Q: What are your positive experiences working/playing in the night-time economy?

I have never been involved in any sort of negative impacts by the night time economy. As a shift worker the ability to go and have a late meal or late drink or both when finishing late is vital to me. I work in the emergency services and having a place to wind down is vital. Our city is growing rapidly and gaining notoriety for having some amazing food, coffee, beer and night life. It's positive in almost every way.

Q: What do you think of the government's major proposals?

- \* In precincts, 1am Lockout & 3am Last Drinks (effectively closing time) instead of 3am Lockout & 5am Close
- \* No shots or straight spirits after 12am midnight, potentially bans on cocktails and RTDs
- \* Pokies allowed to continue to operate after last drinks
- \* New bottle shops to close at 10pm, all existing to close at 12am
- \* Exemptions for Casinos 24 hour trading (and alcohol served)

Horrible. We know for a fact that poker machines are as addictive as many available and illegal drugs and not to mention that some of these poker machines are funding by large multinational corporations (including the Fresh Food People). Encouraging gambling as an alternative to drinking is replacing a perceived problem with an actual one.

The lockout times do no good. Instead of forcing everyone out on to the street at 3am you're doing it earlier. It encourages people to drink more by limiting what time they're allowed to be out essentially. I'll be truthful when I say that nobody wants to be at their favourite bar having soft drinks and putting money hand over fist into pokies. That's what the casino is for.

Again, as a shift worker I have no ability to go with the masses when I please and the closure of establishments earlier just removes any possibility of normality with my life outside of work.

Q: How would the bans on certain types of drinks after 12am affect you/your business/your experience?

It is a staple for me to try and have a beer after work. Sometimes I finish work at 1am or 2am or 11:30pm and the fact that I can now, as we speak go to a pub that is open and have a beverage late at night is important to me. It also means restaurants can stay open later for my business as well. The removal of that just forces me to go home and have no social life outside of work. Which can be far worse than a late night drink.

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Q: How do you think these changes would affect your local area? Do you foresee businesses closing? Do you foresee job losses? Do you foresee opportunities for musicians reduced? Do you think the vibrancy of your local area would be diminished?

Musicians will get less work. Less hours to play means that as many bands or people can't fit on a bill. Some clubs and pubs rely solely on later in the evening trading. These establishments are Brisbane landmarks and essential must travel to locations for tourists (The Beat Megaclub, Family, Oh Hello, Zuri, La Rouche, Bowery, Sixes and Sevens are a few that spring to mind)so without that you're not only damaging Queensland business owners but also tourist potential because as we well know young, in their twenties backpackers and travellers love this city and they continue to return for a reason and I'm sure it's not just the weather.

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Q: How do you feel about the fact that whilst venues that support youth culture (local bands, DJs, contemporary music) will not be able to serve drinks after certain times, other venues will be allowed to have poker machines running all night, some without a lockout?

It saddens me that we have simply allowed to replace socialising with others over a drink to forcebly placing them in front of a poker machine to waste money as an alternative to night life because drunken louts have tarnished the nature of drinking. I can tell you this much, in being active in the night life scene for over a decade the only people who start fights are the people who are forced out on to the street at 3am. These people if they were allowed to stay until they pleased, they would not be fighting over a cab (which might I add, also need to be addressed).

Local artists. That's all that needs to be said. Poker machines provides absolutely zero value to the community. You've heard of Powderfinger I'm sure, have you heard about that poker machine at Chalk Hotel in the back right corner? I don't think so. Case and point. We can showcase artists and that's usually at a licensed venue. We cannot showcase poker machines.

Education at a younger level is imperative. There are laws in place to punish people who fight. We cannot believe that everyone is immune to anger no matter what. That's just not how life works. That's not a unique case. In this case with the government you believe the exception to be the rule. It simply is not. Everything I have ever seen in any place with licensed venue in Brisbane pushes me to believe that you wouldn't see a whole lot of aggressive folk.



Instead of copying NSW and implementing similar, silly laws - which ultimately destroyed their infamous night-life precinct "King's Cross" - why don't we try different things like implementing a "night-life Mayor" like London is doing, try educating students in schools on safe alcohol use, try re-inforcing strong anti-violence campaigns such as "one punch-one kill" (but maybe one like "Look after intoxicated mates, ensure they get home safely" which could be quite effective, and enforcing stricter entry into venues/buying of drinks depending on the severity of one's drunkedness.


These proposed laws will cause:

I've known many people who have lost their families, in unrepairable debt and cannot sustain their lives due to this disease. Although it may increase the revenue for the government, they are putting many people's lives at risk at the same time.



