Re Proposed queensland Bill of Rights. (issues Paper no 3, Sept 1997.)

As a private Citizen I have read and reviewed the work by EARC on a Queensland Bill of Rights, and that of the Parlimentry Review Committee, and must say that Iam somewhat perplexed, because The Honourable Attorney General Denver Beanland confirmed to Mr A Fraser, MP for Coffs Harbour on the 16th of Aug 1996, that the Bill of Rights of 1688 continues in force in Queensland.

If however it is the intention of the QLD Government to add to and adopt the EARC reccomendations of a more modern 'Bill of Rights" the please accept my following comment as a Private Citizens submission.

As EARC have not numbered their Proposed Articles under the various headings on pages 10.11 & 12 of the abovementioned Paper I shall refer to a heading or subheading and an article number under the particular heading lam commenting on.

Civil and Political Rights:

- u: 2. "to take reasonable steps to defend the Persons life etc". This ought to include the Right to self defence using reasonable means. As it presently reads it implys that only someone in Austhority or in the employ of someone has the right to defend.
 - 13. "not to be arbitarily taken into or held in custody etc" this ought to include, not to be arrested or charged purelty on the unsubstantiated world of a Law enforcement Officer. Is Not to be "verballed".

Victims of Crimes:

To include the right to adequate financial compensation, commensurate with loss, material or emotional or physcological and physical injury.

Freedom of thought:

To include not to be subjected to" mind control techniques, either by electronic means remotely or directly or by direct chemical means or by introduction of chemical or biological or bacteriorlogical substances introduced into food or water supplies of the indvidual or the community y collectively."

Deprevation of Property by the State:

2.Ought to include " fair compensation by independant Valuers, and all costs to be borne by the State:

Economic and Social Rights: These need to be enforceable to do otherwise makes a mockery of the intent and the spirit of having an ammended or additional QLD Bill of Rights.

1:16. "To establish a Family regardless of marital status" ought to include, "excluding marriges of same gender".

Community and Culteral Rights. (likewise to above these need to be enforceable.)

rt: 4. Rights particular to Authors, ought to include Inventors and proprietors of Intellectual property.

Community and Cultural Rights. Cont.

rt:2.Persons of Aboriginal and Torres Strait descent. To have the same Rights as all other Australians regardless of culture or original Race.Not one Law for one and another for another. To do otherwise is as presently seen and felt not only highly divisaveo the Australian community generally but extraordinarily costly to all others not of Aboriginal or Torres Strait descent. It may also be very wise and appropriate at this time to now define what constitutes a person of such descent within the proposed new Bill of Rights.

In addition the Proposed Bill of rights also ought to have the right of an individual to seek to and be granted the right to have a Politician of any persuasion and any Government official be made accountable for their actions.
