I am writing to express my deep concern about the current regulation and safety management of escooters in Queensland, particularly in relation to pedestrian and road user safety. Personal Experience – A Frightening Near MissRecently, I was involved in a distressing incident that highlights the urgent need for better oversight. After picking up my daughter from high school, I was driving through a busy intersection when a student on an e-scooter suddenly rode into my vehicle at high speed. The student collided with the side of my car and was thrown across to the other side.In that split second, I feared the worst. I was shaken, my daughter was in shock, and had the circumstances been only slightly different - a different angle, a faster car, a slower reaction - it could have resulted in a serious injury or even a fatality. Fortunately, the student escaped with bruising and grazing, but the trauma of that moment will stay with me for a long time. Key Issues ObservedHigh Speed in Inappropriate Areas: E-scooters are often ridden at unsafe speeds in areas shared with cars, pedestrians, and cyclists.Lack of Helmets and Protective Gear: Many young riders, particularly students, are not wearing helmets or any form of protection.Limited Awareness or Training: Users seem unaware of the road rules or safe riding practices, treating footpaths and intersections as raceways. Inadequate Enforcement: There appears to be minimal enforcement of existing laws or penalties for unsafe e-scooter use. Recommendations 1. Mandatory Safety Education: Introduce school-based education programs on safe e-scooter use.2. Helmet Enforcement and Visibility Measures: Enforce helmet use and require highvisibility clothing or markings, particularly for minors.3. Speed Limit Reduction in School Zones and High Pedestrian Areas: Reduce permissible e-scooter speeds near schools, shops, and shared footpaths.4. Stronger Regulation for Private E-Scooters: Many incidents involve privately owned scooters that exceed speed limits or are modified beyond safe parameters.5. Public Awareness Campaign: Promote shared responsibility and awareness for both e-scooter users and other road users.I'm not anti-e-scooter. I support sustainable, active transport options. But what I witnessed was a terrifying example of the dangers that exist when we allow powerful, fast-moving vehicles to be operated by inexperienced or unaware users in public spaces with minimal safeguards.
