

What could the ECQ do better or differently to get its message across to young people? Awareness at university campuses, provide insentives

How could the ECQ make it easier for young people to enrol and become registered to vote? Online enrollments, send enrolments out to high schools for year 12 students at the end of the year

How could the ECQ make it easier for young people to cast their vote? Locate polling station at shopping, university campuses, and later hours

Do you think more young people would vote if they could do so at any time in the week leading up to an election, without having to meet any special conditions to do so? Yes, most definetly!

Do you think young people could be disadvantaged if there was no opportunity to enrol after an election is called? I think that 5-7 days after election is long enough to enrol to register a vote.

Do you think improved civics education is a worthwhile reason for government to consider a change to fixed term elections? No, i don't believe it would be of too much overall use

Do you think young people would be more likely to vote if the voting system was changed so that candidates running on certain issues of particular interest to young people were more likely to get elected and have a voice in parliament? Yes, young people may not be so interested in 'parties' for the election but in people

Should the voting age be lowered to 17 or 16 years? Why or why not? If the voting age is lowered, should voting at the lowered age be compulsory?

No - at the age of 17 or younger you do not have any real understanding of what you are voting for, and are likely just to follow your friends or family's votes.
