity to drink is just foolish. You will cause more problems, not solve any.

Job losses, and employment for students, who use late nights jobs such as bartending etc so they can still study and earn enough to afford to live in this town, as it is expensive.

So I think it is appauling and completely unfair.

I think attending those nightclubs and live music venues is a social experience, you meet people you talk to friends. At Regatta the gaming lounge was always silent excluding the annoying chimes of pokies. The people were glued to the screen in a way scary way. People did not talk. People did not interact. People lost so much money they couldn\'t afford mortgage payments. I have never served a patron who made his family homeless with one purchase of a drink. Poker machine places are encouraging anti-social behaviour far more than drinking ever could.

I don't believe there is honestly a big enough problem to justify thinking about it. Education is the key, on every level. Patrons, bartenders, security, venue managers. I would make RSA courses free or at least gives venues discounts, or quotas for free RSA courses. Security needs to do these courses too. First aid courses too. Theres many more soultions to look at before something like this.

It doesn't affect the key issues, which are driven by behavioural issues at a human level. It also takes people out of safe, secure licensed venues at a time when they're not ready to finish, and put them on the street or in homes.

The number of alcohol related violence incident will go down, but this will be driven by lack of footfall, not by changing the behaviours.

Having attended I am truly yet to be let down by the entertainment available in Brisbane, I have always been the type to be sociable and enjoy meeting new people. I have never been involved in a verbal dispute, let alone a physical one. I have nothing but good memories from my nights out.

I think restriction, regulation, and prohibition punishes the majority for the sins of the minority. I think its a dated mindset of legislation and will not work. Its the lazy way out for the government to see some statistics without tackling the problem at hand. From being out and working every weekend for the last 7 years, its not the alcohol or the time they drink it, its the nature of the person. If you look for trouble, you will find it. Likewise, if you're out to be social, you will make friends. I have not been in a single dispute in seven years because of this mentality, and I've travelled all over the world and frequented many nightlife districts. I feel so much safer in Brisbane than any other city. The legislation does not tackle the true cause of violence, punish the people who repeatedly become problems, not the population as a whole.

It would destroy employment opportunities, our chance to grow in the business and expand our offerings, and it would absolutely destroy everyones freedoms. Not everyone goes out to get beligerently drunk, most people have a few drinks at home because they enjoy having good conversation with friends before they head out. Dancing is therapeutic for some people and its good to be able to switch off and have no worries after a crazy week at work. Not only would it reduce our customers, it devalues the night out (theres less of it), and people will be less inclined to make a trip. For venues that rely on Friday/Saturday nights, it will kill business and jobs. Its hard enough to get work for the majority of people as is, whats the plan for the government once they destroy an entire sector, of which a good chunk is 18-23 year bracket.

Bans on certain types of drinks after 12am would absolutely affect customers. If you like cocktails and enjoying a conversation with your friend, why would you venture out at 11pm after a concert, only to be told you can no longer enjoy your favourite drink of choice. Its not just nightclubs who run late, its late night bars that add to the vibrancy of the city. Doesn't matter if your 18 or 60, if you want to stay out past midnight and enjoy a cocktail or anything other than a basic spirit, that should be your prerogative. Once again, you are getting punished for the actions of people who may not even know.

If Sydney is anything to go by, the proposed laws will be disastrous for our scene and for business. We should be aiming for a 24 hour economy as a New World City. Sydney had an even more developed scene than Brisbane, and it could not handle the restrictions on trade. People will simply not come early, they will see less value in the product in the Valley and CBD areas and simply stay at home or go to suburban areas where there is less of a police presence.

Having worked in pokies, pubs, bars, and nightclubs - pokies are by far the worst in terms of societal issues. I watched people dump weeks salaries over the course of a night, and leave in tears. While these people weren't engaged in verbal and physical disputes in the venues, you never know where they are taking their frustrations out, and the financial pressure they put on themselves and their families.

Q: How do you feel attending nightclubs and live music venues compares (in terms of social interactions and community interests) with the community benefit of playing poker machines?

I feel nightclubs and live music venues facilitate a more social environment. You're there to socialise and meet people. From my experience in a busy pokies room, the environment was tense when people lost money and there was little social interaction. It was a small drinking crowd and more focused on making money and recouping losses than being social, meeting new people, and contributing to a good atmosphere inside a venue.

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Q: What are your ideas for better ways to reduce anti-social behaviour and change culture in this space? If you were in parliament, what would you do?

More severe punishments for repeat offenders. I've seen people banned from our venues from fights, handed over to authorities, go through a court case, and then get a slap on the wrist, only to pop up in photo albums at other venues, more than likely causing the same problems. Increasing public transport during the hours of 12-5 would be a massive help. There is no safer place to be than inside a venue, however, once patrons leave there is limited cost effective transportation options for the majority of people that can't afford to catch a taxi. This can

lead to incidents on the street which are likely causing the statistics for violence to be higher. When people are frustrated they tend to look for trouble. If people can leave on their own merits and have options, there will be less reason to engage in acts.

I think that venues that comply or even be pro-active about handling violence and practising the responsible service of alcohol and tougher consequences for those who wish to encourage this behaviour. Energy should be spent in educating people about 'partying sensibly' and taking care of their friends, as well as encouraging the culture of celebrating live music and entertainment.



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