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

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

I think these proposed laws are detestable. The current lockout of 3am is already ridiculous - and as a regular and resident to the valley I can tell you that 3am was the worst time to be out. It breaks up groups, sees friends stranded on opposite sides of a venue door, and encourages anger and frustration in those who failed to make it in for the '3am swill'. The lines for taxis become ridiculous in minutes.

All of this without any evidence that it has had any positive impact. And now, again with no real data, a corrupt government is trying to squeeze people even more. What is the point??

Q: How would the proposed wind back in trading hours and changes to Lockouts affect you? Would it result in

less work/job losses? Would it result in a loss of freedoms? Would it affect your social life negatively?

I would be far less likely to go out. The 3am law already means that once 9pm rolls around there is very little pint in going to a licensed venue. If that goes back to 1am, I would imagine that unless everyone is in a cab by 7pm, there won't be much point in going out.

Believe it or not, adults go out and drink in party venues to have \*fun\*. Arbitrary curfews are not fun. Being denied the right to choose a different venue after an arbitrary time is not fun. And if the state keeps doing all it can to spoil our fun, we'll just stay home.

I would say it would make New Years Eve a much duller experience.

What is the point? Why shouldn't people have the right to buy what drinks they like? Spirits don't suddenly become evil after 12am, like some sort of Gremlin. A man who arrives at 8am and drinks 17 beers will be more intoxicated than a man who arrives at 12am and drinks 3 tequilas. Blanket rules like this are discrimination and spit in the face of RSA regulation.

To be honest, the Safe Night Out policies under the Newman government were far better. I was there while they were underway, and the only change to my experience was the presence of more police on patrol. The best policies will be like that - unobtrusive and invisible to people who don't cause any trouble, but there quickly when someone does.

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Q: Any other comments?

A few of years back, I was having a drink in the Tempo sports bar (what is now the Flying Cock) at about 5pm, after work and before a music event. Two blokes walked in, and right away everyone in the bar knew they were there for a fight. They argued with the bartender, knocked over someones drink, started swearing and carrying on. The second they took a swing at someone, security were on them and had them out the door.

Lockout laws would obviously have had no impact here - an informed staff and a good community were what prevented this from being some sort of bar room brawl. But the reason I bring this up is too make the point that a small number of people have so much anger that they can't rest until they hit someone.

Early lockout laws put these people out in the street, full of anger, alongside every other innocent partygoer. Or worse, these laws discourage him from going out at all, so he stays home with his rage and his family where no-one else can judge him or interfere with his violence. I would rather he take a swing at me in a crowded venue where his actions can be witnessed and judged. In fact, it is ironic that one of the only MPs who can prevent legislation that will push more violence into the home, is an MP who was expelled from his party over allegations of domestic violence. Perhaps it just takes someone who has been on any side of the reality of DV to understand the harm this sort of junk legislation could do.

Please, listen to the citizens who call Fortitude Valley home. We know what makes our nights safe and enjoyable. Responsible staff. The company of mates. Police on the beat. Freedom, choice and most of all, \*fun\*.

I have spent my whole life involved in tourism and hospitality. I have travelled the world and came back to my home town of Airlie beach to open a business Q: Do you work in the Industry? Owner and Operator of a Nightclub Q: In a few words, explain what role you play in the night time economy. I have owned and operated Mama Africa Bar & Nightclub for 14 years. It is a small successful part of the nigh time atmosphere and plays an important role in both employing young people and also giving them a place to socialise dance and have fun. During the last 14 years it has become harder and harder to run a small business with our licensing fees jumping from \$35 per annum to \$25,000 per annum. Our Music licensing fees have also jumped from \$3,500 per annum to \$75,000 per annum. Reduced trading hours will mean that my business will probably be forced to close down as will most small independent venues. Big venues will have monopoly's in most regional towns. Diversity will suffer and small towns will become places young people do not want to live in and tourists do not want to visit.

I have enjoyed going to nightclubs since I turned 18. I love to dance and socialise and my most memorable moments have been at venues. Having grown up and now running mu own nightclub I hate to think of what this will mean for the youth of today. They not be given the opportunities to go out and have fun with people their own age and many will suffer from boredom. The social culture of Australia will suffer and drugs will become a much bigger problem as it already is in small towns without a decent nightlife culture.

I am totally opposed to the proposal on all levels. Especially the exemption for Casinos as this goes against

everything I believe in of a fair and just work environment. The lockout laws will destroy most small venues who do not have DOSA and vastly change the social life of the youth today. It will greatly increase drugs use in the community and affect the tourism industry. The youth adventure market is already suffering as increased pressure and costs on the hospitality industry increases the average cost of food and beverages and overseas destinations such as South East Asia become even more popular.

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Q: How would the proposed wind back in trading hours and changes to Lockouts affect you? Would it result in less work/job losses? Would it result in a loss of freedoms? Would it affect your social life negatively?

