BRUCE HIGHWAY

Mr PITT (Mulgrave—ALP) (11.46 am): I rise to update the House on the sham that is the Newman government's Bruce Highway Action Plan. As members here would be aware, I have been trying to expose this folly dressed up as a charade for many months. It seems I now have at least one more like-minded supporter—none other than the LNP's own federal member for Leichhardt, Warren Entsch. Mr Entsch obviously could see through this supposed action plan for the political document it is. Not only that, he also had the insight to see that this tawdry political ploy was doomed to fail. That is why last week he came out and described the Bruce Highway Action Plan as a 'motherhood statement'. I should point out that this description was preceded by a rather unparliamentary term but one that we are certainly familiar with in Far North Queensland and no doubt across the state—a term that in mixed company may see the more polite description of 'bovine excrement'. Members may ask why Mr Entsch has so quickly tried to distance himself from this report. It is very simple. His federal colleagues have seen through the report which goes nowhere to addressing the needs of Cairns and Far North Queensland. Furthermore, this document was designed to lobby Canberra for funds. He should follow Mr Entsch's lead and put the interests of Far North Queensland ahead of the interests of Campbell Newman and the LNP. The member for Cairns, the Premier and this LNP government need to get serious about funding works on the Bruce Highway immediately. If they were fair dinkum, they would not be hiding behind this sham of a report.

They need to stop playing politics on this critical upgrade and get on with the job. I have said in this place before that the Newman government's Bruce Highway Crisis Management Group is itself in crisis, but now as each day passes we see that, in fact, it is the Liberal National Party that is facing an internal crisis of its own. I say that again. Any Bruce Highway crisis is the result of the LNP's own historical underfunding and if Mr Entsch wants to point the finger of blame, he needs to point it at one of his own.

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
