Law Week; Juvenile Justice

Mr RYAN (Morayfield—ALP) (8.18 pm): Last week was Law Week and I was very pleased to host a number of celebratory events in the Morayfield state electorate. Like many Queenslanders, there is much to celebrate during this year's Law Week. I know that the staff of the Caboolture Youth Justice Centre appreciated the Attorney-General's visit and the encouragement conveyed to them for all the good work that they do for the young people of the Caboolture region.

As an aside, I am also pleased to hear the Attorney-General's recent media statements about the government's response to the absolute shambles that was created by the former LNP government in relation to its boot camp failures.
