If this Bill is passed it will mean the following for my property in terms of improved productive, environmental and/or social aspects:	A far greater ability to manage problem areas which currently impede management, creat safety issues and cause areas of degredation where timber has overtaken pasture causing runoff and erosion.
If I could propose further changes to the legislation these changes would include:	<ul> <li>A more realistic and cost effective approach to thinning whereby either 2 tractors and a chain could be used or aerial grasslanding could be applied. The latter is an extremely cost effective way of revitalising pasture without disturbing the topsoil which sometimes causes erosion. The use of one tractor and the requirement that NO mature trees be disturbed is prohibitivly expensive and unrealiastic over broad areas.</li> <li>small areas of virgin brigalow located on leashold land be allowed to be cleared in order to restore grasscover and revitalise soil health.Our land has a variety of soil types and vegetation and although we have tried to fence to landtype there remain small patches of very degraded brigalow areas as it is impossible to keep the stock from flogging these areas. Under these trees, in a light year such as this year there is very little grasscover to protect from runoff and erosion. This would be overcome if the areas could be cleared.</li> </ul>