I cannot believe that anything positive can come from forcing small businesses out of the industry, it is mostly privately run venues that live in the communities they operate in, they are mostly hardworking honest people who contribute back into their communities often sponsoring events and sporting groups. They end to own properties on the towns and have families at school as well. This will all change instantly as small operators are forced out and big businesses takes over. Profits are taken out of the town and often out of the country. I think that the policy makers are totally out of touch with the youth of today and of the needs of small businesses. If you want regional Queensland to look like Mid West America then this is the way to go. If not then I would strongly support Labour to revisit the Liberal Parties policies surrounding the Safe Night Precinct Strategy that was already having great results.

I am not opposed to the ban on certain drinks after midnight however it may lead to people rushing to order shots prior to midnight resulting in actually encouraging rapid consumption of alcohol

There is 5 venues directly at risk of eminent closure as already the bottom line is difficult to stay ahead of. Queensland and our region of the Whitsundays is only just starting to show some signs of Recovery and if this policy is implemented next year I cannot see these particular venues remaining open. The 1 am lockout would mean smokers cannot re enter if they go outside for a smoke thereby cutting 20%- 30% of revenue and reduced trading hours would also mean a further loss of between 15 - 30% of revenue. Immediate job losses would result for DJ's, Bar Staff, Cleaners, Graphic Designers, Local Printing Companies, Fresh Produce Suppliers, Photographers, Artists Booking Agents, Local Hospitality Suppliers, Maintenance and Trade contractors and the list goes on. Up to 700 jobs may be lost in our small town of Airlie Beach alone

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Q: How do you feel about the fact that whilst venues that support youth culture (local bands, DJs, contemporary music) will not be able to serve drinks after certain times, other venues will be allowed to have poker machines running all night, some without a lockout?

I am absolutely floored that this is even being proposed. The examples of Kings Cross and Newcastle are for completely different reason and may also be a result of the introduction of more casino licensees. If this policy is implemented our youth of today will surely suffer as we head down the same path of America. Small regional towns will suffer most as they will not even have casinos to fill the gap of venues for socialising with people their own age and youth in regional towns will become more isolated and disenfranchised.

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Q: How do you feel attending nightclubs and live music venues compares (in terms of social interactions and community interests) with the community benefit of playing poker machines?

Nightclubs offer a completely different experience to large venues with pokie machines. Gambling is anti social where as nightclubs can offer people chance to mingle, dance and interact with other people. Esp. people of the own age group. Nightclub venues have adapted over the years to provide adequate acoustic measures and soundproofing to allow for loud music, space for dance floors and various safty mechanism, that allow people the freedom to express themselves. Large clubs with pokie machines will not have the necessary requirements to offer spaces for dancing in the same way and this experience will be lost to young people. Illegals Dance

Parties will pop up as people have wanted to dance to relax and socialise since the beginning of mankind.

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Q: What are your ideas for better ways to reduce anti-social behaviour and change culture in this space? If you were in parliament, what would you do?

I would focus on harsher penalties for the perpetrators of violence. Penalties should include being barred from venues that serve alcohol as also from purchasing alcohol from bottle shops. Mandatory drug and alcohol counselling as well as education on what behaviour is acceptable. More direct communication with youth groups and working closely with all streams of media to offer a better example for young people to follow. I would reduce the licensing fees and music licensing fees for all venues to take the financial pressure off small businesses. I would offer tax incentives for businesses that implemented extra security measures to reduce incidents in and around their venues. I wold improve the direct line of communication between venue security and police foot patrols so that anti social behaviour on the street could be dealt with more efficiently and I would also set up police beats in safe night precincts. I would definably foster a widespread education campaign aimed at discouraging young people from acting violently and not just focus of behaviour in venues. Violence is Violence no matter where it occurs and it should be targeted along with Domestic Violence and Other forms of Violence in our community. I would immediately launch a campaign against drugs especially ICE and consider having perpetrators drug tested. I would help fun recovery centres for people with Drug and Alcohol problems. I would also allow the previous government 3 year trial contue in the 15 designated Safe Night Precincts, review the initiatives and reconsider the policy document as at the moment it does not even come close to being appropriate.

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Q: Any other comments?

I Urge The Government to allow more time to consult with Industry and especially small independent operators across the state. The Submission Deadline of 23rd of Dec 2015 is totally impractical as most venue owners and managers are flat out preparing for their busiest trading periods and do not have the time to get involved with politics.

Our personal freedoms are greatly eroded my legislation such as this, and it begs a wider question of our society as to whether or not this sort of regulation actually makes us LESS responsible for our actions, by means of removing our ability to actually make responsible decisions when confronted with a real choice.

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
