Housing Availability and Affordability (Planning and Other Legislation Amendment) Bill 2023 ('the Bill')

Thank you for the opportunity to provide feedback in relation to the above.

About QCOSS

Queensland Council of Social Service (QCOSS) is the peak body for the social service sector in Queensland. Our vision is to achieve equality, opportunity, and wellbeing for every person, in every community.

QCOSS leads the <u>Town of Nowhere</u> campaign advocating for change to end the housing crisis in Queensland, and is a partner of the national <u>Everybody's Home</u> campaign.

In March 2023, QCOSS, Tenants Queensland and The Services Union, along with the <u>Town</u> of <u>Nowhere</u> campaign partners commissioned the report '<u>A blueprint to tackle Queensland's</u> <u>housing crisis</u>' ('the Pawson Report'), which clearly outlines the unprecedented housing crisis in Queensland.¹

QCOSS' position

QCOSS welcomes the opportunity to provide feedback about the Bill.

Queensland's current housing crisis has laid bare the vulnerabilities that exist in the housing system. Our frontline services are currently witnessing distressing levels of housing need and the human impacts of the same.² The Pawson Report found over 150,000 households in Queensland have an unmet need for social and affordable housing.³

QCOSS welcomes the Queensland Government's commitment to amending legislation to accelerate the availability and affordability of housing in Queensland.⁴

Feedback is provided in relation to changes being made to support one of the key aims of the amendments, that is to:

QCOSS supports amendments described in Section 160D of the Bill to implement a 'state facilitated application' to streamline planning application processes that are identified as a priority for the state and that relate to the delivery of social and affordable housing in Queensland.⁶

Our submission is that, in determining what is an 'identified priority for the State' in sub subparagraph 160D 2(a) ii, and the 'criteria prescribed by regulation' in sub-paragraph 160D 2(b)⁷:

- the 'identified priority for the State' and the 'criteria prescribed' must minimise
 potential adverse impacts on human rights in accordance with the Human Rights Act
 2019 (Queensland)⁸, and
- 'identified priorities for the State' must be limited to critical community infrastructure, such as social and affordable housings.

Conclusion

Of the approximately 150,000 households in Queensland with an unmet need for affordable housing, more than 100,000 of those households are eligible for social housing based on income.⁹ As at 30 June 2023 just over 25,300 households were waiting for housing on the Queensland social housing register, the majority of these households have been assessed as high or very high need for housing.¹⁰

There is a need for immediate action and an ambitious and comprehensive long-term plan to end the housing crisis in Queensland. Without long-term planning and government intervention, the housing crisis will continue to worsen, and many people in Queensland will not have access to affordable, safe and secure housing.

QCOSS welcomes amendments to the Planning Act 2017 to include a state facilitated application process to streamline assessment of development applications to the extent that it will accelerate delivery of social and affordable housing.
