I am a father of two sons, and I ride e-skateboards with my oldest son aged 14, and have done for over a year. I take my responsibility as the supervising adult seriously, and I ensure we comply with rules requiring helmets and all other road rules. We researched the laws as they stand in Qld beforehand, and I purchased boards for me and my son costing several thousand dollars each. My son and I enjoy a fabulous time together and we use the boards on bike paths and paths, as well as on the road within the rules regularly and safely. We limit the speed on the controllers to ensure we can't speed. It is a great thing to do with my son, and we appreciate this opportunity as Queenslanders. We actually choose to holiday in Qld so we can use the boards while away on weekend caravanning trips because e-devices are completely illegal in NSW.We are respectful, cautious and compliant. We are highly aware of others including bike riders and pedestrians. To ban my son and I from this joyous recreational activity likely puts him behind a tablet or other device away from excercise and outdoor experiences. We regularly see individuals disregarding the rules. It seems completely inappropriate to penalise lawful users who respect the current laws to accommodate those who choose to disregard the laws. We regularly see dangerous e- device users speeding, with no helmets, or behaving dangerously on paths and roads as well as children unsupervised and wonder why the rules aren't enforced and why parents aren't supervising their children. Maybe the parents who fail to appropriately supervise their children should be held more accountable?Media reports showing serious e-device injuries is upsetting, but I note the majority are the result of unlawful and irresponsible use.
