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NELLY BAY DEVELOPMENT, MAGNETIC ISLAND

Mr MICKEL (Logan—ALP) (6.50 p.m.): "The Government is committed to facilitating a project on the failed Magnetic Quay site on Magnetic Island. In response to issues raised by the community and government agencies during the period of public comment on the draft Environmental Impact Statement ... in late 1995, the preferred developers, Nelly Bay Harbour Pty Ltd, have recently prepared a revised development proposal for the site. The developers are currently fine tuning the revised proposal prior to it being formally considered by Government. A supplement to the draft EIS to address the revised proposal will be prepared by consultants and released to the public for further comment within a couple of months." So there it is: "a couple of months". I do not know what all this fuss is about. It will all be resolved within "a couple of months".

And who said all this? None other than the Leader of the Opposition on 17 April 1997! It has now been left to the Beattie Government to put out the EIS in October 1998—18 months after the honourable gentleman temporarily sitting over there in that chair said it would be two months away.
