**RE: Inquiry into Sugarcane Bioenergy Opportunities in Queensland**

CBL would like to express our support of the submission made by Mr Simon Yim, CEO of SKY Renewables, to the Committee's inquiry into sugarcane bioenergy opportunities.

Project Lion could also be a catalyst for the eventual phasing out of cane burning in favour of more sustainable harvesting techniques.
