### **FEDERAL LABOR CANDIDATE FOR PETRIE**

**Mr HINCHLIFFE** (Stafford—ALP) (11.36 am): The federal election campaign is hotting up, but still my local federal member, the member for Petrie, Teresa Gambaro, has failed to involve herself in federal issues. So far her campaign has consisted entirely of state and local government issues. Ms Gambaro's campaign material refers to stopping hooning, upgrading a couple of specific local roads, street signage and graffiti removal. In her campaign material there are no promises to keep interest rates at record lows, which her campaign material in 2004 contained, and there are definitely no references to John Howard. Ms Gambaro makes promises to fight for public transport for parts of her electorate despite never speaking up about the Howard government's lack of a city or urban policy for 11 years. I am sorry, Teresa, but the local community is telling me that this is too little, too late.

Kevin Rudd's Labor candidate Yvette D'Ath is in touch and is ready to proactively represent the electors in the Petrie federal division, especially by removing the impact of WorkChoices on working families. This daughter of local small businesspeople went to Redcliffe State High and put herself through university studying law.
