Dear Sir,

I thank you for the material updates provided, and offer the following observations, in respect to the task that has been mandated to your committee.

I note, in the submissions provided in the draft furnished, a tendency to dilute our National identity, which is Australian.

We are a Nation of migrants, and it is a nonsense, to entertain the "Race, gender, language, religion, political, or other" opinion, to life security of the person Etc Etc.

The full preamble goes into such idealistic detail, as to become farsical. Morality, marriage, parenthood, and then the unborn. We are a Nation that provides for the subsidised slaughter of the unwanted, unborn, from Government revenues. Certain State administrations, have extended the tolerances further, than the lawful precedents set by our courts.
