Question on Notice No. 1008 Asked on 7 June 2006

DR FLEGG asked the Minister for Health (MR ROBERTSON)—

QUESTION:

With reference to articles and comment such as in *The Courier-Mail* on Wednesday, 28 December 2005, and its reference to ... some patients waiting up to five years for a basic checkup (dental checkup) —

- (1) Will he detail the number of patients on dental waiting lists with average wait times for each of the past three years (reported separately)?
- (2) How many dental technicians and dentists have been employed for each of the last three years (reported separately)?
- (3) How many dentists and dental technicians have resigned in each of the last three years (reported separately for dentists and technicians)?

ANSWER:

(1) Queensland continues to provide the most comprehensive public dental service in Australia for adults and school aged children, despite the cessation of the Commonwealth Dental Health Program in December 1996. Queensland was the only state to provide full and ongoing supplementation (\$20 million) of the cancelled Commonwealth Dental Health Program.

In the 2006-2007 financial year, the State Government will spend \$137.7 million to provide free public dental services for Queenslanders. This is an increase on the \$132.4 million spent during the 2005-2006 financial year.

During the 2005-2006 financial year, the following occasions of service were provided:

- approximately 555,000 occasions of service to adult dental patients at a cost of \$90.5 million (budget for 2006-2007 financial year is \$94.1 million); and
- approximately 640,000 occasions of service to children through school oral health services at a cost of \$41.9 million (budget for 2006-2007 financial year is \$43.6 million).

This is a good result in an environment of oral health workforce shortages in Queensland and Australia.

The table below provides average figures for clients that have been waiting for treatment on the general waiting list with no specific dental concern.

(3) The table below indicates the number of Dentist and Dental Technician FTE and persons that have resigned during the past three years. The consistency in head counts over the years indicates that recruitment is similar to separation.
