The proposed development threatens to irreversibly damage this cherished landscape .Undermining Democratic ProcessesThe introduction of legislation to exempt Olympic venues from existing planning laws sets a dangerous precedent. It effectively removes community input and oversight from decisions that have long-term impacts on our environment and heritage. Such actions erode public trust and diminish the role of democratic engagement in urban development.Legal and Financial ConcernsThe advocacy group Save Victoria Park has initiated legal action against the proposed development, highlighting potential violations of heritage protections and environmental regulations . Additionally, the financial implications of constructing a new stadium, estimated to exceed \$5 billion when including associated transport infrastructure, raise serious concerns about fiscal responsibility and the allocation of public funds .Alternative SolutionsGiven the existing infrastructure and alternative sites available, it is imperative to consider options that do not compromise our city's green spaces and heritage sites. Upgrading current facilities or selecting less sensitive locations for Olympic venues would demonstrate a commitment to sustainable and community-conscious development. ConclusionI urge the Parliament to reconsider the proposed legislation and to prioritize the preservation of Victoria Park/Barrambin.
