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

INQUIRY INTO THE TRANSPLANTATION AND ANATOMY AMENDMENT BILL 1998.

The Renal Transplantation Unit at Princess Alexandra Hospital has major reservations about the proposed amendments to the current legislation. We are concerned that the proposed changes may be unworkable, and their effects unpredictable. It is even conceivable that the proposal, while well intentioned, may actually reduce the number of organs available for transplantation. These possibilities need to be further evaluated before implementing the proposals.

If the Drivers License became a binding statement of intention or refusal to donate organs, those who were undecided at the time of license renewal would be likely to select "NO" on their license. Even if they subsequently gave further consideration to the issue and discussed it with their family, they would be unlikely to alter their license until it was due for renewal in five years time. Telling their family of their intentions would no longer be adequate. Conversely somebody who indicated on their license that they were prepared to donate organs, but subsequently changed their mind would need to go to replace their license. If they didn't we could potentially face the very difficult situation of a drivers license saying "YES", but the family saying "NO, they changed their mind and told us but haven't gotten around to replacing their Drivers' License."

At present the next of Kin do not actually "consent" to the removal of organs so much as to affirm that it was the wish of the deceased person. Further efforts to encourage people to consider the issue of organ donation and to tell their family of their wishes may be of greater benefit than an attempt to get people to commit their intentions on their Drivers License. The Drivers License while providing a useful guide to a person's intentions, is not a reliable enough tool to forcibly override a family's account of their loved one's views. Our Unit cannot support the current proposed amendments to the Act.
