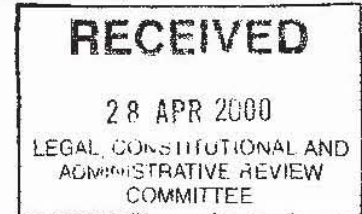


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PERSONAL SUBMISSION
"Four Year Parliamentary Terms"
Legal, Constitutional and Administrative Review Committee,
Queensland Parliament.

I oppose a four year Parliamentary term for the Queensland Parliament for the following reasons:

- (1) Insufficient time has passed since the last Queensland referendum on four year terms. I suggest that a referendum should not occur until another five or ten years.
- (2) The present three year unfixed terms have been abused by politicians who have called early elections for political purposes.
- (3) Three year fixed terms should be tried first before considering four year terms. Politicians are responsible for undermining the present Parliamentary terms by not allowing terms to run their full time.
- (4) Four year terms will give too much political power to politicians operating in a unicameral Queensland Parliament.
- (5) Because power has a corrupting effect, there will be a greater tendency towards corruption with the increase in political power resulting from four year terms. This is even more pronounced in a unicameral Parliament.
- (6) Provides extra power with no corresponding checks, balances or sanctions mechanisms necessary for a healthy democracy. There are numerous examples of abuse of executive power in Queensland. The most recent was introducing four year terms for local governments in Queensland without having a referendum of Queensland voters. The past abuse of political power in Queensland is legendary.

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I support three year fixed terms for these reasons:

- (1) This alternative provides the best balance between the interests of all involved considering our unicameral parliamentary system.
- (2) There is a good prospect that this alternative would receive cross party support. In my view in comparison to four year terms there would be more chance of cross party support for fixed three year terms.
- (3) More support by Queensland voters than four year terms.
- (4) Has the advantages of the four year term because the length of Parliament would be extended, because there would be no early elections called.
- (5) Overcomes the main problems associated with the present three year unfixed term.
- (6) Is more appropriate for a unicameral parliament. Overcomes the problems outlined in the arguments against four year terms in 4,5 and 6 which deal with power and corruption with four year terms.
- (7) Three year fixed terms should be tried first before considering four year terms. Politicians are responsible for undermining three year unfixed terms by not allowing terms to run their full length.

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With my proposal for a three year fixed term, I would propose that elections be held in September because this avoids the Christmass period and the financial year changeover and the local Government elections in March.

I would support full reserve powers for the Governor to dissolve Parliament.

I would propose the same "no dissolution" provisions for the three years of a fixed term as stated on page 4 of the background paper in 5, R5.2.

Any changes to the present system should be entrenched in the State Constitution.

I would ask the Committee to recommend that a three year fixed term be recommended to the Queensland Government as a preferred option to four year terms. If this is not possible then I would ask the Committee to give equal support to both options to be run concurrently at a referendum so that the People of Queensland would have the widest choices. If we are serious about democracy then this must be the minimum outcome if change is recommended. I challenge the Committee and Government on this point!

To only put the one option of four year terms to Queenslanders and to exclude the three year fixed term option can only be interpreted in one way; as a balant move for more Political Power by the Government of the day.

Finally, I wish to advise that I am not a member of any political party.
