Mr WELLINGTON (Nicklin—IND) (11.35 p.m.): I rise to acknowledge publicly the great achievement of students from the Nambour State School in winning the Queensland State Tournament of the Minds competition on Sunday, 3 September 2000. In particular, the Nambour all-girls team of eight won the maths and engineering category at the tournament.
